MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Wednesday, November 22, 1916, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners.

The President presided.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by transferring from Part I to Part II of the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," the following:

Trained Nurse (Hospital Service), \$900 per annum (with maintenance).
Dr. Charles B. Bacon, Superintendent of the City Hospital, Ella A. Laurence, Acting Superintendent of Cumberland Street Hospital, and Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk in the Department of Public Charities, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held Nov. 1 were approved.

On motion the application of the Commissioner of Public Charities that the Municipal Civil Service Classification be amended by transferring from Part I to Part II of the Non-Competitive Class for his department the position of Trained Nurse (Hospital Service) at a salary not exceeding \$900 per annum with maintenance was denied, and the Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by transferring from Part II to Part I of the Non-Competitive Class of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals the position of Trained Nurse at a salary not to exceed \$900 per annum with maintenance.

Frank J. Murphy of Greenpoint Hospital and Samuel Regenbogen of the Coney Island Hospital, Department of Public Charities, appeared in connection with their declarations of appointment from the promotion list of Storekeeper, Institutions (Brooklyn and Queens), certified to the Commissioner of Public Charities on Nov. 2, 1916, from which to fill a vacancy in the Kings County Hospital. The Secretary was instructed to record the candidates on the promotion list as having declined the promotions on account of temporary inability and the Secretary was instructed to certify the promotion list of Storekeeper, General Administration, Department of Public Charities, as an appropriate list from which to fill the vacancy in the Kings County Hospital.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

Resolved, that the requests of the following-named candidates that their names be restored to the eligible lists specified be and the same hereby are denied: Joseph A. Nealon, 974 Home st., Bronx, Patrolman; Benjamin A. Moore, 353 E. 18th st., Manhattan, Fireman.

Abraham Marker, a candidate on the eligible list of Temporary Clerk, Preferred, and several other candidates on that list appeared in connection with a protest, dated Nov. 20 and signed by himself and 23 others, against the appointment by the Board of Elections for temporary service as clerks of persons not taken from the lists of Temporary Clerk. Edward F. Boyle, President of the Board of Elections, also appeared before the Commission in connection with the matter. It appearing that the appointments referred to were emergency appointments under Clause 4 of Rule XII, the protest was dismissed.

Thurley Chesley, 298 Grand ave., L. I. City, an applicant for the position of Mechanic (Elevator), and Peter Astransky and John McCormack, employees of the Municipal Building, appeared, as directed. Joseph V. McCormack, an applicant for the position of Mechanic (Elevator), failed to appear as directed and the Secretary was instructed to summon him to appear at the next regular meeting to show cause why his application for the position of Mechanic (Elevator) should not be rejected and his name placed upon the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City Service.

