Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 133 were in institutions, 442 in tenementhouses, 146 in houses containing three families or less, 1 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 133 on the first, 167 on the second, 143 on the third, 90 on the fourth, 43 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 731 were stated to be residents of New York City and 5 non-residents; 114 were stated to be single, 145 married, 85 widowed, and the condition of 392 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz. : City deaths, 736; still-births, 64; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and stillbirths, 73 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 8 births, 12 marriages, o stillbirths, 75 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 116 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 12 of marriage and 75 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 21, 1886, was 66.9 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 30.014; the mean humidity was 80, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 947, and the total amount of rain-fall was .03 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.


