AMENDING THE DISTRICT OF ASSESSMENT FIXED FOR THE PROCEEDING RELATING TO THE ACQUISITION OF TITLE TO LEFFERTS AVENUE, BETWEEN LIBERTY AVENUE AND ROCKAWAY ROAD, BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

(At the meeting of May 13, 1910, this matter was laid over two weeks at the request of the Corporation Counsel.)

The following communication from the Assistant Corporation Counsel in Charge of the Bureau of Street Openings was presented:

DEAR SIR-I beg to acknowledge your letter under date of May 13, 1910, relative to a cession of a portion of Lefferts avenue, of the Borough of Queens, and asking that I advise you on this matter by May 24, 1910, as the copy of the calendar is sent to the printer on that day.

In answer thereto, I beg to say that a complete examination of the titles of the grantors has not been made, but so far it is evident that other deeds will have to be procured before the title will be in shape acceptable to the Corporation Counsel. Therefore I request you to lay this matter over two or three weeks more so that the examination of the title may be completed.

PLANS SHOWING BRIDGES WHICH IT IS PROPOSED TO BUILD TO CARRY THE NEW YORK, WESTCHESTER AND BOSTON RAILWAY OVER BRADY AVENUE AND MATTHEWS AVENUE, BOGART AVENUE AND COLDEN AVENUE, AND MULLINER AVENUE, IN THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The following communication from the Chief Engineer of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company and report of the Chief Engineer of the Board were presented:

New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, Chief Engineer's Office, New York, May 23, 1910.

Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer, Board of Estimate and Apportionment: DEAR SIR-I am enclosing you herewith a copy of a letter from Mr. Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx, under date of the 23d inst., approving

5912 blueprints of bridges at Brady and Matthews avenues, Bogart and Colden avenues, Mulliner avenue. I also am sending you herewith the following blueprints which have been signed "approved" by Mr. Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx:

Brady and Matthews avenues, drawing No. 167, dated September 18, 1909. Bogart and Colden avenues, drawing No. 169, dated September 25, 1909. Mulliner avenue, drawing No. 171, dated September 27, 1909.

The approval of these plans by the Borough President removes the objections contained in your letter of recent date

We will be very glad if you will have these bridge plans put upon the calendar this week for approval.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Office of the Chief Engineer, May 24, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR-Under date of May 23, 1910, through its Chief Engineer, Mr. J. L. Crider, the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company has, in conformity with the provisions of paragraph 10, section 2, Article III. of the agreement of June 24, 1904, between The City of New York and the New York Westchester and Boston Railway Company, transmitted for the consideration of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment general drawings showing the bridges proposed for carrying the railroad over the following streets in the Borough of The Bronx:

Brady avenue and Matthews avenue, Bogart avenue and Colden avenue, Mulliner avenue.

The plans indicate that plate girder bridges of the half-through type with a minimum clearance of 16 feet above the street level are to be provided at these crossings. The floor system will in each case be a solid steel trough filled with concrete and waterproofed. The abutments will be constructed of concrete and will be built within the railroad right-of-way outside of the street area. The general dimensions and characteristics of the bridges are as follows:

Brady Avenue and Matthews Avenue.

The railroad here crosses these streets diagonally at their intersection, making an angle of about 45 degrees with each. Intermediate column supports will be provided inside of the curb lines and at about the middle of the extreme outside girders. Marginal streets have been laid out adjoining the railroad right-of-way at this point, and it seems reasonable to suppose that the latter columns will not in any way interfere with the free use of the streets by the public. The width, centre to centre, of outside girders is 64 feet and the average length of the bridge is about 130 feet.

Bogart Avenue and Colden Avenue.

The railroad here crosses these streets at their intersection, making an angle of approximately 45 degrees with the former and of about 80 degrees with the latter. Intermediate column supports will be provided inside of the curb lines and in the roadway halfway between these, the distance between curbs being too great to permit of the use of a single span. The bridge will have a width of 64 feet from centre to centre of outside girders and a length on the centre line of about 160 feet.

Mulliner Avenue.

The railroad crosses this street at an angle of about 45 degrees. Intermediate column supports will be provided inside of the curb lines. The width, centre to centre, of outside girders is 64 feet and the length of the bridge is about 90 feet.

