Dear Sir—Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I herewith transmit the Budget of The City of New York for the year 1903, adopted by said Board at a meeting held October 29, 1902, for the consideration of the Board of Aldermen, in pursuance of the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter.

BUDGET FOR 1903.

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the unanimous vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and three, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State Taxes; and, secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-seven million, one hundred and nineteen thousand, thirty-one dollars and ten cents (\$97,119,031.10).

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

- The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
- Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
- All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
- Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
- Except where appropriations are made in bulk, and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
- All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
- The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

Acquiring title to West Farms road, from the Bronx river to Commonwealth avenue.

Petition of Otto Kuhlmann and others was read, as was also the report of the Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer, approved October 13, 1902, by the Chief Engineer of the Borough.

Mr. James H. Goggin, on behalf of the Mapes estate, appeared and stated that the estate desired that West Farms road be acquired under one commission and that the road be improved under one contract.

The following named appeared in favor: Mr. Otto Kuhlmann, Mr. S. Rydell and Mr. J. C. Green.

The attention of the Board was called to the fact that on March 12, 1902, a resolution was adopted by the Local Board for acquiring title to West Farms road, from Bronx river to Westchester creek.

On motion of Alderman Gass, the matter was laid over until the next meeting.

No. 266.

Sewer in Maple ave, from First street, South, Williamsbridge.

Petition of Frank Sicaret, Michele Russo and others was read, as was also the report of the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, dated October 9, 1902, which stated that a sewer was already constructed in Maple avenue to a point between Ruskin and Logan streets, and could not be extended any further south for the reason that the Wakefield drain, which crosses Maple avenue, would interfere with such construction. It appeared that the petition was somewhat indefinite, but if the same applied to Maple avenue, between First street and Ruskin street, provision for the sewer between these points is made in the existing contract.

Papers ordered filed.

Rebuilding sewers in Flower street, between Pleasant avenue and Second avenue; Second avenue, between Flower street and Fifteenth street; Fifth street, between Bronx terrace and Second avenue.

The report of the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, dated September 24, 1902, was read.

On motion, the matter was laid over until a petition for the improvement was received.

No. 244.

Constructing temporary sewers and appurtenances in Adams place, between Columbus avenue and the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company; thence across the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to Rosedale avenue, and in Rosedale avenue, between the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and the centre of Tremont avenue (proposed); in West Farms road, between Rosedale avenue and Clason Point road; in Commonwealth avenue, between West Farms road and Merrill street; in St. Lawrence avenue, between West Farms road and Merrill street; in Clason Point road, between West Farms road and Mansion street; in Mansion street, between Rosedale avenue and Clason Point road; in Merrill street, between Rosedale avenue and St. Lawrence avenue.

Petition of Charles Witteck and others was read, as was also the report approved by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

Total estimated cost, \$33,500.

The assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$247,355.

No one appeared in opposition.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the "City Record" that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now, therefore, it is Resolved, By the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter X. of the Greater New York Charter, that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit: For constructing temporary sewers and appurtenances in Adams place, between Columbus avenue and the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company; thence across the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to Rosedale avenue; in Rosedale avenue, between the property of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company and the centre of Tremont avenue (proposed); in West Farms road, between Rosedale avenue and Clason Point road; in Commonwealth avenue, between West Farms road and Merrill street; in St. Lawrence avenue, between West Farms road and Merrill street; in Clason Point road, between West Farms road and Mansion street; in Mansion street, between Rosedale avenue and Clason Point road; in Merrill street, between Rosedale avenue and St. Lawrence avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Adopted by the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, on the 18th day of October, 1902. Alderman Gass and the President of the Borough of The Bronx voting in favor thereof.

Request for a separate district of assessment in the matter of regulating and grading, etc., White Plains road, in the former Village of Wakefield, and in the former Village of Williamsbridge.

Opinion of Hon. G. L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, dated October 16, 1902, was read, which stated in part that the matter of the apportionment of the expense of acquiring title and the regulating and grading, etc., referred to in the Local Board resolution of July 9, 1902, is a subject which will properly come before the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of opening White Plains road, and before the Board of Assessors in the matter of regulating and grading, and that both bodies, under the law, have sufficient authority to make an equitable apportionment of the expense in each case.

