Whereas, The completion of Bartholdi's great work of art, the statue of "Liberty Enlightening the World," is to be celebrated by the People and Government of the United States, on Thursday, the 28th instant; and

Whereas, In the ceremonies incident to the unveiling of the statue, M. Bartholdi and many of his illustrious countrymen will participate as the guests of the Republic, and will for the time being be residents of this city; and

Whereas, It is eminently proper that the spirit of amity that prompted the gift of the statue from the People of France to the People of this Republic, should receive all due appreciation, and in an especial manner, from the People and Government of the City of New York, as the statue has been permanently located on one of the islands in our harbor, and every opportunity given by which the fraternal sentiments of the People of France may be reciprocated and our estimate of the value of the international gift be manifested, should be taken advantage of by our citizens; be it therefore

Resolved, That in order to afford all our citizens an opportunity of participating in the celebration of the completion of the statue on Thursday, the 28th instant, it is hereby ordered that the public offices of the Corporation of the City of New York (except those specially by law required to be kept open) be closed and no public business be transacted therein on that day; that our citizens be and are hereby urgently requested to close their respective places of business and refrain from all secular employment; that the flag of our Republic, and where possible, the flag of the French Republic, be displayed on all the public buildings, and our own citizens, and all others who may so desire, both on land and water, in order to give éclat to the occasion, be and are hereby requested to display the French and American flags, from sunrise until sunset, on said day, and all the inhabitants of this city are hereby called upon to unite in demonstrating to the People and Government of France, that their friendship and fraternal regard, as manifested in their munificent gift, is fully and duly appreciated and reciprocated by its recipients; and be it further

Resolved, That the Corporation of the City of New York, for its members and the People whom they represent, hereby cordially tenders the freedom of the City of New York to M. Bartholdi, and the hospitalities of the City are hereby also extended to himself and his companions, as a slight testimony of the respect and esteem in which they are held by the People and Government of this City; and his Honor the Mayor, with the Special Committee heretofore appointed, be and are hereby directed to carry into effect the provisions of this resolution.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 16, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,810.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 443.

During the past week 283 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 80 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 10 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 70 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 75 visits were made, and 20 disinfections and 11 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 11.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,963, of which 1,021 were primary and 942 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,855 pounds of meat and 3,000 pounds of pickles, pounds of vegetables.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 17, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 30, the number of arrests made was 1, and the amount of fines imposed was \$5.

The certificates of 604 births, 62 still-births, 283 marriages, and 715 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 16, 1886. This shows a decrease of 18 births, and an increase of 6 still-births, 70 marriages and 82 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885 there was a decrease of 16 births, and an increase of 8 still-births, 52 marriages and 184 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from cerebro-spinal fever decreased 2; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 21; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; apoplexy, 4; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; suicide, 6; while the deaths from measles increased 2; diphtheria, 9; croup, 8; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 6; alcoholism, 5; cancer, 7; bronchitis, 21; pneumonia, 14; heart diseases, 14; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 18; convulsions, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 24; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preterm births, 1; surgical operations, 2; drowning, 6. The number of deaths from scarlatina and cirrhosis and hepatitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 128 were in institutions, 437 in tenement-houses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 136 on the first, 165 on the second, 133 on the third, 90 on the fourth, 38 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 693 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 22 non-residents; 96 were stated to be single, 165 married, 67 widowed, and the condition of 392 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 715; still-births, 62; bodies in transitu, 13; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 72 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 604 births; 283 marriages; 62 still-births; 715 deaths; 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 164 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 79 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 16, 1886, was 59 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.999, the mean humidity was 66, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,244, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.02 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
