FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1914.

Financial.

The budget appropriations made to this Department in the several boroughs for 1914 aggregated \$9,299,091.02. Of this there was expended during the second quarter the sum of \$2,291,625.06, which added to the outlay for the first quarter (\$2,151,197.84), made a total of \$4,442,822.90, leaving a balance of \$4,856,268.12 for use during the remainder of the year.

Uniformed Force.

On June 30, 1914, the membership of the uniformed force in all boroughs was 5,008, an increase of 502 over the number at the close of the corresponding period of the preceding year. The number of apparatus companies at the close of the quarter was 292, an increase of 23 over the total in service on June 30, 1913.

During the quarter 71 uniformed firemen, having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of three months, were appointed as fourth grade firemen, and 59 appointments of ununiformed firemen on probation were made.

Promotions in the uniformed force, 27 in all, were made during the second quarter, as follows:

Captain to Chief of Battalion, 1; Lieutenant to Captain, 7; Engineer of Steamer to Lieutenant, 3; Firemen, first grade, to Lieutenant, 6; Firemen, first grade, to Engineer of Steamer, 10.

The number of retirements, on own application, was 1, on two-thirds pay, and 11 on half pay; for disability there were 2 retirements, 1 on one-half pay and 1 on one-third pay. The aggregate number of retirements was 14, with a total pension allowance of \$13,733.32, as against 25, involving a yearly total of \$20,950, for the second quarter of 1913.

Captain William H. Nash, who on June 1, 1914, was retired on two-thirds pay, had been in active service for almost 38 years. He had served with distinction and credit, his name appearing four times on the Roll of Merit. He had ten times sustained severe injuries in the line of duty, from some of which he has never completely recovered.

The resignations totalled 11, the dismissals 12 and the reinstatements 3. The number of deaths in the active list was 6; among those retired, 11.

There were 435 cases of illness and 199 of injury, treated by the Medical Officers, 634 in all, and the time lost from each was 6,368 and 3,115 days, respectively, a total of 9,483 days. The combined total of these cases for the second quarter of the year 1913 was 513, and the time lost therefrom 9,014 days.

Civilian Force.

The civilian force on June 30, 1914, numbered 769.

Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the second quarter, the fire alarm telegraph system in the various boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductors in subways and of aerial conductor and circuit mileage (the latter both underground and aerial) as follows:

During the quarter there were tested at factories 270,808 feet of conductor and 54,174 feet of cable. Cable to the extent of 8,602 feet was installed, and installed cable 169,452 feet, in all, tested.

Fire Prevention.

The Bureau of Fire Prevention since its reorganization under its present Chief, and as the result of improved methods of administration established by him, has greatly increased in effectiveness of operation.

The number of fire prevention orders complied with, plus the number of hazardous conditions personally abated by the Inspectors of the Bureau of Fire Prevention in the entire year 1913, was 11,539.

The number of orders complied with, plus the number of hazardous conditions personally abated by Inspectors of the Bureau of Fire Prevention in the first six months of the year 1914, was 11,248.

The force in the year 1914 was substantially the same in number as the force in the year 1913.

It was the practice in the year 1913 to issue orders requiring the posting of "No Smoking" signs in factories. The owners of the factories were then required to send to Fire Headquarters for the signs, and were prosecuted if they failed to comply with the order by obtaining the signs and posting them properly. As a more direct method of accomplishing the same result, the Bureau of Fire Prevention now send Inspectors, in an automobile, to deliver the signs and personally see that they are properly posted. As a result, these conditions have been met by the personal abatement of the violations by Inspectors of the Bureau of Fire Prevention without the issuance of orders.

The number of orders complied with—and this is the best test of the effectiveness of the work of the Bureau of Fire Prevention—in the second quarter of the year 1914 was more than 100 per cent. greater than the number of orders complied with in the second quarter of the year 1913, although the force was not increased.

The number of inspections made in the second quarter of the year 1914 was approximately 30 per cent. greater than the number made in the second quarter of the year 1913.

The number of orders served or mailed in the second quarter of the year 1914 was approximately 23 per cent. greater than the number served (none mailed) in the second quarter of the year 1913. The figures, in details, are as follows:

Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances.

During the period covered by this report, 16,955 inspections were made. Items of orders aggregating 6,125 were served or mailed, and 7,603 items of orders were complied with. Plans, 766 in all, for the installation of standpipes, sprinklers, fire escapes, etc., were examined and all but 4 approved.

