To the Commissioner of Docks:

SUBJECT—QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING MARCH 31, 1905

SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision during the quarter ending March 31, 1905.

#### NORTH RIVER.

##### Battery Wall, North River.

The existing platform at this locality used for the landing of excursion steamers having proved inadequate for the purposes a new platform, 20 by 40 feet, was built on both sides of the landing. This work was finished on the 9th of January, 1905.

##### Pier "A," North River.

A contract having been prepared and let for building an additional story on the inshore end of Pier "A" to accommodate the working force of the Department, work has been in progress during the quarter and was completed on the 24th of March. The new story provides a well lighted and up-to-date draughting room for the employees of the Department.

##### Rector Street Section, North River.

On the 16th of December, 1903, the former Commissioner of Docks authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river wall in this vicinity for and at the expense of the owners of the property to be improved. Considerable progress has been made in the work of building the wall proper, and the granite is being set. Pier, old 6, which was within the limits of this section, was removed during a previous quarter, and work of building a new pier in place thereof, to be known as Pier, new 7, has been supervised. A temporary approach to this pier has been constructed from the line of West street.

##### Cedar Street Section, North River.

By action of the Commissioner of Docks of December 10, 1902, a section of the bulkhead or river wall was authorized in the vicinity of Cedar street, extending from the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets northerly to a point 40 feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street. This work includes the removal of the old structures and Piers, old 13 and 14, together with the sheds thereon. The building of the wall along this section has been in progress during the quarter, and it is proposed shortly to begin the erection of Pier, new 11, which is within the lines of the section.

##### Pier, New 27, North River.

An iron shed has been erected on the extension to this pier by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. The work was completed on the 31st of March.

##### Pier, New 28, North River.

An iron shed has been erected on the extension to this pier by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. The work was completed on the 31st of March.

##### Between Piers, New 44 and 45, North River.

Sheds have been constructed along this bulkhead by the Clyde Steamship Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. The work was completed March 31, 1905.

##### Chelsea Section, North River.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. Large property interests in this vicinity have been acquired and extensive work done towards the construction of the wall. Buildings occupying the grounds over several portions of the section have been condemned for the use of this Department, sold at public auction and removed by the purchasers, and preparations are being made for the sale of other buildings along the line of the work. The actual construction of the wall has been pushed as rapidly as possible, and during the quarter 188.96 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made.

Filling is being deposited in the rear of that portion of the wall already completed. The old ferry structures of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company at West Fourteenth street are being removed. The old piers at West Fifteenth and Seventeenth streets are also being removed. A temporary sewer is being built at the foot of West Twentieth street. It having been found advantageous to construct concrete blocks on the line of the work, the necessary platforms and plant were established during a prior quarter and during this quarter the work of fabricating concrete blocks has been carried on.

##### Bloomfield Street Pier, No. 53.

The force of this Department is constructing a new pier at Bloomfield street which will include a portion of the pier formerly existing there.

##### Pier 57, North River.

The work of constructing a pier near the foot of Fifteenth street, begun under Contract No. 874 during a previous quarter, has been in progress.

##### Pier 58, North River.

The work of constructing a new pier near the foot of Seventeenth street to be known as Pier 58, is in progress under Contract No. 875.

##### Asphalting Decks of Piers 60 and 61, and Bloomfield Street Pier, North River.

A contract, No. 886, has been awarded for covering the decks of these piers with asphalt, and work will shortly be begun thereunder.

##### Pier, Thirty-fourth Street, North River.

The outer end of this pier, where damaged by fire, has been repaired by the Bolognesi, Hartfield Company, agents of the Italian Line, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

##### Pier, West Forty-first Street, North River.

A dumping board has been constructed on the inner end of this pier by the Consolidated Gas Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Forty-eighth Street, North River.*

Adjoining the southerly side of this street a coal handling plant has been erected by the D. Grieme Coal Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks, and a foot gangway has been placed thereto.

