GRACE, Mayor of Ivew York: SIR—We have the honor to submit herewith the report of the operations and actions of this Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1885: On May 9, the term of office of Commissioner Cornelius Van Cott having expired, Commissioner Henry D. Purroy was appointed Fire Commissioner in his place, for the term of six years from May 1, 1885, and Mr. Elward Smith was appointed Fire Commissioner in place of Commissioner Purroy, for the term ending May 1, 1887. The Board was then organized by the election of Commissioner Purroy as President and Com-missioner Croker as Treasurer, and the appointment of the following committees: Commissioner Croker as Chairman of the Committee on Apparatus and Telegraph, which shall have cognizance of all matters that may be referred to it relating to the Bureaus of the Chief of Department and Inspector of Combustibles, the Fire Alarm Telegraph, Repair Shops, and the Hospital and Training Stables.

Hospital and Training Stables. Commissioner Smith as Chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Supplies, which shall have cognizance of all matters that may be referred to it relating to the Bureaus of Inspection of Buildings and Fire Marshal, the Attorney, and the Superintendent of Repairs to Buildings. The President is ex-officio member of both committees.

# AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Wednesday, July 15, 1885, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present-The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, Deputy Chief Engineer Fteley, and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of July 1 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 880 to 901 and 912 to 932, and the sixth monthly estimates of work done by the contractors, included in Vouchers Nos. 902 to 911, all of which were approved by the Board and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

certified to the Comptroller for payment. The Committee on Construction made verbal report upon a request from the Chief Engineer for an additional appropriation for cross-section discs, and recommended that the appropriation be made ; and, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, an additional appropriation of \$47 was made for one extra tripod head, with legs, and labor, material, etc., for graduating Ls and fixing said discs. A communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated July 8, 1885, in response to the request of the Commissioners for a modified plan of the New Aqueduct, south of One Hundred and First street and through the transverse road in Central Park at Ninety-seventh street, which was read and referred to the Committee on Construction for investigation and report. The Commissioner of Public Works presented the property maps completing the set of six similar maps, for lands required for the New Aqueduct, from the east side of Harlem river to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue, in New York City, which maps were duly certified by the Commissioners for transmission to the Counsel to the Corporation. A communication addressed to the Commissioner of Public Works by the Assessors of Taxes of the City of Yonkers, and dated July 9, was presented to the Commissioners by him and referred to

A communication addressed to the Commissioner of Public Works by the Assessors of Taxes of the City of Yonkers, and dated July 9, was presented to the Commissioners by him and referred to the Secretary with directions to comply with the request of the Assessors therein contained. The Secretary submitted a written opinion from the Counsel to the Corporation, dated July 7, 1885, in relation to the sinking of additional shafts upon certain parts of the line of the New Aque-duct, and the manner in which the work should be contracted for. In connection with this matter the Chief Engineer presented a report of an accident which occurred on the 14th instant, and demonstrates the necessity for sinking an additional shaft. The following resolution was then offered by Commissioner Dowd : Resolved, That in the opinion of the Commissioners, it is for the public interest that an addi-tional shaft be provided for upon the lands of Bush Bennett and others, on Section 9 of the New Aqueduct, for the purpose of hastening the completion of the aqueduct at that place, where unfore-seen physical difficulties have been disclosed in excavating the tunnel there, provided the sinking of said shaft and doing of all work incidental thereto can be done at an expenditure of not over five thousand dollars. thousand dollars.
