Music.

The opening concert of the season was given on Sunday, June 5. Arrangements had been made for the United German Singers, but, owing to the rain, the vocal part of the concert was postponed until the following Sunday, June 12, when it again rained, and a further postponement was made necessary. The concert is scheduled for Sunday, July 3. In the meantime the regular band concerts were given each Sunday, and will continue until October. Arrangements have been made for sixteen (16) concerts to be held on July 4, the largest number ever given in one day in the history of the Department.

Care of Trees.

The work of caring for the trees in the parks and on the city streets was of a varied character, confining itself principally to spraying trees, removal of dangerous trees and limbs and similar service to which pressure of the season directed.

During the storm of June 18 nearly three hundred (300) trees were uprooted. In almost every instance the species was of a shallow-rooted character, and in other respects such as this Department discourages for planting. Every method was resorted to for relieving the situation so that all the trees that were either leaning against houses, obstructing traffic or in other ways dangerous were made safe within fortyeight hours after the storm.

In the eradication of insects, work on the tussock moth has been going on with zeal, but the caterpillars this year did not hatch until a month later than usual. Then they came so suddenly and fed so voraciously that within a period of three days after hatching they became full grown and changed to the pupa state. Spraying machines were therefore unable to catch them in their feeding state, and the result is that there are a great many egg masses on the trees in the heart of the city that will have to be removed by more elaborate methods before next spring. The elm leaf beetle was combatted in the suburban sections. The hickory bark borer, which killed a vast number of hickory trees in Prospect Park in former years, was this spring combatted on lines decided upon last year, and the results are most encouraging. The dead and dying infested trees were removed all through the parks, and the remainder have had their petioles sprayed, with the object of poisoning the beetle at the time it emerged from its winter quarters to bore and hide in the petiole of

parks and parkways and the elimination of the ravages wrought by a severe and pro-

To bring this about in the most substantial and permanent manner, it was decided to resurface most of the roads in the parks and on the parkways with gravel, and to resoil and resod the bare and worn spots in the lawns. Contracts were let for the delivery of road gravel and other road material, grass seed and sods, and the repair work was promptly begun.

The greater part of the main road on Eastern parkway has been resurfaced, as has also a portion of the west drive in Prospect Park. Ocean parkway has received attention along the same lines, and the work of resurfacing the speedway with loam was completed.

The roadways in Forest Park, Dyker Beach Park, the Shore road, Bay parkway and Fort Hamilton avenue received attention, some portions of the same being resurfaced, while others were temporarily repaired and put in decent condition. A contract was let for the delivery of one hundred thousand (100,000) gallons

of emulsified road oil for dust-laying purposes, and it is intended that the same will be applied on all the roads in our park system during the summer. The bicycle paths on Ocean parkway and the promenades on Eastern parkway

were recoated with limestone screenings.

Carroll Park, Bedford Park, Tompkins Park, Bushwick Park, Winthrop Park and Red Hook Park were partly resodded and put in good condition for the coming summer's use. Trees and shrubs were planted out to a considerable number.

The display of summer flowering plants will be more extensive than anything heretofore attempted, our greenhouses in Forest Park having been practically depleted to supply the flowering plants required in the various parks.

Construction Work.

The contract for fencing, grading and otherwise improving the playground at Seigel and McKibben streets has been completed.

Plans are now under way for providing a suitable building and the necessary apparatus for this playground.

At McCarren Park a temporary wooden building of ample size, and provided with locker and toilet facilities, was erected and is now ready for occupancy. A number of baseball diamonds were laid out, and the entire field was cleaned,

raked over and rolled. The girls' playground at Manhattan and Driggs avenues was enlarged and partly surrounded with a wire fence fifteen (15) feet in height, so as to obviate the danger

of the youngsters being hit by baseballs from the adjoining ball field. On the Berry street side of the park a cinder running track, six (6) laps to the mile, is being laid out and will be finished by the middle of July, thus adding further to

the usefulness of this playground. Seventeen new flagpoles, 50 feet in length, were erected in various parks and playgrounds by contract.

The contract of improving the Bay Ridge parkway, between Fourth and Fort Hamilton aves., is nearing completion; some of the brick work in the gutters, however, has been done in a faulty manner and will have to be replaced.

The work of reconstructing parts of the gutters will probably delay the date of opening of the parkway till September 1.

The construction of a masonry arch at 1st ave. and the Shore road, a contract for which was let late last fall, is now under way, and the progress made so far is

Repairs to the "Terrace Bridge" in Prospect Park have been completed in a workmanlike manner by the contractor, and the safety of this structure thereby insured. A contract has been let for the completion of the shelter in Fulton Park, work

on which was abandoned by the original contractor, and it is hoped to have this building in use early in the fall. The tennis shelter in Prospect Park, work on which was also abandoned by the original contractor, is now rapidly nearing completion and should be finished by

September 15. This Department has had considerable trouble with its movable settees, both on the Ocean and Eastern parkways, the same being thrown into the roadways at night or otherwise destroyed by visitors, and, as a result, numerous complaints have reached this office. In order to obviate this nuisance a design for a permanent settee was prepared, and a contract for the erection of two hundred (200) seats on Ocean and Eastern parkways was let. The settees are constructed of wrought iron, with heavy wooden slats, and are anchored in concrete. All these seats will be in place by September 1.

A contract was let for the repairs to asphalt pavements on Eastern parkway extension, Bushwick ave., Glenmore ave., etc., and the contractors are now engaged on this work.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or y operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or

consents. Sixth-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh-The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth-All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply,

Ninth-Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe. Eleventh-The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the conduit ine and its appurtenances.

Twelfth-The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the Presi-dent of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows: (a) If the test be made in the foundry where

the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch. (b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in

use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch. A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed

by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Elecfricity, and filed with the Board.
Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts: Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet;
Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500

cubic feet; One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

(b) Consumers making yearly contracts:

Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot of These rates to apply to boxes located not above

the first floor of any building. During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth-The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within Districts Numbers 1 and 2, or if such districts be extended as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended districts, shall extend its conduits and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located

above the first floor of any building.

Sixteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1911, showing the exact location of all conduit lines and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such conduit. On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished the Board showing all conduits laid during the preceding year.

Seventeenth-The conduit lines hereby authorized shall be used only by the Merchants' Re-frigerating Company, and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.
