

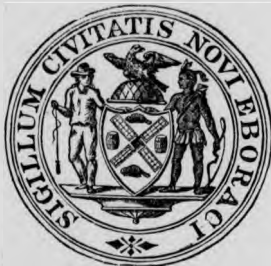

## BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

ARMORY BOARD—CITY OF NEW YORK, }  
January 15, 1886.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held at the office of his Honor the Mayor, City Hall, this date, all the members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The application of the Commanding Officer of First Battery, N. G. S. N. Y., for renewal of lease of present armory, was taken up for further consideration. Mr. John Hardy, agent for Mrs. Katharina Schmuck, lessee, who was present, offered the lease for three to five years, but thought the rental should be increased, as the present lease was made when rentals were lower than at present. The Board declined to consider the renewal at an advance, but offered to re-lease for three years, from May 1, 1886, at the same rental and on the same terms as present lease. Mr. Hardy desired to consult the lessee, and the matter was laid over.

A communication was read from Commanding Officer First Battery, transmitting proposals for furnishing camp-chairs and rubber hose, for which application had previously been made. The communication was received and laid over.

The communication from A. R. Whitney & Co., asking that date be fixed by this Board for completion of work on their contract of December 29, 1884, was taken up, and the architect, who was present, informed the Board as to the cause of past delays, and the present condition of the iron-work. After deliberation, the paper was ordered to be filed, and the Secretary instructed to notify Messrs. A. R. Whitney & Co. that the Board could see no necessity for fixing a date at the present time.

A communication was read from the Comptroller, giving notice that he could not pay A. R. Whitney & Co's bill for \$792, forwarded by this Board December 8, 1885, because the materials furnished were not included in a contract, as prescribed by section 3, chapter 91, Laws of 1884, which was referred to the Secretary for conference with the Comptroller, and report.

The following report from the architect of the Twelfth Regiment Armory was read :

NEW YORK, January 6, 1886.

To the Armory Board, City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—The carpenter work of the new building, Twelfth Regiment Armory, Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, corner Ninth avenue, New York City, has progressed to entitle the contractors, Messrs. Mahony Brothers, to the amount of their first payment, viz. : eleven thousand three hundred and eighty dollars, in accordance with the terms of the articles of agreement, being twenty per cent. of contract.

The report was received, and the Secretary instructed to forward the account to the Comptroller for payment.

A communication from the editor of "Building" was read, asking permission to use the plans of Twelfth Regiment Armory for illustrating an article in that paper, which was ordered filed, and the Secretary instructed to notify the applicant that the architect would be instructed to give him all the facilities and information he can conveniently.

A letter was read from Colonel J. H. Jones, commanding Twelfth Regiment, suggesting additions and slight alterations in present plans for the interior of the new armory, and recommending that the rooms be furnished in accordance with the wishes of the regiment, and recommending that the architect directed to prepare plans and specifications and obtain estimates of cost for the following items recommended : iron gates for two entrances, alterations on first floor, gas-fixtures, and report at the next meeting of the Board.

AN ORDINANCE for licensing drivers of railroad cars driven on the surface of the streets in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person shall drive any railroad car while carrying passengers, in any of the streets of this City, unless he be twenty-one years of age, a resident of this State for one year, and of the City for four months, and have obtained license from the Mayor for such purpose, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner or owners of such railroad car, and from such driver, both or either.

Sec. 2. The Mayor is hereby authorized to grant licenses from time to time, to drivers of such cars, as often as may be necessary, and to suspend and revoke the same whenever he may deem it expedient; and every driver of such car shall, on receiving his license, pay therefor, to the Mayor, for the use of the City, the sum of one dollar, which will entitle every such driver to drive one such car for one year from the date of such license, and every renewal thereof shall be fifty cents, payable in like manner, and for a like purpose, to the Mayor.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of January, A. D. 1886.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons in the military and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