*West Fifty-ninth Street Section, North River.*

The work being done at this section is in pursuance of a resolution of the Board of Docks dated 27th of June, 1900. During the quarter earth filling has been deposited in rear of the bulkhead wall at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street.

*West Seventy-ninth Street, North River.*

A pier was started to be built at the foot of this street by the force of the Department under Commissioner's Order No. 792. The work was suspended under that order, and the extension of the pier is being built under Bureau Order No. 2139.

*West Ninety-fifth Street, North River.*

In rear of the bulkhead at the foot of this street, Curtis & Blaisdell have been erecting a coal screening plant, and the work was completed on the 28th of March, 1905.

*Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh Streets, North River.*

Coal pockets and coal handling appliances have been erected in this locality by the Weber, Bunke, Lange Coal Company, and the dumping board on the south side of the pier at the foot of Ninety-seventh street has been extended for a distance of 20 feet further outshore by Theresa A. Sheridan under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Clarcmont Section, North River.*

The work at this section is being done under a resolution of the Board of Docks, passed November 16, 1900. During the present quarter work on the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress.

*Pier Foot of One Hundred and Thirty-third Street, North River.*

The dumping board at the inner end of the pier has been extended by James Pilkington under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Between Spuyten Duyvil and Mt. St. Vincent.*

A permit having been granted to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to do the work, the present railroad embankment at this locality is being widened and rip-rap deposited along the line of widening.

*EAST RIVER.*

*Old Slip Section, East River.*

The Commissioner of Docks on the 7th of December, 1904, issued the necessary authorization for the construction of the bulkhead-wall from the northerly side of Pier, new 7, to the westerly side of Burling slip, East river. This stretch of wall is divided into two sections, to be known as the Old Slip section and the Maiden Lane section. The Old Slip section will extend from the northerly or upper end of the Broad street section and run along the established bulkhead-line to a point opposite the southerly line of Wall street. During the present quarter, preparations have been made for the actual work of beginning the wall. The inner portion of the old pier, known as Pier 12, has been removed. This section contemplates the erection of four piers, to be known as Piers 8, 9, 10 and 11, and contracts are in course of preparation for the erection of the same. Test piles have been driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom in preparation of plans for Pier 8.

*Maiden Lane Section, East River.*

By authorization of the Commissioner of Docks, dated 7th of December, 1904, the construction of the bulkhead-wall along this stretch of water-front has been ordered. The work extends from the southerly line of Wall street to about the southerly line of Burling slip. The actual work of constructing the bulkhead-wall on this section has not yet been begun. This section includes Piers, new 12, 13, 14 and 15. Pier, new 12, was built in 1901, and contracts are being prepared and will shortly be let for the construction of Piers, new 13, 14 and 15.

*Fulton Section, East River.*

A section of the bulkhead-wall in this vicinity was authorized by the Board of Docks on the 26th of April, 1901. This resolution was amended by action of the Commissioner of Docks on the 7th of December, 1904. During the quarter the pile platform between Piers, old 22 and 23, was removed to make way for the construction of the wall. This section embraces within its limits Piers, new 16, 17 and 18. Pier, new 16, was built in 1901, and contracts are being prepared and will shortly be let for the construction of Piers 17 and 18.

*Peck Slip Section, East River.*

This section of the bulkhead-wall was authorized by the Commissioner of Docks on the 14th of January, 1903, and the wall was practically completed during the last quarter. During the present quarter coping has been placed and earth filling is being deposited in rear of the wall built. This section includes Piers, new 19 and 20, both of which were completed some time since.

*Pier, New 28, East River.*

Test piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom preparatory to preparing plans and specifications for proposed new Pier 28.

*Shed on Pier 33, East River.*

A contract has been prepared and will shortly be let for making the necessary repairs to the freight shed erected on this pier.

*Pier, Ninth Street, East River.*

It is the purpose of the Department to build a new pier at the foot of this street. During the present quarter the old pier was removed by the force of the Department to make way for the construction of the proposed new pier, and a contract is in course of preparation for the erection of the pier.