Places of Public Assembly.

The inspection force of the Division of Places of Public Assembly during the second quarter of the current year made 1879 original inspections. The reinspections during the same period numbered 10,008, of which 6,801 were of motion picture shows and 2,563 of theatres. Motion picture show reports from company commanders to the number of 2,157 were received and examined. The number of standpipe violations reported during the quarter was 17, which, with 49 pending from the preceding quarter, made a total of 66, of which 54 were disposed of by fine or otherwise, leaving 12 pending at the close of the quarter. The number of items of orders served or mailed during the second quarter was 2,279. Items of orders to the number of 1,981 were complied with.

Combustibles and Explosives.

In the Division of Combustibles, all boroughs, during the second quarter, the total amount of receipts for licenses and permits was \$34,313. Surveys to the number of 3,715 were made, on application to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles and explosive material. Blasting operations to the number of 2,554 were supervised by civilian inspectors of blasting attached to the Division, and in 8,185 cases by members of the uniformed force, an aggregate of 10,739. Items of orders totaling 3,001, were served or mailed. Items of orders to the number of 2,184 were complied with. Inspections totaling 11,131 were made. Permits, 3,878 in all, were issued.

Fires and Losses.

In the Division of Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, during the second quarter, there were 2,148 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$1,042,689, representing an average loss per fire of \$485.42. In the Division of Fire Marshal, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, during the same period, there were 1,246 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$573,085, and an average loss per fire of \$459.96.

The total estimated loss by fire for the second quarter of 1914, in all boroughs, was \$1,615,774. During the corresponding year of 1913, the total estimated loss was \$1,664,972.

The number of fires in the second quarter of 1914 was 3,394, as against 3,171 during the corresponding period of 1913, and the average loss for the second quarter of 1914, \$476.07, as against \$525.06 for the like period of 1913.

Arson, Etc.

During the second quarter of the current year in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond there were 5 arrests for arson, which with 10 pending from the preceding quarter made the number to be disposed of 15. Of this number there were 2 convictions and 1 discharge and 6 dismissals of indictments on recommendation of the District Attorney, leaving 6 persons under indictment and awaiting trial. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens during the same period, there were 5 arrests for arson, which, with 16 pending from the preceding quarter, made the number to be disposed of 21. Of this number there were 9 convictions. In one case the indictment was dismissed, and in another the Grand Jury failed to indict, leaving 9 cases at the close of the quarter awaiting trial.

There were in all boroughs during the second quarter, 10 arrests for arson. There were 11 convictions during the same period from among those cases pending during the first quarter, and those which arose during the second quarter.

Prosecutions.

In the Legal Division 1,120 cases were disposed of during the second quarter growing out of the enforcement of various provisions of the Fire Prevention Law. The reinspections made totaled 2,870.

Apparatus.

During the period covered by this report, 15 pieces of motor apparatus were delivered under contract, consisting of one seventy-five foot and 3 sixty-five foot aerial hook and ladder trucks, 5 tractors for engines, 2 for hook and ladder trucks and 2 for water towers and 2 touring cars.

Buildings, Etc.

During the second quarter contracts were awarded at an aggregate cost of \$38,577.12 for erecting a dock house on Eighth Ward Market site, Brooklyn, for the use of the officers and men of one of the Department's fireboats; for alterations and repairs to quarters of 3 engine companies; installing new electric lighting systems and alterations to gas fitting work at quarters of 2 engine companies, installing gasoline storage systems at quarters of 6 engine companies and 1 hook and ladder company, and for repairs to asphalt floors at various company quarters.

Minor repair jobs, 425 in all, were done to buildings by department mechanics, entailing an expenditure of \$15,516.68, and 54 by open market order at a cost of \$6,233.44.

Horses.

There were 1,235 horses in service at the close of the second quarter, a decrease of 142, as compared with the total at the close of the corresponding period of 1913, due to the progressive motorization of department apparatus.

Contracts and Open Market Orders.

Contracts executed for furnishing apparatus and supplies for additions and alterations to a department building, for installing gasoline storage systems and electric and gas lighting equipment, and for repairs to asphalt floors in various company quarters, amounted during the second quarter to \$264,920.30. Agreements entered into during the same quarter for furnishing and delivering supplies called for an expenditure of \$22,057.30.

