SIR—There were 638 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 2, 1886, which is the same number that was reported the preceding week, and 71 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending December 26, 1885, was 630, which is 22.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.07 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,419,712.