*New Bellevue Section, East River.*

It having been found advisable to build a new section of the bulkhead or river wall outshore of the Bellevue section already built, at the request of the authorities of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the Commissioner of Docks authorized the same under Bureau Order No. 1859, and the wall has been practically completed. The coping on the old wall has been removed and portions of it, where found available, placed along the new wall. The work of filling-in in the rear of the wall has been in progress.

*Pier, Thirty-fifth Street, East River.*

A contract, No. 878, has been let for extending and repairing the Pier at the foot of this street, and work will shortly be begun thereunder.

*Pier, Thirty-sixth Street, East River.*

A contract, No. 882, for extending and repairing the Pier at the foot of this street has been entered into and the work contemplated in the contract has been in progress during the quarter.

*Pier, Thirty-seventh Street, East River.*

A contract, No. 889, has been entered into for repairing and extending this Pier and work has been in progress during the quarter.

*East Thirty-eighth Street Section, East River.*

The work at this section has been done under a resolution of the Board of Docks, passed May 4, 1900. The wall at this section has been practically completed for some little time, and during the past quarter earth filling has been placed in rear thereof.

*Pier at East Thirty-ninth Street, East River.*

The construction of the Pier at the foot of this street was practically completed during a previous quarter under Contract No. 856. Some slight work remained to be done, and the actual date of completion of the entire work was the 28th of January, 1905.

*Yorkville Section, East River.*

The Commissioner of Docks by action of 10th of October, 1904, authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river wall between the centre line of East Sixty-

fourth street and the northerly line of East Eighty-first street. This portion of the water front has been divided into two sections, the first known as Yorkville section, extending from the centre line of East Sixty-fourth street to the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street, a distance of 2,648.22 feet. This section embraces the work which is being done under Contract No. 844, entered into during a previous quarter for excavating for a new marginal street between East Sixty-fourth and East Eighty-first streets. Over a portion of the bulkhead wall the foundation area has been cleared of mud, sand, stone, etc., for the purpose of placing the bulkhead wall foundation.

*Blackwell Section, East River.*

By action of the Commissioner of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order No. 2756, the work of improving the water front which was being done under resolution for the East Seventy-fourth street, East Seventy-fifth street and East Seventy-seventh street sections was consolidated and a new section established as Blackwell section, beginning at the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street and extending to the northerly line of East Eighty-first street, a distance of 1,958.03 feet. The foundation area for this wall has been prepared by the removal of mud, gravel, stone, etc., and base blocks have been set. The wall has been practically completed over a portion of this section and granite set in the wall. A portion of the section in the neighborhood of East Seventy-fourth street was practically completed for quite a strip of wall during a previous quarter, and the work at this particular point has been suspended until the wall in the other portion of the section makes a joint with it. Between Seventy-fifth and Seventy-sixth streets, where the wall is ready to receive the same, a fender system is being constructed. Between Seventy-sixth and Seventy-eighth streets rock was excavated and removed from the site of the foundation area under Contract No. 841, this work being completed on the 17th of January, 1905.

*Pier, One Hundred and Second Street, Harlem River.*

The construction of the new pier in this locality has been begun under Contract No. 888, and is in progress. Coping was removed from the bulkhead wall to make way for inner end of the pier.

*Pier, One Hundred and Eighth Street, Harlem River.*

A contract, No. 890, has been awarded for building a new pier at the foot of this street. Work has not yet been begun under the contract.

*Pier, One Hundred and Ninth Street, Harlem River.*

A contract, No. 891, has been awarded for building a new pier at the foot of this street. Work has not yet been begun under the contract.

*MORRIS HEIGHTS.*

A rip-rap stone wall is being constructed in this locality by the Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury & Co., Consolidated, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks. The work was commenced December 15, 1901, and is in progress.

*EASTCHESTER CREEK.*

The Harlem and Port Chester Railroad Company are constructing an embankment along its trestle, on each side of the draw bridge, by the depositing of earth filling, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. This work was commenced 23d of May, 1904, and is in progress.