Contract orders to the number of 283 were issued in the gross sum of \$242,811.65, and 857 open market orders, involving an outlay of \$54,469.94. The number of open

market orders issued during the second quarter of 1913 was 991, representing an expenditure of \$88,689.36.

There was thus a decrease in the number of open market orders issued during the second quarter of 1914, as compared with the corresponding period of 1913, of 134, and in the outlay of \$34,219.42, or of 39 per cent.

Commissioner Livingston moved that the Commissioners of the Board of Elections organize as the Board of Canvassers of the City of New York and that Commissioner Kane be elected to act as Chairman of the said Board of Canvassers.

Question put by Commissioner McKee and unanimously carried.

The constitutional oath of office as member and as Chairman of the Board of Canvassers of the City of New York was administered to Commissioner Kane by Commissioner McKee, Secretary, Board of Elections.

The oath of office as a member and as Secretary of the Board of Canvassers of the City of New York was then administered by the Chairman to Commissioner McKee.

The oath of office as a member of the Board of Canvassers of the City of New York was then administered by the Chairman to Commissioner Livingston.

The Chairman requested the Secretary to deliver to the Board the certified copies of the statements of the County Boards of Canvassers of the Counties of New York and Bronx as to the votes cast within such counties for candidates for City offices, required to be filed with the Board of Elections by the County Clerks of said counties, pursuant to the provisions of Section 440, Chapter 22 of the Laws of 1909, constituting Chapter 17 of the Consolidated Laws.

The Secretary presented to the Board a certified copy of the statements of the Boards of County Canvassers of the Counties of New York and Bronx, as to the votes cast within said counties for candidates for City offices.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted, viz.:

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDED DECEMBER 5, 1914.

WARNING!

The public is warned that "Dr." Frederick H. Hoffa, of 58 West 129th street,
who, according to his official card, holds "New York State Opt. Certificate of Exemption
No. 1190," and who has been making door to door visits in Harlem, obtaining
admission under the pretext that he represents the Department of Health, has no
connection whatever with the Department.

THE SPREADING OF DISEASE THROUGH OVERCROWDED CARS.

Every street railroad in New York City is required by law to furnish "such
service and facilities as shall be safe and adequate and, in all respects, just andreasonable." To the Public Service Commission is entrusted the power and duty of
enforcing this law. The authority of the Public Service Commission is defined as
follows:

"Whenever the Commission shall be of the opinion that the regulations,
practices, equipment, appliances or service of any such street railroad corporation
in respect to the transportation of persons, are unjust, unreasonable, unsafe,
improper or inadequate, the Commission shall determine the just, reasonable, safe,
adequate and proper regulations, practices, equipment, appliances and service
thereafter to be in force, to be observed and to be used in such transportation of
persons and so fix and prescribe the same by an order to be served upon every
street railroad corporation to be bound thereby; and thereafter it shall be the
duty of every street railroad corporation to observe and comply with every such
requirement of every such order served upon it, and to do everything necessary
or proper in order to secure absolute compliance with and observance of every such
order by all of its officers, agents and employees."

The wilful overcrowding of passenger cars is a serious offense against public
health and safety. It is the prevailing public impression that the railroad companies
are not actuated solely or sufficiently by the desire to give the best possible service
to the people of the City, and that cars are deliberately overcrowded for profit, at times
when such overcrowding is unnecessary and avoidable. It can readily be demonstrated
that diseases of the respiratory tract and other forms of communicable disease may be
and are transmitted from person to person under conditions which commonly exist
in subway and other passenger cars in this City. Are the transportation companies
doing all that can reasonably be expected of them to minimize the danger? This
pertinent question is raised in the following communication addressed to the Public
Service Commission by the Commissioner of Health on December 1st:

"December 1, 1914.

"Public Service Commission, 154 Nassau Street, City:

"Gentlemen—At a recent conference on street car sanitation, it was the
consensus of opinion of those present that while some importance attaches to
the cleaning of passenger cars, their overcrowding is a matter of infinitely
greater significance from the standpoint of public health. This Department is
entrusted with the supervision of health matters in this City and therefore the
question of car sanitation is one which the Department may not properly ignore;
and yet any improvement of existing conditions must be brought about either
through the voluntary acts of the transportation companies, or through the enforce-
ment of standards prescribed by your Commission.

"It is our belief that the vitality of passengers who ride in overcrowded and
poorly ventilated cars is injuriously affected; and that the breathing, coughing and
sneezing of persons who are packed together results in the transmission of disease
by means of so-called "droplet" infection.

