The minutes of March 4, 1876, were read and approved.

The officers designated by section 111 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, met at two P. M., Friday, March 17, 1876, in the Mayor's Office.

The minutes of March 13, 1876, were read and approved.

The Chairman presented a communication from the Comptroller, dated March 16, 1876, relative to the publication of a notice concerning a sale of lands and tenements for unpaid assessments, and offered in connection therewith the following resolution for adoption:

Resolved, That the Clerk of Arrears be authorized to publish, under direction of the Comptroller, as provided by section 4, chapter 381, Laws of 1871, twice in each week, for six weeks successively, in the New York World, one of the daily newspapers printed and published in the City of New York, a notice of the sale of lands and tenements for unpaid assessments, made in the month of December, 1874.

The Chairman put the question upon agreeing with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative, as follows:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioner of Public Works.

A communication, dated March 16, 1876, was also received from the Comptroller, relative to bills for printing, stationery, and blank books, presented for payment, which was ordered on file.

In reply thereto, the members of the Board signed a communication, to be transmitted to the Comptroller.

The Counsel to the Corporation offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, By a concurrent vote of the Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation, and Commissioner of Public Works, that, pursuant to provisions of section 111, chapter 335, Laws of 1873; section 19, chapter 757, Laws of 1873; and section 1, chapter 631, Laws of 1875, and deeming it for the best interests of the city, all printing, stationery, and blank books, for the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, shall be done and procured under the direction of the Supervisor of the City Record, without contract, on written approval, in each case, of the Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation, and Commissioner of Public Works, unless otherwise specifically directed by this Board.

The Chairman put the question upon agreeing with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioner of Public Works.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor, City of New York:

SIR—The Board of Aldermen passed, yesterday, an ordinance (G. O. No. 68) directing One Hundred and Seventy-third street to be flagged and a crosswalk laid "across Madison avenue, and along One Hundred and Seventy-third street." The resolution to this effect was introduced in the Board on January 28. I did not then call your attention to it, because Madison avenue was not mentioned, and I supposed that One Hundred and Seventy-third street, in the Twelfth Ward, from Tenth avenue to Kingsbridge road, was intended, particularly as the work was ordered to be done by the Department of Public Works. There is no such street as the one named in the ordinance. The street which is meant to be covered by the ordinance is "Eleventh street, as shown on the map of the Bathgate Farm, by A. Findley, dated December 1, 1850, and filed in the Register's office of Westchester County, on the 6th day of June, 1851."

No assessment could be levied under the ordinance as it now stands.

As regards flagging the street intended, no legal grade exists, and the present surface should be somewhat changed.
