

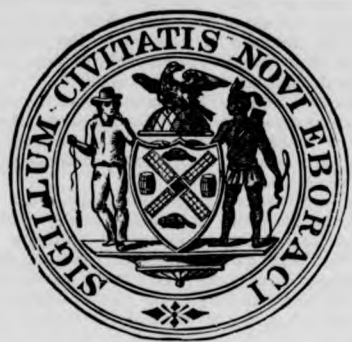

## CITY PRISON.

The inadequacy of the Centre street Prison has been often represented, but the iteration must go on until something is done to remedy the difficulty. There are in the male part 148 cells, of which only 127 are available for occupancy. The average of prisoners confined here is 260; consequently, they are always crowded beyond two in a cell. The cells average 8½x5½ feet. The boys' prison has 13 cells, 8x6 feet, and there is an average of 20 inmates here continually. The female prison has 24 cells, 10½x6½ feet, of which 21 are used for prisoners. The average number of inmates is 65, but there is rarely occasion to place more than two in one cell, as there are three large dormitories on the ground floor which will receive the surplus, when there is any.

But the idea of putting two accused persons together is objectionable and entirely at variance with the generally accepted theories in regard to prison discipline and the reformation of the vicious. It is not merely a question of narrow limits and an unwholesome atmosphere. A dangerous fellowship in crime is likely to be engendered by such associations. Experience has demonstrated that the herding of criminals is the surest way to harden them.

These views had not obtained so extensively a generation ago, when the Egyptian structure in Centre street was erected, as they now prevail. But, independently of that, the city has treble the population now that it had then, so that neither in its present condition, nor with any renovations which ingenuity may devise, will the Tombs gaol properly serve the purpose for which it was designed. Still it can be so altered and rearranged as to come nearer to the standard of humanity and discipline than at present. And certainly any measures which may tend to make our prisons helps instead of hindrances to the reclamation of the erring, are as perfectly in harmony with judicious economy as with enlightened philanthropy.

The consideration of this subject has been long deferred for the reason that the municipal debt has been steadily increasing until it has attained alarming magnitude; besides the experience of taxpayers within the past fifteen years has naturally tended to make the very suggestion of erecting a new edifice, or even of repairing an old one, the occasion for nervous apprehension of prodigious expenditure and reckless waste.

Nevertheless further delay is to be deprecated, as the demand for prompt action is extremely urgent. Plans have been made for the building of an extra tier of cells upon the vacant space between the male prison and the Elm street wall, getting additional light and ventilation largely from skylights in the ceiling. This project derived its inspiration from the recommendations in your inaugural message to the Common Council. After mature deliberation, we unite in the conclusion, that it will be an excellent thing to do. It will double the capacity of that wing of the prison, at an expense inconsiderable in comparison with the advantages which will accrue, and thus obviate in some degree the serious evil of doubling the inmates of cells.

The interior of the prison has been pointed up and painted throughout. The former kitchen has been removed, and a new one substituted opposite the entrance to the male prison. The room formerly used as a kitchen has been removed, and the site is now occupied as a court yard. A wall sixteen feet high has been erected to separate the sexes. In these breathing places all the water conveniences have been supplied. That portion of the building in which petty offenders are confined has been completely renovated.

Considerable more room has been secured by laying a floor, thus making an additional story, for which the height afforded the requisite space. Three large windows have been cut in to increase the light and improve the ventilation below, and three large skylights have been introduced to supply the same needs above. Both apartments are furnished with bunks, troughs, and closets. The boys' prison has also been thoroughly cleansed and painted.

## PENITENTIARY.

There are 905 prisoners in this institution, being a decrease from the last quarter of 91. 781 of these are males, 124 females. The sick list shows an average of 20 males and 6 females. All the rest of both sexes have been kept at labor. Abundant work is found for the women in making and repairing the outer and under clothing for the inmates and making bed-ticks, sheets, pillow-cases, etc. The men who are mechanics are employed at their respective trades: the rest are organized in gangs and set to quarrying, breaking or laying stone, filling in ground, farming and gardening. 2,381 feet of sea wall and 1,708 feet of terrace wall were built during the past quarter. A new granite workshop, 130x35, is in process of erection, the stone for which is supplied from our own quarries, and the labor performed exclusively by the convicts. In addition to the 52 prisoners lodged constantly at Randall's Island a gang of 100 is now daily dispatched thither to work in the quarries.

Most of the smith and carpenter work of the Department is done at the Penitentiary, including the incidental repairs to the numerous wagons, ambulances, trucks and barrows, employed in the service.