"Presumably some relief may be looked for on the completion of the new
subways. In the meantime, are the companies doing all that they can reasonably
be expected to do, to protect the health of their patrons? If, as I have been
informed, the companies do not use all of their available rolling stock, but place
on the rails only a sufficient number of cars to carry their passengers under
conditions of maximum overcrowding, they are, to my mind, culpable of a serious
offense.

"In other cities, regulations have been adopted and are enforced which limit
the number of passengers in cars. May I ask whether any similar regulations
have been adopted by your Commission, and what efforts, if any, are made to
enforce them?

"Although the improvement of existing conditions in this important field can
only be effected either by the companies or through the activities of your Com-
mission, many citizens decline to absolve the Department of Health from blame
for existing conditions, and I feel that efforts should be made by us at least to
place before the citizens of the City the facts as they exist. The harm which is
being done is very serious, and every possible effort should be made to obviate it.

GREAT BRITAIN PREPARES TO CLEAN HOUSE. WHEN WILL AMERICA
FOLLOW SUIT?

"A bulky Blue-book of 782 pages has been issued which contains the minutes of
evidence given before the Select Committee on Patent Medicines. Those who have
the time and inclination to skim this remarkable document," says a writer in "The
Hospital," "will find in it as strong a condemnation of the secret remedy traffic as
that contained in the report of the Committee itself. The most convincing evidence
against quack medicine, was that tendered by some of the witnesses who presented
the case for the proprietors of patent medicines, notwithstanding that an unanswerable
case was made out by the witnesses on the other side. When the times are favorable
to the making of new domestic legislation Parliament will be able to find in this Blue-
book convincing arguments in support of a bill to suppress a traffic which, in many of
its aspects, is indistinguishable from fraud of a most revolting character."

PROCEDURE IN MENINGITIS AND ACUTE POLIOMYELITIS.

Heretofore all cases of death from meningitis, whether of tuberculous or pneu-
mo-coccal origin, have been referred to a Medical Inspector of the Bureau of Infecti-
ous Diseases for investigation. In the future, however, where the nature of the case
is clearly stated (especially as to the type of bacterial organism causing it), and
where the Department of Health requires no further detailed information, no such in-
vestigation will be made. In cases reported as simple meningitis, or where the variety
is not stated, an investigation will be made, as in the past. Such investigations will,
of course, invariably be made in deaths from such disease where the cases were not
reported during life.

These procedures, as well as the similar routine pursued in Acute Anterior Poli-
omyelitis, are in no way to be construed as a reflection on the diagnostic ability of the
physician in attendance. They are taken merely to insure the accuracy of the mor-
bidity statistics of the Department and are in accordance with the rules governing the
supervision of these diseases.

ITALIAN CHESTNUTS CONDEMNED.

The cargoes of eight steamers, bringing shipments of Italian chestnuts, known in
the trade as marrons, have been overhauled within the past six weeks. Large quan-
tities have been condemned by the gravity process, in which the chestnuts are placed
in a barrel of water and thoroughly stirred, the wormy and decomposed nuts rising
to the surface and being thrown out, while those remaining at the bottom are care-
fully sorted.

Up to the present 1,479,160 pounds of chestnuts have been overhauled, of which
344,520 pounds have been condemned.

DRIED BEANS CONDEMNED.

Recently one of the food inspectors noticed that a certain wholesaler had a quan-
tity of dry horse-beans on sale from which numbers of a fly-like insect issued. On
further investigation it was discovered that a large percentage of the individual beans
held the larvae of these flies, and their destruction was consequently ordered, although
the dealer protested that they would be all right just as soon as all the "flies" had
hatched.

JUDGE'S DECISION HAMPERS THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

A decision just rendered by Justice Nott of the Court of General Sessions
promises greatly to impede the work of the Department of Health in prosecuting
violations of the Sanitary Code and to increase the work of the already overburdened
Court of Special Sessions.

