Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows:
Recommending that the interior telephone system in Bellevue Hospital be rented from the New York Telephone Company.

interior telephones desired, together with switchboard and all apparatus necessary
to provide a system of intercommunication between the several telephones; to install
the system complete without charge and to maintain said system in good working
order at the company's expense at the rate of twelve dollars a station for the first

year, nine dollars for the second year, and six dollars for the third and succeeding

Resolved, That the Superintendent be authorized to make such agreement with the New York Telephone Company as will result in the installation and maintenance of an interior telephone system upon the terms above mentioned, the number of stations

an interior telephone system upon the terms above mentioned, the number of stations not to exceed seventy-five.

Presenting estimate from Samuel J. Jones, Supervising Engineer, for necessary repairs to the plumbing in Bellevue Hospital.

Reporting on the following repairs:

The iron passageway from the kitchen to the main building is practically completed. Favorable progress is being made in the remodeling of the old college building and in the new electric wiring throughout the hospital. A new metal ceiling has been erected in Ward 30. The plumbing for Dormitory 50 is delayed, as the plumber has been unable to obtain the slate for the stalls on account of the strike in the slate works. The defects in the elevator engine have been corrected by the contractor with the exception of a slight one, of which he has been notified. The douche table in the medical baths has been repaired, and the plumber will change the steam and trap connections from the hot water boiler in the cellar. A new glass partition has been put in the dining room of Wards 8 and 9 to provide a surgical dressing room for these wards. Repairs by Duparquet & Co. to kettles in the main kitchen have not been altogether satisfactory, and will be taken back by the firm. The lining of the gutter in the northeast wing has been started by the contractors. The matter of uniforms is now receiving attention whenever time can be spared for it.

Gouverneur Hospital—The repairs to tiling at Gouverneur are now completed.

Employees—Reporting the death at Gouverneur Hospital of Charles I. Simons, Ambulance Driver, who was operated upon on March 7 for appendicitis by Doctor Erdman.

Harlem Hospital—The plumbing for the new bathroom in the dispensary was started this morning and the contractor has promised to complete it as expeditiously as

Erdman.

Harlem Hospital—The plumbing for the new bathroom in the dispensary was started this morning and the contractor has promised to complete it as expeditiously as possible. The repairs to the roof and gutter were also started this morning, and the painting of both the hospital building and the dispensary is now under way. The estimate was approved for the new road outside the grounds at this institution so that patients could be transferred from the ambulance to the hospital without being carried across the sidewalk and thus exposed to the gaze of the idle and curious.

Fordham Hospital—The painting of this hospital is progressing, although it has been interfered with on account of wet weather. The contractor informed the Supervising Engineer that the woodwork will have to dry before he can proceed further with it.
