MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, November 22, 1916, at 10.30 o'Clock A. M. .

Present-Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners.

The President presided.









No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na-tional banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the approve to the security required in the advertisement to the security required in the security requir tisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of

of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality

of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids

or estimates in addition to inserting the same for

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City. a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurted by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