Arrested for selling heroin in violation of Section 182 of the Sanitary Code,
Charles P. Pray and Edward C. Peterson were sentenced in the City Magistrates' Court
to serve three months in the Work House and pay a fine of \$500 each. They appealed
from the Magistrates' decision on the ground that Section 95 of the Interior Criminal
Court Act is unconstitutional. In substance, this act confers power upon a City
Magistrate to summarily try and convict a defendant for a violation of the Sanitary
Code. The appellants held that the constitution distinctly guaranteed either a trial
by jury or, in the case of misdemeanors, trial in the Court of Special Sessions.
Inasmuch as the legislature had declared violations of the sanitary code to be misde-
meanors they contended that prosecutions of this kind should be conducted in the
Court of Special Sessions.

Upsetting the procedure followed for years, Justice Nott of the Court of General
Sessions, who heard the appeal, upheld the contention of the appellants and declared
the Magistrates' Courts to have no jurisdiction over cases of this kind. Unless
reversed by a higher authority this decision practically means that hereafter all

prosecutions conducted by the Department of Health for violation of the Sanitary Code will be tried in the Court of Special Sessions. This will not only add an enormous, even an intolerable burden to the work of that Court, but it will add unjustly to the inconveniences occasioned by minor health ordinances, such as smoking in the subway, spitting on the street, failure to muzzle dogs, etc. Hereafter persons summoned to Court on any of these charges must be held, in bail, for trial in the Court of Special Sessions. Such procedure in effect constitutes a punishment far greater than that contemplated by the legislature, and will undoubtedly give rise to serious complaints. The Corporation Counsel and the District Attorney's office are giving this serious situation the attention it deserves.

Re-argument of this case was held in the Chambers of Justice Nott on December the first. Further decision was reserved.

PERSISTENT MILK ADULTERATOR FINED.

John Bosch's Sons were fined \$500 in the Court of Special Sessions, Borough of Brooklyn, December 3d, for three violations of Section 53—selling adulterated milk. These individuals, as a partnership, have previously been convicted twenty-one times for selling adulterated milk, and sixteen times for violation of Section 183—returning uncleaned containers to the country—and eleven times for violation of Section 56a—mislabeling of milk.

KEEPING WATCH ON CARELESS PHYSICIANS.

All discovered instances of delinquency on the part of physicians and institutions in regard to the report of cases of infectious disease, as required by the provisions of the Sanitary Code, have been carefully recorded for many years. These records, however, were until recently separately filed with the respective heads of the divisions, within the Bureau of Infectious Diseases, under whose jurisdiction the particular disease happened to fall. However, it became apparent that by reason of such dispersion of delinquency records, a particular physician's sins of omission or commission might be many times multiplied (seventeen in one instance,) and yet knowledge of their extent have escaped observation.

A recent order was issued, therefore, which amends the system of record, so that in addition to the files formerly kept, each Division Chief is required to forward a duplicate record of each delinquency discovered to the Executive Office, where close watch will be kept to discover persistent offenders, that they may be properly punished.

DEPARTMENTAL EFFICIENCY COMPLAINED OF.

As evidence of the realization, if not of the appreciation of the department's activities in compelling obedience to the Sanitary Code, the following communication, which was received recently by the Commissioner, is quoted:

"How about doing your duty, as Health Officer, by the countless Real Estate owners, killed and dying of Cardio-Vascular-Renal disease caused by the epidemic of 'Inspectionitis'? The above class is entitled to your protection from Preventable disease fully as much as infants are from infected milk."

ERROR CORRECTED.

A typographical error made in the issue of the Bulletin, dated November 21, 1914, should be corrected. On page 382 it was stated that 14,735 quarts of milk were dispensed by the milk stations in the Borough of Manhattan, while the figures should have been 314,735.

CHANGES IN DISTRICT NURSE WORK IN INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Although the work of the District Nurses of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases during 1915 will be largely increased both in scope and amount, yet there will be no increase in their number.

The following new duties will be performed by the District Nurses:

1. Investigation and sanitary supervision of all cases of typhoid fever reported in New York City. This calls for extremely careful and patient investigation. In addition, the nurses will endeavor to obtain the consent of the physician of the family to typhoid immunization.

2. Investigation and following up of all cases discharged from Otisville and Raybrook Sanatoria in order to determine whether such patients have derived benefits from their sanatorium treatment so far outweighing those obtainable by patients who have to depend exclusively on home treatment, as to justify the cost of maintenance of the sanatoria.