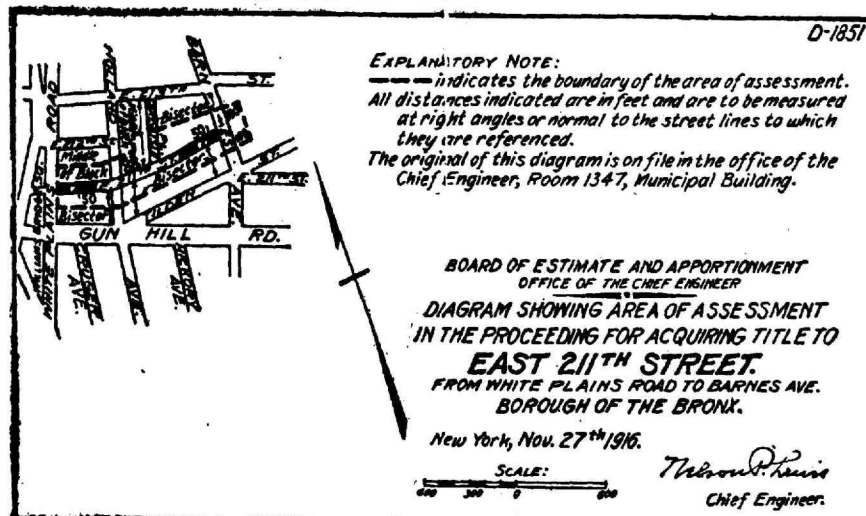

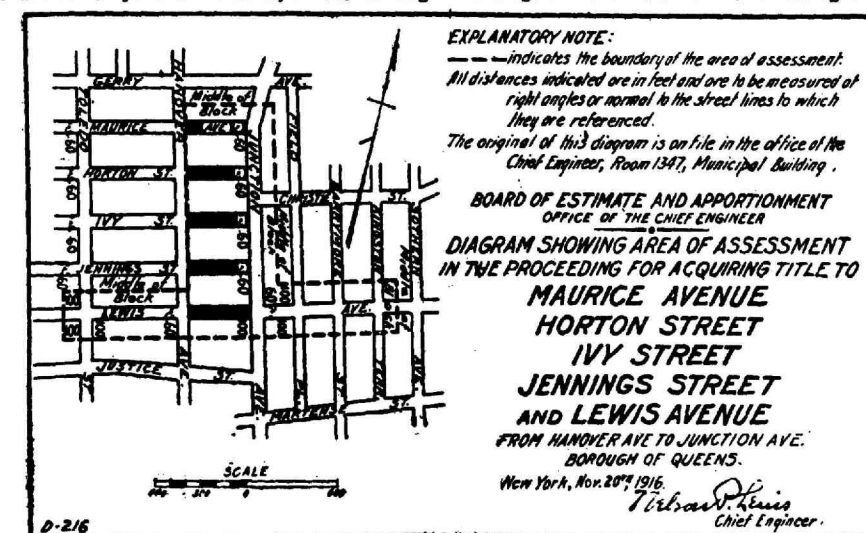

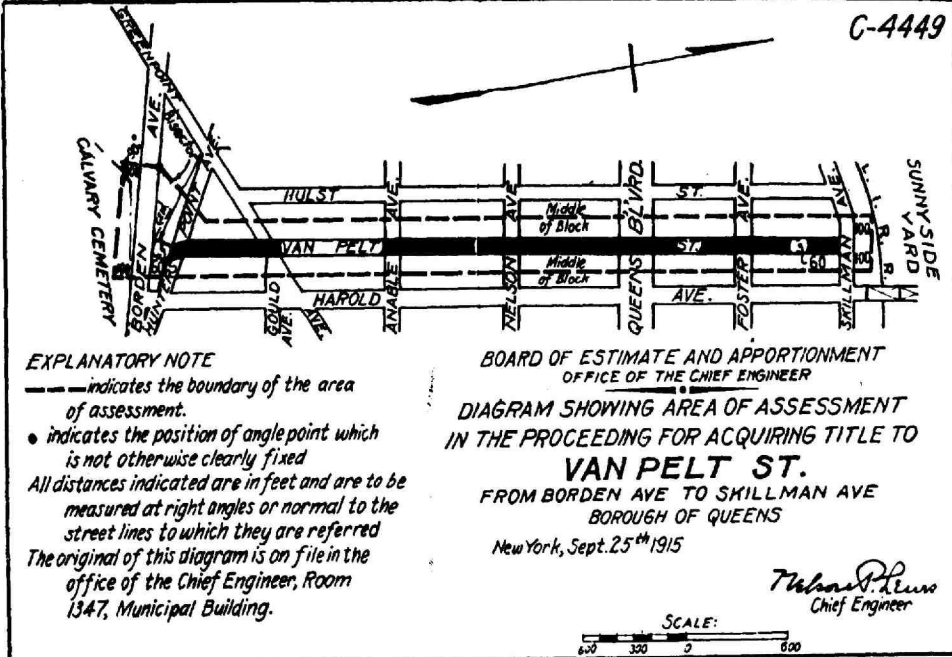

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he claim any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, endorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion, fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