*Between Two Hundred and First and Two Hundred and Second Streets, Harlem River.*

The Harlem Contracting Company is building a pile platform, with hoisting tower and plant, for handling stone, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. This work was begun 17th of March, 1905, and is in progress.

*MARBLE HILL, GOVERNMENT SHIP CANAL, KINGSBIDGE.*

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is constructing a new roadbed in connection with the Marble Hill cut-off in the vicinity of Kingsbridge, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SEVENTH STREET AND PUTNAM RAILROAD BRIDGE.*

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is constructing a pile and timber trestle at this locality, under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-NINTH STREET, PORT MORRIS.*

At this locality the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is building an electric power station, with concrete bulkhead and filling-in at same, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Also a discharge tunnel is being constructed at the same locality by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

*RIKER'S ISLAND.*

A rip-rap embankment is being built on the easterly side of Riker's Island, under Contract No. 776.

*Between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second Streets, Harlem River.*

The work of laying a new granite pavement in this locality, under Contract No. 866, is in progress.

*BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.*

*Maujer Street.*

The Brooklyn Union Coal Company have erected coal pockets, etc., in the vicinity of this street under permit from the Commissioner of Docks, and the same company have erected coal pockets, etc., between Maujer and Ten Eyck streets, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Both of these pieces of work were finished on the 20th of January, 1905.

*Division Avenue, Wallabout Canal.*

A bulkhead foundation for coal towers and ash pockets and a system of condensing water tunnels south of Division avenue are being constructed by the Transit Development Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Poplar Street.*

The New York Dock Company are building an extension to pier and freight sheds on Pier No. 4, at the foot of Poplar street, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Bridge Street.*

The Jay Street Terminal are building a pier and slip for car floats and transfer bridge in this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Gold Street.*

The Kings County Electric Light and Power Company are rebuilding the bulkhead wall and constructing foundations and intake tunnel in this vicinity, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets.*

Five piers are in course of construction in this locality by the Bush Company, Limited, under permit from the Board of Docks and S. O. No. 21424.

*Between Fortieth and Forty-first Streets.*

The Bush Terminal Company are reconstructing the pier and shed at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

*Pier, Fifty-second Street.*

Under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company are erecting a one-story concrete shed at the above locality.

*Sheepshead Bay, Manhattan Beach.*

Under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks the work of dredging in Sheepshead Bay and depositing of dredged material in rear of the bulkhead wall now in existence in the vicinity of Neptune avenue is being done by the Manhattan Beach Hotel and Land Company.

*BOROUGH OF QUEENS.*

At Lawrence Point the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company are constructing two crib piers with bulkheads. At Flushing creek, on the easterly side, a coal pocket and coal handling tower have been erected by Augustus M. Ryan. At Borden avenue, Long Island City, two shafts are being constructed southerly of Borden avenue in what is known as "Nassau Slip" and staging is being constructed for a distance of about 25

feet around the northerly shaft by the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company. At Flushing street, Long Island City, a suction and blow-off pipes are being placed by the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, and at Third street, Long Island City, a foundation for coal tower and coal handling apparatus is being erected by the Long Island Railroad Company. All this work is being done under permits from the Commissioner of Docks.

#### BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

A number of pieces of work have been done by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries in this Borough. At Port Richmond filling is being placed in rear of a retaining structure which has been built between Bay and Simonson avenue by Edward F. White. This work was begun March 6, 1900, and has been temporarily suspended. At Clifton the two piers owned by Nicholas Muller, between Sylva lane and Sylvester terrace, are being fenced off from public use. At New Brighton a crib bulkhead is being erected by J. B. King & Co., and a four-story elevator on the bulkhead between York and Franklin avenues is being erected by George R. King and Louis W. King. At Mariner's Harbor a dock and building ways are being constructed between Union and Central avenues by the Marine Construction and Dry Dock Company of New York, and a pier is being constructed between Central and Van Pelt avenues by DuBois Sons Company. Near the foot of Van Name street, Mariner's Harbor, the New Jersey Dock and Bridge Building Company are building a crib and close pile bulkhead; a small pier and wooden shed are being erected by the same company near the foot of Van Name avenue. Henry DuBois' Sons Company are constructing a pier and extension thereof out to the pierhead line between Central and Van Pelt avenues. At West New Brighton the pier on the property of Mary A. Bodine is being extended. At Tottenville a pile bulkhead is being constructed in the vicinity of Amboy road and Hopping avenue by A. G. Brown & Sons. At Huguenot Park a bulkhead and runway are being rebuilt by Mrs. Charles F. Newman. At St. George about 200 feet of crib bulkhead and about 300 feet of sheet pile bulkhead are being built on property owned by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company. The same company is extending its pier, known as Pier 1, at St. George, and the same company have kept their property in repair during the quarter. A contract has been prepared and will shortly be let for constructing the St. George terminal of the Staten Island Ferry to be operated under municipal ownership.

#### Pavement on Marginal Street, North and East Rivers.

The asphalt pavement has been repaired at various places along the North and East rivers, where necessary to repair pavement already laid, and a contract, No. 879, has been awarded for the repairing of the wearing surface and binder and the concrete foundations for the asphalt pavement along the North and East rivers, under which contract extensive repairs will shortly be begun.

#### Pavement on East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river water front, as required.

#### Timber Basin, North River.

At the timber basin, timber has been received under Department orders and contracts cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

#### Pile Basin at Sherman's Creek.

The pile basin at Sherman's creek, on the Harlem river, has been maintained in good order and condition.

#### Basin for Storage of Old Material, Brooklyn.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

#### Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department Yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

#### Floating Property.

All of the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary. The force of the Department has been engaged in constructing new deck scows, and the work of building a new deck scow and a new coal scow, under Contract No. 863 is in progress.

#### Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised whether done by the Department or private parties.

#### Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer, weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water fronts of Richmond and Queens is in progress, and bench levels are being run along the water front between North Beach and College Point, in the Borough of Queens.

#### Repairs.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

#### Recreation Structures.

Preparations are being made to place the recreation structures in condition for the coming season, and a contract is being prepared and will shortly be let for making the necessary repairs and painting the structures.

#### City Hospital Coal Dock, Blackwell's Island.

An extension of 25 by 75 feet is being added to this coal dock at the request of the Department of Public Charities. The work is now in progress.

#### New Staten Island Ferry Boats.

On the 10th of June, 1904, a contract was awarded to the Maryland Steel Company of Sparrow's Point, Maryland, for the construction and delivery of five steel screw propelling ferry boats with two two-cylinder compound engines each. Four of these boats are being built at Sparrow's Point, and the fifth boat is being built by the Burlee Dry Dock Company of Staten Island, to whom a portion of the contract was sublet. The work on these boats is being rapidly pushed. "Bronx," launched April 9, 1905.

"Brooklyn," launched April 17, 1905.

"Queens," launched April 17, 1905.

#### Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the waterfront, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 1,799 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements, none. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 69,600 square feet.

The total increase in wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 725 linear feet.

Jesup, President of the American Museum of Natural History, and his associates, for their courtesy in permitting the installation of the Educational Exhibit at the Museum, and in allowing the continuance of the same at that institution until August 1, 1905.

Mr. Lummis moved the reconsideration of so much of the report of the Executive Committee adopted by the Board of Education on December 28, 1904 (see Journal, pages 3035-37), as related to the setting aside for the purposes of the General School Fund of \$100,000 from trust funds for maintenance of training schools.

Adopted.

Amending so much of the report adopted by the Board on December 28, 1904, as requires the application of \$100,000 of the trust funds for the maintenance of training and high schools, to the payment of Teachers' salaries and the other purposes named in said report, so as to make the amount to be applied as aforesaid from the said trust funds \$67,600 instead of \$100,000.

