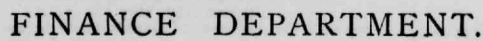

GAS COMMISSION.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Officers designated by section 1 of chapter 478 of the Laws of 1879, to contract for lighting the streets, avenues, piers, parks, and places of the City.

MARCH 13, 1882.

The officers designated in section 1 of chapter 478 of the Laws of 1879, met in the office of the Mayor, at 1 o'clock and 10 minutes P. M. of Monday, March 13, 1882.

All were present, viz.:

Hon. Wm. R. Grace, Mayor; Hon. Allan Campbell, Comptroller, and Hon. Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works.

The Commissioner of Public Works stated that the existing contracts for lighting the public lamps of the city would expire on the 30th of April next, and he submitted a form of contract for the year commencing May 1, 1882, and ending April 30, 1883, and moved that the same be adopted.

In compliance with the resolution adopted on the 27th instant, directing the Secretary to examine and report upon the several proposals received on said date, I respectfully submit the following report:

First—As to gas-lamps.

The New York Gas-light Company propose to light (by gas of not less than 18 candle-power) all the lamps situated in that part of the city lying south of the centre line of Grand street at \$17.50 each per annum, and was the only bidder for gas lamps.

The Manhattan Gas-light Company propose to light (by gas of not less than 16 candle-power) all the lamps situated between the centre line of Grand street and the centre line of Thirty-fourth street, except the lamps on the parks and squares in said district, at \$17.50 each per annum, and was the only bidder for gas-lamps.

The Metropolitan Gas-light Company propose to light (by gas of from 20 to 23 candle-power) all the lamps situated on certain streets and parts of streets and places, between the centre line of Thirty-fourth street and the centre line of Seventy-ninth street, as shown on a map attached to its proposal, at \$17.50 each per annum, and was the only bidder for gas-lamps.

The New York Mutual Gas-light Company propose to light (by gas of not less than 20 candle-power) all the lamps situated on several streets and parts of streets between Thirty-fourth and Seventy-ninth streets, and for the lamps on the parks and squares between Grand and Thirty-fourth streets, as designated on a schedule attached to its proposal, at \$17.50 each per annum, and was the only bidder for gas-lamps.

The other bid of the Brush Company was for lighting the High Bridge and its approaches by from sixteen to thirty-two electric lights, more or less, at \$1.00 each lamp per night, the city furnishing the steam, or \$1.50 each lamp if steam is furnished by the company. On this bridge and its approaches are 24 gas lamps bid for by the Harlem Gas-light Company at \$19.50 each per year.

In the new bid the company reduce the number of lamps now on Broadway by five, which would make the total number of lamps in present district 70, against 434 gas lamps displaced, or 1 electric light to 6 1-5 gas lamps.

It will be seen that the Brush Company propose to call the 6 lamps in Union park equivalent to 16 lamps, and the same with the 6 lamps in Madison park. That is to say, that for the 6 lamps in Union park they will charge for 16 lamps, and for the 6 in Madison park they will also charge for 16. Now, 12 street lamps on each of these parks will light these places in a very much better manner than the same are now lighted by the mast, and will displace a greater number of gas lamps than are now displaced by the lamps on the masts.

The bid from the Automatic Gas-lamp and Lighting, was for lighting lamps in Central Park by naphtha gas (that is to say, by means of naphtha contained in a tank or reservoir placed on the lantern), at \$27 each per year.

There are 63 of these lamps now in Central Park which were erected by this company under a resolution of the Department of Parks, giving it permission so to do, providing the lamps were erected and lighted without expense to said Department.

The Department of Parks has not advised nor requested the Gas Commission or the Commissioner of Public Works to have these lamps lighted.
