Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 14, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,700, as follows, viz. : I public building, 955 tenement-houses, 62 private dwellings, 14 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 44 stables, I market place, 70 slaughter-houses, I public sewer, 30 fat-rendering establishments, 6 manure dumps, I pier and dock, 15 sunken and vacant lots, I glycerine works, 55 yards, courts, and areas, 73 cellars and basements, 128 waste-pipes and drains, 144 privies and water-closets, 51 streets, guiters, and side-walks, 5 dangerous stairways, 4 dangerous chimneys, I violation of Code, 17 other nuisances, together with 3 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 499.

During the past week 58 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to consignees of 72 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

64 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 19 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 19 houses, 19 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 cases of small-pox were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.