The drawings indicate that the bridges will be built in accordance with the best modern practice and that the elevations proposed conform in all particulars with those heretofore established for the railroad and for the streets.

The Borough President has signified his approval of the plans and I can see no reason why they should not be accepted by the Board, favorable action being recommended.

PROVISION IN CONTRACTS FOR SHEET ASPHALT AND ASPHALT BLOCK PAVEMENTS FOR THE RETENTION OF 8 PER CENT, OF THE COST OF THE WORK AS A GUARANTEE FOR

The following report was presented:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Office of the Chief Engineer, May 24, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Appor-

SIR-On behalf of the committee appointed by the Board to report upon the standardization of contracts and specifications for highway work, and by authority of the said committee, I beg to suggest that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the adoption of a resolution authorizing the retention of certain percentages on contracts for asphalt and asphalt block pavements in all Boroughs.

On June 26, 1908 (see page 2689 of the Financial Minutes of that date), the Board recommended to the Board of Aldermen that it authorize the President of the Borough of Manhattan to provide in contracts for sheet asphalt and asphalt block pavements for the retention of 8 per cent. of the cost of the work as a guarantee for the necessary maintenance, the money so retained to be payable in equal installments at the end of the second, third, fourth and fifth years, this, of course, being applicable to contracts containing a guarantee for maintenance for five years. When the Board of Estimate and Apportionment took this action it had before it two different suggestions, one being the retention of 8 per cent. of the contract price, as above described and the other being the provision annually of a certain sum, estimated to be \$15.000. for the Borough of Manhattan, from which the expense of repairs of pavements under guarantee could be met in case the contractor failed to live up to the obligations imposed by his contract for maintenance during the guarantee period. That some provision for promptly making such repairs is necessary is quite apparent, the President of the Borough of Manhattan having been very seriously embarrassed where the contractor has failed to make the repairs called for by his guarantee and where no funds were available for the purpose. Whether the Board ultimately adopts the plan of retaining a certain portion of the money earned, or whether it decides to provide annually a sum from which the expense of such repairs can be met and then recovers the amount so expended through suits brought against the contractors and their sureties, the authority to retain this percentage can be given whether it is availed of or not, and the committee therefore recommends the adoption by the Board of the accompanying resolution.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 422 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, hereby recommends that the Board of Aldermen confer authority upon the Presidents of all Boroughs to provide in contracts for sheet asphalt and asphalt block pavements for the retention on completion of the work of eight per cent. of its cost as a guarantee for repairs, the moneys so retained to be payable on said contracts in equal installments at the end of the second, third, fourth and fifth years, respectively.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Manhattan be and he is hereby authorized and directed to remove or cause to be removed the encumbrances or encroachments aforesaid and to construct the sidewalks on Delancey street, in accordance with the foregoing resolution.

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

## Minutes of Meeting Held Monday, May 2, 1910.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Monday, May 2, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present-President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the non-competitive class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, the Bellevue and Allied Hos-

pitals, etc.," the position of Instructor in Anaesthesia, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Dr. John W. Brannan, President of the Board of Trustees, and Dr. Winford H. Smith, General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, appeared before the Commission in behalf of the proposed amendment. Mr. Albert De Roode, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared and requested that the position be included in the exempt rather than in the non-competitive class, or that the persons to be appointed to the position of Instructor in Anaesthesia be excepted from examination and appointed in the competitive class, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 5 of Rule XII.

After the Commission had gone into regular session the minutes of the meetings

held April 27 and 28 were approved.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the non-competitive class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, the Department of Correction, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, Manhattan and Brocklyn Truant Schools, New York Parental School, Brocklyn Disciplinary Training School, and Classes for the Blind, Department of Education," the fol-

Five instructors in Anaesthesia, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, with compensation not to exceed \$750 per annum, without maintenance.

On motion, it was

After consideration the matter was laid over in order to admit of the furnishing of further proof as to the date of his birth.