3. Supervision at their homes of selected cases of whooping cough.

The scope of the nurses' work in connection with contagious diseases has steadily been enlarged. They now terminate cases of scarlet fever, make all arrangements for the performance of immunization against diphtheria by the District Diagnostician, etc. In order to render possible the performance of the above mentioned work, steps must be taken to prevent the recurrence of the conditions of last winter, when, because of the pressure of work in connection with the supervision of contagious diseases, the home visiting of cases of tuberculosis was of necessity sadly neglected. Every new case and every dead case was promptly visited, but during the five months, January to May, 1914, 32,316 revisits were perforce omitted. The reduction in the number of tuberculosis home visits was promptly reflected by a fall in the attendance at the Tuberculosis Clinics, of both new and old cases. The Department of Health was seriously criticized by such anti-tuberculosis organizations as the Committee for the Prevention of Tuberculosis and the Association of Tuberculosis Clinics, for neglecting its tuberculosis work. A special investigation made by the latter association showed conclusively that the decrease in clinic attendance was due to the decrease in home visiting; the investigator also called attention to the fact that the nurses of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases were working at high pressure and could not be expected to add to their work without endangering their health and lowering the quality of their work.

The only solution of the problem is to relieve the District Nurses of duties of less importance than the home visiting in cases of tuberculosis, and the proposed new duties previously mentioned.

During the first three months of 1914, 70,000 visits were paid by the District Nurses of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases. Of these 20,000 or 29 per cent. were to cases of measles.

This disease presents one of the most difficult and unsatisfactory problems with which sanitarians have to cope. It is most infectious during the two or three days before its nature is recognized, which is usually not until the appearance of the rash. Because of the mild character of the majority of cases, a large proportion are never reported to the health authorities. In many communities notification of measles is not required. The average number of cases of measles reported yearly in New York

City is about 32,000. During the winter of 1913-14 every case of measles was revisited twice. To determine the proportion of cases calling for close supervision, and those requiring observation only, and the number of visits paid by the nurses, careful records were kept from October 15th to November 15th, 1914, the results of which are given in the attached table. It will be noted that of 780 cases, 707 or 91 per cent. were "observation" cases; also that of 353 terminated cases, 180 or 50 per cent. required only two visits. The 40 cases requiring only one visit were those removed at once to hospital. Therefore, if later visits could be safely omitted in suitable cases, there would be a saving of 52,000 nurses' visits per year which could be used for other purposes. In order to determine whether such later visits could be safely omitted in selected cases of measles, a new procedure was on November 10th, 1914, put into effect in the Germantown District, Brooklyn.

All later visits of District Nurses to "observation" cases of measles were discontinued—by "observation" cases are meant those in which all necessary precautions against the spread of infection are observed, and where there is a private physician in attendance. The premises are not placarded; the nurses instruct the parents or guardians as to the special dangers of the disease, the precautions to be observed in order to prevent its spread, the necessity of continuing the quarantine as long as cough, or nose and throat discharge persist, and finally, as to home methods of cleansing and disinfecting premises at the termination of the case. The nurses issue permits for the children of the family to return to school under the following conditions:

In the case of the sick child the permit is dated ahead five days after the appearance of the rash, is signed by the nurse, and the parents are instructed to have it countersigned by the attending physician.

Permits for children in the family who have had measles bear the same date as that issued to the sick child; the physician's signature is not required.

Permits for children in the family who have not had measles are dated two weeks after the date of expected return of sick child to school. The physician's signature is not required. Should such children later develop measles before their return to school, and their case be not reported to the Department of Health by the attending physician, they will be seen by the school nurse and their readmission prevented.

This new procedure has been in effect in this district for almost two weeks. So far no complaints of any kind have been received. On the other hand, physicians have expressed their entire approval of the procedure. They are appreciative of the trust placed in them by the Department of Health, and are willing to assume the responsibility for seeing that quarantine and all other necessary measures are observed.

Should the final results prove satisfactory, it is proposed to adopt this new procedure throughout the entire City on or before the first of January, 1915.

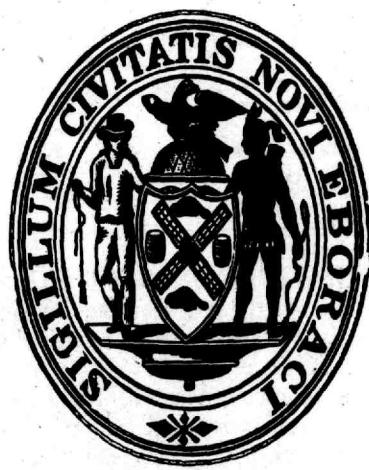

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