Appeal No. 312—New Building No. 612 of 1902, premises northwest corner Thirty-sixth street and Seventh avenue, Manhattan, Harry B. Mulliken, Esq., architect and appellant.

It is desired to place a pent house on the roof of the building in question, covering about 40 per cent. of the area of the roof, without having this pent house considered as a complete extra story.

The construction of the pent house will be as follows:

All walls surrounding the pent house will be carried up to their proper height.

Floor will be made of cement.

Wireglass will be used wherever glass is necessary.

Proper skylights will be provided.

All woodwork for the window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of the pent house will be thoroughly fireproof.

The highest point of the pent house will not exceed 150 feet from the curb level.

All woodwork entering into the construction of the pent house will be fireproof by the process which is fully accepted and approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

The entire pent house will be constructed absolutely fireproof.

The standpipe will extend into the deck house, with hose connection.

Inasmuch as the highest point of this building will be kept within the 150 foot limit, I respectfully ask that this case be considered by your Honorable Board and the modifications as above set forth be granted.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 313—New Building No. 390 of 1902, premises Nos. 28, 30 and 32 Pine street, Manhattan; Messrs. Marren & Wetmore, architects and appellants.

The use of 8-inch brickwork for side walls where these adjoin walls of existing buildings on either side.

Mr. W. M. Miller appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

Appeal No. 314—Alteration No. 1583 of 1902, premises south side of Fifty-fifth street, about 94 feet east of First avenue, Manhattan; Frederick Wunder, Esq., architect and appellant.

The Building Laws require as per section 106 that concrete arches between iron or steel beams shall be reinforced with corrugated sheet steel, steel ribs or metal in other form weighing not less than one pound per square foot and have no openings larger than 3 inches square.

In the building herein described I propose to take out present fifth tier of wood beams and wood girders and in place of same to put in new steel beams 12 inches deep spaced 4 feet 4 inches and 4 feet 5 inches centres, bolted to top of new 20-inch deep steel girders and with one row of 3/4-inch tie rods for each span.

I propose to put between these beams concrete arches made segmental, with rise of 5 1/2 inches in the centre, the arch to be 6 inches thick, to be made of one part Portland cement, two parts of sand and three parts broken stones or coarse gravel; these arches will, I believe, carry more than the steel beams and a great deal more than the load to be imposed, and that the steel ribs, sheet steel or corrugated steel will not increase their carrying capacity and only add a great expense to the owners of the building without aiding in any manner.

The building is now used, and will be used after the alteration, as a cold storage house for the storage of lager beer, and such being the case, the different floors are constantly damp and ceilings continuously wet; and any metal would in a short space of time rust and fall out (as I have noted in several cases) from exposure to the damp air.

This appeal is practically the same as former Appeal No. 99 of 1902 for building in Brooklyn, which was approved by your Board on April 28, 1902.

Mr. F. Stanley appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 315—Alteration No. 485 of 1902, premises Riverside Hospital, North Brother Island, The Bronx, W. Wheeler Smith, Esq., architect and appellant.

That the space between the floor beams be left unfilled with brick arches or any other kind of weighty material, as the construction is not adapted to receive such. As shown on the plans, the solarium and fire escape enclosure are both designed of the lightest possible construction, so as to present the least obstruction to the admission of light and air to the main building (which is completely isolated, no other structure being within 100 feet).

The proposed annexes are nothing more than covered balconies, two stories in height, the upright supports consisting of wrought-iron pipes screwed together; the floor supports are to be made with steel beams and channels, bolted to the pipe uprights at one end and let into the brick wall at the other end; the floors to be made with 1 1/4-inch tongued and grooved planks nailed to grounds which will be bolted on top of beams and channels.

The fire-escape enclosure is to have a skylight of the "Hayes" construction; the solarium is to take the place of an existing all-wood construction. The latter annex will be placed at the southerly end of building; the former at northerly end, about 160 feet distant.