## To the Board of Education:

The Committee on By-Laws and Legislation respectfully reports that it has carefully considered the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools, referred to it by the Board of Education on April 5, 1905 (see Journal, pages 605-606), relative to the confirmation or rejection of certain persons nominated by the Board of Superintendents for appointment as Teachers, all the nominees, with the exception of Sarah A. Currie, being married women. Your Committee has issued to the City Superintendent and the Board of Examiners instructions for their guidance in reference to married women seeking appointment as Teachers, and the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools is accordingly presented to the Board for its action.

Thereupon the President announced for consideration the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools mentioned in the foregoing report.

Mr. Schmitt moved that the persons named in the report of the Committee on Elementary Schools be taken up individually.

The motion was seconded and lost.

Mr. Barrett moved that the Board go into executive session, but the motion was withdrawn on the suggestion that the executive session be postponed until the remainder of the calendar was disposed of.

## Reports of Special Committees.

Mr. Winthrop presented the following:

## To the Board of Education:

Gentlemen—The Committee appointed to investigate the statements made to the effect that a large number of children in the public schools were insufficiently fed, to ascertain the facts and to inquire into the conditions and suggest such remedy not inconsistent with the purpose of public education as might be proper, respectfully reports:

The cause of the appointment of this Committee was a statement made by Mr. Hunter in his work on "Poverty," as follows: "There must be thousands—very likely, between sixty and seventy thousand children—in New York City alone, who often arrive at school hungry and unfitted to do well the work required," and also the interest of the public in this question.

The Committee requested Mr. Hunter to appear before it, and he did so. He stated to your Committee at the outset that he had been misquoted by the press, and what he intended to say in his interview was that it was impossible to tell how many children went to school hungry; he considered that there were between fifty and sixty thousand children underfed so as to handicap them in their school work. In addition to the statements made by Mr. Hunter the following persons interested in charity work in The City of New York appeared before your Committee or submitted reports upon the general subject:

Jennie M. Whitelaw, Robert W. De Forest, Archibald A. Hill, Edward T. Devine, William H. Allen, Alida S. Williams, C. S. Stevenson, L. S. Bainbridge, Marianna Wheeler, Richard H. Derby, M. D., Dr. S. A. Knopf, Herman M. Biggs, Graham Lusk, Dr. Elias G. Brown, and John Spargo.

Reports were also made to your Committee by District Superintendents and various principals of the public schools in the City, certain districts having been selected as being those which, in its opinion, would be most likely to show that children went to school breakfastless or were underfed. The reports made may be summarized as follows:

## I. Reports from Within the Department of Education.

(a) In Districts Nos. 1 and 9, with a school registration of 24,299, Mr. Haaren, the District Superintendent, submitted reports of the principals of the various schools, from which it appears that 164 children were found in the schools of those districts either breakfastless or underfed; but a considerable number of these had had no breakfast because of fear of being late at school or because of lack of appetite. In one school thirty-six children said they had no lunch at noon.

(b) In Districts Nos. 2 and 3, with a school registration of 22,920, Miss Richman, the District Superintendent, reported that the child who comes to school absolutely without breakfast is very exceptional; that many of the people in those districts do not have regular family meals.

(c) In Districts Nos. 4 and 5, with a school registration of 26,188, Mr. Shimer, the District Superintendent, failed to find any evidence that would warrant the wholesale conclusion that the children of our schools are suffering from want of food. His abstract of the reports of principals was to the effect that practically all the children were apparently well fed.

(d) In Districts Nos. 6 and 7, with a school registration of 27,367, Mr. Straubemuller, the District Superintendent, informed your Committee that from reports of the principals only 13 breakfastless children were found in that district, but a number of the children went to school without food because of fear of being late or because they desired none.

