From East River Ferry Company—In reference to collision between the ferryboat "Flushing" and the tug "Manhattan."

From Engineer-in-Chief:

Brown, referees, against the city, as to the value of certain wharf property on the North river, taken or appropriated by the Department in connection with the building of wharves and bulkheads under the new plan of improvement.

2d. In reference to the obligations of the sureties to the lease of the East River Ferry Company for north and south half and outer end of Pier at Thirty-third street, East river in the event of the Department assigning said lease to the Metropolitan Ferry Company.

From Comptroller of the City:

1st. Inclosing extract from proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of June 17, 1887, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, At a meeting of the Commissioners of Docks, held October 8, 1886, a resolution was adopted directing a notice to be given of the desire of the Department of Docks to terminate a lease to James D. Wynkoop of certain wharf property on the North river, and the payment to him of one thousand dollars, and a requisition was made upon the Comptroller by the Commissioners of Docks on December 9, 1886, for that amount in favor of said Wynkoop; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held March 4, 1887, adopted a resolution approving of said resolution of the Commissioners of Docks, and the payment to said Wynkoop of the sum of one thousand dollars accordingly; and

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board March 4, 1887, approving of the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of Docks, October 8, 1886, and of the payment to said Wynkoop of the sum of one thousand dollars, is hereby rescinded, and the payment of the sum of five hundred dollars in lieu thereof under said agreement is hereby concurred in and approved.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

- Resolved, That the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning and the Barney Dumping Company be and hereby are notified and informed that this Department orders and directs that the westerly side of Pier 12, East river, be used only for the removal of street cleaning dirt, ashes, etc., and that it shall not be used for the loading of cellar dirt and old building material.

- The application of George V. Hecker & Co., requesting permission to remove the injection-pipe running under Pier 40, and place same under Pier 41, East river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

- Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to George V. Hecker & Co. to remove ten-inch iron pipe, now under the deck of Pier 40, East river, and place the same under the deck of Pier 41, East river, in order to take water from the river for the uses and purposes of the Croton Mills in Cherry street, provided that the work be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and that the said pipe be removed when so ordered by this Board or its successor free of cost and expense to the Corporation.

This matter having been called and proceeded with in its regular order, Thomas E. Rochfort appeared before the Board, as attorney on behalf of Frank Phelps, lessee of said Pier 40, East river, in answer to a resolution and order in this matter, dated June 22, 1887, and duly served upon said Phelps June 27, 1887, requiring him, the said Phelps, among other things, to show cause why certain designated repairs to said pier should not be made by him and why his lease of said pier should not be forfeited and annulled by reason of his failure and neglect to make such repairs as ordered and required by this Board.

The attorney for Mr. Phelps claims that his client was not liable to make the repairs as ordered. The Board insisted and do insist, among other things, that by the terms and conditions of notice of sale, the agreement for lease, the lease itself, the provisions of the statute in such cases, and under all the circumstances connected with the transaction, Mr. Phelps is legally and equitably bound to make the repairs to said pier as ordered.

After considerable discussion the counsel for Mr. Phelps conceded that his client ought to bear the expense of the repairs in part but not all. The matter was then, on motion, adjourned to Friday, July 8, 1887, at 12 o'clock noon, for further consideration.

A communication was received from The New York Horse Manure Company stating that repairs are being made to Pier, at Forty-fourth street, North river. A. M. Graham, President Equitable Gas-light Company and the Long Island Land Fertilizing Company agreed to communicate with the Board in reference to the subject.

On motion, further consideration of the subject was adjourned to Friday, July 8, 1887, at 12 o'clock, noon. On motion, the Board adjourned.

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential

to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