The introduction of brick arches between the beams would necessitate heavier construction and largely defeat the cost of two structures for the purposes intended, while the cost would also be enhanced and be a serious matter to the Department, now badly handicapped by insufficient appropriations. The main building (Pavilion No. 1) is but two stories in height, and from its isolation it would be difficult to communicate fire either to or from the structure.

The upright surfaces of both the fire-escape enclosure and the solarium will be filled in with glazed sashes in winter. These are to be removed in summer, both structures being then (as stated above) merely covered balconies.

Mr. W. E. Austen appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 316—New Building No. 420 of 1902, premises No. 276 Greenwich street, Manhattan, Herman Kreidler, Esq., appellant.

Permission is asked for changing the pent house on roof in accordance with plans submitted.

All walls surrounding pent house will be carried up to their proper height.

Floors will be made of cement.

Wireglass will be used wherever glass is necessary. Proper skylights will be provided.

All woodwork for the window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of pent house will be fireproofed.

The highest point of main roof is 145 feet, the highest part of pent house roof will not exceed 152 feet from the curb level.

All woodwork entering into the construction of pent house will be fireproofed by process approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

The standpipe, with outlet and hose connection, will be placed in pent house.

Pent house will cover not more than 45 per cent. of roof area and will be constructed entirely fireproof.

Mr. Herman Kreidler appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that the pent house be constructed in accordance with the terms recited in the appeal, but that the extreme height of said pent house shall not exceed 150 feet above the curb level.

Appeal No. 317—New Building No. 503 of 1902, premises west side Gerard avenue, about 186 feet from southwest corner One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, The Bronx, The Bronx Architectural Company, architects and appellants.

To allow the erection of this frame shed, which will be open on one side and which will have all other inclosed sides and roof covered with galvanized iron or tin. This shed is simply a covering for lime and cement.

Mr. F. Hammond appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 318—New Building No. 84 of 1902, premises northwest corner Park place and Franklin avenue, Brooklyn, Messrs. Neville & Bagge, architects and appellants.

Mr. Neville appeared before the Board.

No action taken on this appeal, for reasons set forth in letter of the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Brooklyn.

Appeal No. 319—New Building No. 1344 of 1902, premises east side of Eastern parkway, southeast corner Rogers avenue, Brooklyn, Arlington D. Isham, Esq., architect and appellant.

Propose to change the heating system from Baltimore heaters to hot-air furnaces using 8-inch flues with 4-inch brickwork and tile lining. These flues were built before I came into possession of the houses, and I cannot very well change the construction of flues at this time.

Mr. Arlington D. Isham appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 320—New Building No. 1345 of 1902, premises east side Rogers avenue, southeast corner Degraw street, Brooklyn, Arlington D. Isham, Esq., architect and appellant. (Same Appeal as No. 319.)

On motion, approved.

Appeal No. 321—Alteration No. 3916 of 1902, premises No. 90 Manhattan avenue, Brooklyn, Cohn & Mandiberg, appellants.

We pray your Honorable Board to allow us to raise on top of present building 10 feet by means of raising each floor and roof about 2 feet.

Section 142 of the Code permits us to make the new and old building in one light, as they form one building after alteration.

All other questions are indicated in the Appeal No. 311.

The commanding officers of the above precincts will see that special attention is paid to such portions of the territory added to their jurisdiction as contain ferry houses, steamboat and steamship landings, etc., and will take such measures as may be necessary to have sent to them timely notice of the arrival and departure of ocean steamships, excursions, etc., so that on the occasion of all such arrivals and departures a sufficient force of men will be present on the piers or wharves to afford the public all necessary protection.

The commanding officer of the Eighty-first Precinct will close and complete all records, reports, etc., required to be kept at his station house or made therefrom, and will then deliver such records to the Chief Clerk of this Department, and forward such reports through the proper channels.

All surplus supplies and property will be delivered to the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies, the Sergeant in command of which will accept and properly dispose of same.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