All the tillable land upon the four islands, has been put in the course of agricultural production, with the promise of profitable results. Besides the great staples, hay and potatoes, a liberal yield of all kinds of vegetables may be reasonably anticipated.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT,

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH  
of the Health Department, of the City of New York,  
held at its office, on the 16th day of July, 1875, the fol-  
lowing resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That section 29 of the Sanitary Code be and  
is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 29. That no  
meat, fish, birds or fowl, fruit or vegetables, nor any milk,  
not being then healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome, and safe  
for human food, nor any meat or fish that died by disease  
or accident, shall be brought within said city, or offered or  
held for sale in any public or private market, as such food,  
anywhere in said city.

Resolved, That section 34 of the Sanitary Code be and  
is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 34. That no  
decayed or unwholesome fruit or vegetables shall know-  
ingly be brought into said city to be consumed or offered  
for sale for human food, nor shall any such articles be kept  
or stored therein.

Resolved, That section 37 of the Sanitary Code be and  
is hereby amended as follows: Sec. 37. That no meat,  
fish, fruit, vegetables, or milk, or unwholesome liquid,  
shall knowingly be bought, sold, held, offered for sale,  
labeled, or any representation made in respect thereof,  
under a false name or quality, or as being what the same  
is not, as respects wholesomeness, soundness, or safety for  
food or drink.

Resolved, That section 38 of the Sanitary Code be and  
is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 38. That every  
person, being the owner, lessee, or occupant of any room,  
stall, or place where any meat, fish, fruit, or vege-  
tables, designed or held for human food, shall be stored or  
kept, or shall be held or offered for sale, shall put and  
keep such room, stall, and place, and its appurtenances,  
in a cleanly and wholesome condition; and every person  
having charge, or interested, or engaged, whether as  
principal or agent, in the care, or in the custody, or sale  
of any meat, fish, fruit, birds, fowl, or vegetables,  
designed for human food, shall put and preserve the same  
in a cleanly and wholesome condition, and shall not allow  
the same, or any part thereof, to be poisoned, infected, or  
rendered unsafe or unwholesome for human food.

Resolved, That section 40 of the Sanitary Code be and  
is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 40. That it  
shall be the duty of every person knowing of any fish,  
meat, fowl, birds, fruit, or vegetables being bought, sold,  
or offered, or held for sale as food for human beings, or being  
in any market, public or private, in said city, and not being  
sound, healthy, or wholesome for such food, to forthwith  
report such facts, and the particulars relating thereto, to  
this Department, or to one of its officers or inspectors.

Resolved, That section 42 of the Sanitary Code be and  
is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 42. That upon  
any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruit, or vegetables being  
found by any inspector, or other officer of this Department,  
in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome and  
unfit for use as human food, or in a condition of a weight  
or quality in this code condemned or forbidden, he shall  
cause the same to be examined by two reputable persons,  
reasonably competent to judge in respect thereto, whom  
he may conveniently find; and if both said persons dis-  
agree with him in opinion in respect thereto, he shall take  
no action, and give no order, relative to the same, till he  
has been instructed by the Sanitary Superintendent; and  
if one or both of said persons agree with him in respect to  
said articles, then such inspector or officer may forbid  
the same being offered or exposed for sale, or being sold,  
for human food, till the owner or party in charge or other  
proper person has obtained the consent of the Sanitary  
Superintendent, or of this Board, to their being so  
offered, used, or sold. And if both such persons agree  
with him in opinion, he may order the same to be re-  
moved; and thereupon, or if this Board shall have ap-  
proved the judgment of said inspector, it shall be the duty  
of the owner and party in charge to speedily remove such  
article from any market, street, or public place, and not to  
sell or dispose, or offer to sell or dispose thereof for the  
purpose of human food. And in default of such removal,  
and also in case of disobedience to such order, and also in  
all cases where, in his opinion, such articles, by reason of  
their being in a decayed or offensive condition, would, if  
allowed longer to remain, be dangerous to health, the  
same as this Board may provide, may be caused to be re-  
moved by any inspector, police officer, or officer of this  
Department, to some suitable place, at the expense of the  
party who should have removed the same, and the owner  
and party in interest must take notice thereof.

liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and  
all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or  
proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enroll-  
ment notice," requiring them to appear before me this  
year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be an-  
swered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under  
severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of  
exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving  
full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention  
paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed  
to select a convenient season—if application be made in  
time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called  
or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or  
interference permitted. The fines, received from those

It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or  
receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in re-  
lation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make  
any false statement, and every case will be fully prose-  
cuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in re-  
gard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or  
giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and,  
if possible, punished to the full extent of the law.