(e) In Districts Nos. 10 and 11, with a school registration of 19,426, Mr. Stewart, the District Superintendent, reported that all but one of the nineteen principals of these districts submitted reports after making investigations, and according to his best judgment about twelve children in every ten thousand go to school without proper nourishment, the actual number in detail for the districts aggregating twenty-seven, but as nearly one-half of these were reported from one school out of nineteen schools, it would seem that some allowance should be made for that particular school.

(f) Your Committee has received detailed reports from the principals of several schools, which coincide with those given above as the experience of the District Superintendents.

## II.—Reports From Without the Department of Education.

In addition to the attendance of a number of persons, your Committee received various reports, including one from Dr. Darlington, from officers of institutions and from other persons engaged in charitable work in New York City, which may be briefly summarized as follows:

(1) Dr. Darlington, of the Department of Health, informed your Committee that, in round numbers, 275,000 examinations of school children had been made, and that careful tabulation showed that about three-tenths of one per cent. of the children examined were in an anæmic condition, due to insufficient or improper feeding. In just what proportion the insufficiently nourished were to the improperly fed was a question which the Department had been unable to determine.

(2) A communication from the Secretary of the Society for Improving the Condition of the Poor indicates that in his opinion there was a certain exaggeration in the matter of the number of hungry children attending the schools in The City of New York.

(3) Mr. Devine, Secretary of the Charity Organization Society, in a letter to your Committee, expressed the opinion that there was no evidence of unusual or abnormal destitution due to unemployment or similar causes. Mr. Devine also appeared before your Committee and stated that it was impossible to make any estimate of the number of children that were unfed or underfed, and that in his opinion no one could arrive at the approximate number.

(4) The members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, who visit the poor and are in a good position to know concerning the truth of the statements in reference to underfed children, report that their investigations had failed to verify any such statement, that while in their opinion there are children who go to school hungry, the number is comparatively small, and in the opinion of the Society there is no necessity for any action on the part of the Board of Education to supply food to children.

There were also other communications sent to your Committee by Lena Livanche Rogers, in charge of the Nurses assigned to public schools; Miss Lillian D. Wald, Headworker, Henry Street Settlement; Mr. John Martin, an interested citizen, and formerly a teacher in London; Mr. John Spargo, who assisted Mr. Hunter in his investigations, and Mr. C. E. Stevenson, of the New York State Mission, charitable workers; and it seems from the facts before your Committee that the number of children who go to school breakfastless or are underfed is comparatively small, and that there is no reason for alarm; that underfeeding or lack of nourishment is due more to the fact that food is not properly prepared, or that it is not nourishing, than to poverty.

Your Committee therefore presents the following resolutions for adoption:

Resolved, That this Board finds that the statement that there are about sixty or seventy thousand children who go to school breakfastless or hungry, and are therefore unable to do their school work, is not supported by facts and greatly exaggerated, but it finds that many children do not receive the nourishment, which, according to medical authorities, is most beneficial to their welfare, and this condition, from the information received, seems to be due less to poverty than to the want of knowledge on the part of parents.

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that the subject of the proper nourishment of school children is one which should be investigated by the Commissioner of Health, and that said Commissioner be, and he is hereby requested to investigate the same, and in connection therewith to consult, if he considers it advisable, some of the eminent specialists of the City; and that said Commissioner be further requested to submit his recommendations to the Board of Education at the earliest date convenient to him, before the summer vacation if possible, so that the same may be distributed among the parents of children, for their information, in pamphlet form, under the direction of the Department of Health, in the same manner as the summer corps of physicians of that Department give directions for the feeding of infants.

Resolved, That Principals of public schools be requested to give their special care to the discovery of cases of actual want among their scholars and bring such cases to the attention of the charitable societies of the City, so that the deserving may be helped in their homes without the knowledge of other children in the school.

The report was approved and the resolutions adopted by a unanimous vote.