Home, of No. 20 Vesey street, New York City, be and they hereby are appointed Examiners for the practical test for the positions of Compositor, Feeder and Pressman, compensation to be at the rate of \$10 per session.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the Departmental Board of Examiners for the position of Monitor arrange an examination for Mr. John J. Reilly, of No. 273 Woodward avenue, Brooklyn, through which to qualify for appointment to that position.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the eligible list of Battalion Chief, Fire Department, resulting from the examination held on December 9, 1909, be and the same hereby is established as of April 25, 1910, the date on which the rating of the papers was com-

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 28, relative to

a communication of Assistant Chief Examiner Conway, with reference to the investigation of experience papers. After consideration, the Commission ruled that the investigation of experience papers was a matter that came within the jurisdiction of the Chief Examiner and that the Chief Examiner should direct such work and designate an Examiner to make the investigations. A report was presented from Mr. James P. Conway. Acting Chief Examiner, dated

April 23, stating that in the examination for female attendant, candidate No. 27 had left the examination without turning in her arithmetic paper, and after she had left the room several sheets worked out in pencil had been found by the Monitor on her desk, and requested instructions as to whether or not the papers should be rated. The matter was laid over, pending the receipt of additional information.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated April 27, forwarding a letter and the examination papers of Joseph Unterweiser, a candidate in the examination for first grade Clerk, who had been disqualified for disobeying the instruction to do his work in black ink. In his letter the candidate stated that he had used David's black ink, and that it had been perfectly black at the time of writing. After consideration of the matter the Commission directed that the papers be rated.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of promotions, dated April 27, relative to the request of the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Bridges, Mr. William H. Sinnott, that an examination be held for promotion from the position of Riveter, Housesmith and Bridge Mechanic to that of Foreman Riveter, at \$1,800 per annum, and recommending that the request be granted in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 17, the examination to be open to all Riveters, Housesmiths and Bridge Mechanics who had served for not less than three years in those positions. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of Promotions, dated April 27, relative to the request of the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, that Thomas J. Lyons, a messenger in the General Administration office, be granted an examination to qualify him for change of title to Clerk of the third grade. It was stated that Mr Lyons had participated in an examination for that position early in the year, but had been disqualified as a result of placing his examination number upon several of his papers. Mr. George A. Voss, attorney, was heard in said matter, and A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, appeared by representative.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the further hearing in said matter was adjourned one week, all the members voting in the affirmative. At 11.15 o'clock a. m., on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Board adjourned.

Submitted herewith are the reports of attendance of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons and their Assistants, at the various hospitals, during the month of April, 1910. Seven special Nurses have been authorized for isolation cases for twenty days' treatment, two of whom are still on duty. Seven special Nurses, for duty in the general wards, for emergency cases, have

been authorized for twelve days' treatment. Your approval is asked for.

He asks for an extension of time, owing to the fact that lack of space in our bins made it impossible for him to deliver coal before that date. Under the circumstances an extension of time was granted him.

The Auditor and Contract Clerk recommends that certain vouchers be transferred from the accounts C. B. H. 11 to C. B. H. 10, in order to bring our books into harmony with the books of the Finance Department. It is recommended that this transfer be requested.

The terrace surrounding Pavilions A and B, and certain portions of the east end of the grounds in front of the administration building, Bellevue Hospital, look very badly, owing to the fact that the soil is sandy, stony, and the grass cannot be made to grow. It is estimated that three or four hundred loads of top soil would be needed to properly cover this area. It is recommended that as soon as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have granted the necessary corporate stock for improving the grounds, that sufficient top soil to properly cover these areas be ordered at once.

It appears that the ambulances from the Flower Hospital are being called by the Police Department for all charity maternity cases in the district from Twenty-third to Eighty-sixth street north, and from Lexington avenue west to the East River. This covers a part of Bellevue Hospital territory, namely, from Twenty-third street to Forty-second street and from Lexington avenue west to the East River. In view of the fact that the Flower Hospital has a regular ambulance district sufficiently large to tax its facilities under any condition, and in view of the fact that we have provision to properly handle an extensive maternity service in Bellevue Hospital, it is recommended that some action be taken to prevent ambulances from other institutions being called to take cases from within the Bellevue district.

