The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth, Fourceenth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Seventeenth and Twenty-second Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth, Twelfth and Twenty-third Wards. Eleven of the 27 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street and 7 were below Fourteenth street. One case of small-pox was reported from Quarantine.
