The President, to whom was referred the application of Cornelius Morrison for permission to erect shed over machinery located on the bulkhead adjoining the dumping-board at Seventeenth street, East river, offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Cornelius Morrison to erect and construct a shed of corrugated iron over the machinery and stuctures located on the bulkhead adjoining the dumping-board at the foot of East Seventeenth street, East river, the same to be erected under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, and to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board; and also provided that; the said Morrison agrees to remove the said shed, when ordered by the Board, within five days after receipt of notice.