To the Board of Education:

The undersigned Committee, having been appointed by resolution of the Board of Education for the purpose of investigating the question of securing suitable athletic grounds for the children of the public schools, report as follows:

We have fully investigated the question of athletics, especially in the high schools. We have secured the views of all the Principals of the high schools throughout the City. We find that the condition with regard to athletic grounds is much more serious than we had supposed. The available vacant lands for practice and games is decreasing so rapidly that grounds can now be secured for many of our high schools only at great distances from the schools, and at rentals that are, in many parts of the City, prohibitive. We found that one high school Principal had already taken up with the other high school Principals the question of the possibility of securing a fund of popular contributions for the purchase of a high school athletic field in one of the boroughs. The Principal of the High School of Commerce writes: "The 1,500 boys in this school are practically debarred from anything like general outdoor exercises, beyond that of walking." The Principal of the Stuyvesant High School, Manhattan, says: "No accommodations for dressing or bathing have been provided on the grounds secured, and boys have been obliged to travel in their soiled and steaming uniforms, or to hire a room in some saloon or other building in the vicinity, for the purpose of dressing. Owners of private grounds have taken advantage of the demand for accommodations, and have raised their prices as high as the schools can stand. The inconvenience and expense of these distant grounds have prevented a general interest and participation in athletics in the school." The Principal of the Eastern District High School in Brooklyn reports that, in consequence of the present condition as to grounds, athletic sports have not flourished in his school, and that the securing of proper grounds would result in great benefit to the health of his boys.

We have reached the conclusion that, for the present, four athletic fields should be secured, at least 400 by 600 feet in size, to be located as follows:

1. In the Borough of The Bronx, near the line of the subway for the use of the high schools in The Bronx and northern Manhattan.

2. In the Borough of Richmond, at a point accessible to the new municipal fast ferry service, for the use of the high schools in the Borough of Richmond and lower Manhattan.

3. In the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of high schools of that borough, and located as centrally as possible with respect to the high schools in that borough.

4. In the Borough of Queens, for the use of the high schools in that borough.

We believe that, for the present, these athletic fields should be set apart for the use of the high schools only. Our investigations have led us to the conclusion that we need only ask the City to purchase the grounds, level them, and inclose them with a suitable fence.

Athletic organizations in the high schools themselves, controlled and directed by the high school Principals and such Teachers as may be assigned for that work, with the possible co-operation of the Public Schools Athletic League, will be able to lay out and equip the grounds with suitable tracks and buildings. There will be no necessity of having paid instructors and supervisors to add to the pay-roll of the Board of Education. The Principals assure us that they can provide by voluntary work on the part of the Teachers of the high schools for all necessary supervision of the games. We are also of the opinion that the participation of the students of any given high school should be under the control and direction of the Principal of the school, so that the participation in games may be made an incentive to proper standing in the classes.

We therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to set apart the sum of \$300,000, which we believe will be ample for the purpose; the same to be secured by the sale of Corporate Stock, and we present for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Education recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Board of Aldermen the purchase, grading and fencing of four athletic fields, located respectively in the boroughs of The Bronx, Richmond, Brooklyn and Queens, as more particularly set forth in the accompanying report, to be known as High School Athletic Fields; such grounds to be at least 400 by 600 feet in size. As the only requisite of these fields is that they be conveniently located with respect to transit facilities and of the proper size, we recommend that they be purchased through the Finance Department at private sale, if possible, and that Corporate Stock to the amount of \$300,000 be set apart for this purpose.

On the request of Mr. A. Stern, the report appointing Maurice J. Thompson as Principal of an elementary school in District No. 15, in which a vacancy exists, to which,

upon confirmation, the Board of Superintendents intends to assign him, to take effect from commencement of service subsequent to date of confirmation, was laid over for consideration at the next meeting of the Board.

Mr. Adams asked for and obtained unanimous consent to withdraw from further consideration the report of the Committee on Buildings relative to taking out a blanket policy of insurance of \$1,000,000 on contracts hereafter to be let for new school buildings, etc., which was referred back to said Committee by the Board of Education on April 12, 1905 (see Journal, page 666), together with a communication from the Comptroller suggesting that the custom of requiring contractors to insure buildings while in the course of construction, etc., be abandoned.