Early in April a complaint was made by a member of the House Staff at Harlem Hospital against the nursing department. This complaint was investigated by the Executive Committee at Harlem, together with the General Medical Superintendent and the General Superintendent of Training Schools. The report of the Executive Committee at Harlem is at hand. There are certain features which it would seem well to investigate still further. It is recommended that the investigation be continued by the Committee of the Month and the General Medical Superintendent.

It is recommended that an advertisement for a public auction be authorized for the sale of the following material:

Twenty-five hundred pounds chicken entrails, 12,000 pounds raw fat, 15.000 pounds grease, 80,000 pounds bones, 10,000 pounds iron, 500 tons of ashes at Fordham Hospital, garbage at Bellevue Hospital, 2,500 incandescent lamps.

The acceptance of a bid for the garbage at Bellevue should depend entirely upon the amount offered, inasmuch as it will be better to burn the garbage unless a sufficient amount is bid to warrant the extra trouble of handling the same.

purposes shall be promptly cooled to a tempera-ture not to exceed 50 degrees Fahrenheit and shall be deemed adulterated for the purposes of this section if the temperature at the time of delivery to the consumer be above said tempera

No person conducting the business of trucking or draying, or engaged in the transportation of conducting the business or draying, or engaged in the transportation of goods or merchandise, or conducting the business of storing food or other products in cold storage buildings, shall be required to have a permit for receiving, holding, transporting or keeping eggs opened from the shell, whether canned, frozen, dried or treated in any other manner, provided that such person shall show to said Board, when required, satisfactory proof of the ownership of such eggs.

No person shall receive, have, hold, sell or

No person shall receive, have, hold, sell or offer for sale, or deliver in the City of New York any eggs broken from the shell, designed for use in manufacturing processes or for tanning, unless the same shall have been denaturized with some denaturant approved by the Board of Health. The cans or receptacles containing eggs broken from the shell designed for use in manufacturing processes or for tanning, shall be plain-ly and indelibly labeled with the words "for manufacturing purposes—denaturized with," to which shall be added the name of the denaturant. The term "denaturized" where used herein as

applied to eggs, means eggs that are broken into receptacles into which has previously been placed a denaturant or denaturants approved by the Board of Health in proportions as may be prescribed and the mixture thus made thoroughly stirred, or which are transferred to receptacles promptly after breaking and on the premises where broken to receptacles into which has previously been placed a denaturant or denaturants approved by the said Board in proportions as may be prescribtd, and the mixture thus made thoroughly stirred.

· No person shall wilfully or intentionally crack or check eggs intended for sale in the shell, the shells of which are whole and sound, with intent to make any false representation in respect to the quality thereof or as being what the same are not, as respects wholesomeness, soundness, or safety for food. Wilful cracking or checking of eggs to be sold in the shell shall be prima facie evidence of intent to deceive.

Every person who shall receive, hold, keep, sell or offer for sale or deliver in the City of New York any eggs known as "Spots" shall keep a record in a manner approved by the Board of Health, of all such "Spot Eggs" received or held by him and the disposition of such eggs.

(a) No person shall receive, hold, keep, sell or offer for sale or deliver, as or for food, or to be used in food, in The City of New York, to be used in tood, in The City of New York, any canned, frozen or dried eggs or eggs broken from the shell which are adulterated or to which has been added any poisonous ingredient or any ingredient which may render such eggs injurious to health, or to which has been added any antiseptic, preservative or foreign substance not evident and not known to the purchaser or consumer, or which shall contain filthy decomconsumer, or which shall contain filthy, decom-posed or putrid animal matter.

(b) No person shall receive, hold, keep, sell

or offer for sale or deliver in The City of New York any eggs known as "spots," except in cases which shall be plainly and indelibly labeled at both ends with the printed words "spot eggs," with block letters at least two inches high and one and one-half inches wide, with no intervening marks or lettering between the words or the letters composing the words, and a record

or the letters composing the words, and a record of such eggs and the disposition thereof shall be kept as required by the rules and regulations of the said Board of Health.

The term "spots" and "spot eggs" when used herein means all unsound eggs, including those affected by moulds, partly decomposed, broken volked, blood ringed or veined, partially hatched sour, or eggs the shells of which are broken or the contents are leaking therefrom. he contents are leaking therefrom.

For the purposes of this section a case of eggs

or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
