## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, Tuesday, July 25, 1905, at 2 p. m.

Present—The Mayor, Deputy and Acting Comptroller Stevenson, Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Cowan, and Chief Engineer Smith.

President Ten Eyck stated that, inasmuch as it had been the custom to elect officers at the first regular meeting of the Commissioners in each year, and that as no formal action thereon had been taken in the past two years, the Commissioners should now proceed to elect new officers.

The Mayor thereupon nominated Commissioner John F. Cowan for President, which was seconded and carried.

The Mayor expressed to the outgoing President his personal and official appreciation of his service in the Commission and for the very pleasant relations that have existed during his incumbency, and moved that the thanks of the Commissioners be extended to the outgoing President, which was carried.

President Cowan then assumed the chair.

On motion of Commissioner Ryan Commissioner John P. Windolph was elected Vice-President.

The President presented the resignation of J. Waldo Smith as Chief Engineer, to take effect July 31, 1905.

The Comptroller moved that the resignation be accepted and that the thanks of the Commissioners be extended to Mr. Smith for the services rendered, which was carried.

Dr. M. S. Gregory, the Acting Superintendent, reported upon the following matters:

A slight mishap on the evening of June 6, 1905, at about 9 o'clock, the insulation of one of the flexible electric light cords having become ignited. On investigation it was found that the flexible cord was wound around the metal gas pipe close to the flame. The heads of the various departments have been warned against allowing these cords to come in contact with pipes, etc., and the Supervising Engineer has been instructed to inspect the institution at least once in two weeks and report any irregularity in this respect. In the absence of the Electrician the electric current supplying the entire institution was unnecessarily turned off, and the Supervising Engineer has therefore been directed to have some one on duty at night who is familiar with the switches and electric appliances so that in a like accident in the future such portion of the current only is turned off as is necessary.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—We beg to call your attention to the condition in which the steam mains have been left on lower Broadway by the sub-contractors employed by the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company.

At various intersections along lower Broadway the steam mains of this company had to be raised and relaid across the tunnel. At the intersection of Wall and Rector streets with Broadway, and of Cortlandt street and Maiden lane with Broadway, new mains were laid by the Degnon Contracting Company and these mains have been in service for approximately two months. Shortly after being put into service both mains developed leaks. At what time the leakage of steam began we do not know, but it finally became so bad that it was necessary for us to see that they were repaired in order to prevent damage to the electric cables in the neighborhood.

On July 15 we notified the contractors of the conditions and asked that they make the necessary repairs. On July 25, this not having received any attention, we proceeded with the repair work which did not prove successful.

At the intersection of Wall street we have made a second attempt to make one of the joints steam tight (the joint having been originally made up by the contractors), but we were unsuccessful in the second attempt.

As stated, we do not know at what time the leakage of steam began, but as it had assumed such proportions inside of six weeks that it became a menace to the other subsurface construction in the neighborhood, we feel that the length of time steam was turned on the mains before the leak showed at the surface was insufficient to be a fair test of the main upon which they should be accepted.

We understand that the contractors generally maintain the mains of the Water Department for approximately one year after they are again put into service, when such mains had to be relaid, due to the operations connected with the tunnel.

We are also advised by the American District Steam Company of Lockport, N. Y., which company does a large business in the laying of steam mains in various cities, that the guarantee in their contracts for maintenance always extends over one year, and that they consider themselves bound to repair any defects due to their construction that occur within a period of three years after the pipes have been put into service.

It is manifestly too short a time, therefore, to consider that a test of two or three weeks is sufficient upon which to base the acceptance of the main. We will therefore ask that the sub-contractors be directed to make the necessary repairs upon these mains at the points mentioned.

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your letter of August 4, inclosing a communication from the New York Steam Company, herewith returned, relative to the leakage of the mains of that company and the responsibility of the sub-contractors for the leakage.

When it first became necessary to move the mains of the Steam Company the Steam Company took advantage of the third paragraph on page 149 of the Rapid Transit contract, which gives the owners of subsurface structures the right to do work on their own mains at the expense of the Rapid Transit contractor. Due to the relatively small force at the disposal of the New York Steam Company, this method of constructing the changes in its lines resulted in serious inconvenience and delay to the Rapid Transit subcontractors, and an arrangement was made between the New York Steam Company and the Rapid Transit contractors which permitted the Degnon Contracting Company to do certain portions of the work of relaying the steam mains, under the direction and supervision of the engineers and inspectors of the New York Steam Company, the Steam Company doing such other work as it desired, as making closures, etc.; the Degnon Contracting Company paying the Steam Company for the material furnished and for the labor actually performed by the Steam Company's employees in construction and inspection. All material used in the relaid lines has been furnished and tested by the New York Steam Company before leaving the shops. In addition, the New York Steam Company insisted upon using welded flanged, instead of screw flanged pipe, on all alterations, the Degnon Contracting Company paying for the new material, and, I am informed, receiving no allowance for the material taken out. The Steam Company has reserved and exercised the right to reject the work done by the Degnon Contracting Company as the work progressed, regardless of the fact that its representatives have been on the ground while the pipe was being placed and connected, and this has resulted in serious delay. The mains as relaid have been in accordance with detailed plans furnished by the Engineer of the Steam Company, and in no case has steam been turned on or off the mains, except by employees of the Steam Company. I have had made a careful and detailed investigation of the circumstances connected with the various leaks which have developed in the relaid lines, and in a majority of the cases the leaks have occurred at joints which were made by employees of the Steam Company.

The Rapid Transit contract does not contain any clause having a direct bearing upon the point raised by Mr. Pendleton, but the fact that the material has all been furnished by the New York Steam Company, after undergoing tests prescribed by it, that the Steam Company has actually executed the work of assembling portions of the lines, and exercised supervision and control over the balance assembled by the Degnon Company, and that the steam has not been turned into the relaid lines, except at the pleasure of the New York Steam Company, in my opinion places the responsibility for any leaks developing in the mains after the steam is once turned into the relaid lines, upon the New York Steam Company, and not upon the Rapid Transit Commission or its contractors.

DEAR SIR—We have examined the letter from the New York Steam Company dated the 3d inst., the report of Mr. Rice, Chief Engineer of the Board, dated the 9th inst., and the reply of the Steam Company, dated the 16th inst., all of which, with the inclosures, are returned to you herewith.

It does not seem to us that any legal questions are involved. The Steam Company complains that the sub-contractors who have been employed in constructing the subway in lower Broadway have left the Company's steam pipes in a leaky condition, and the request is made that these sub-contractors be directed to make necessary repairs at certain points which are specified.

The Rapid Transit Board has nothing to do with the sub-contractors. All it can do is to hold the principal contractor—the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company—to the performance of its contract with the City.

By the terms of this instrument, the contractor agreed to "move, alter, readjust and rebuild" all sub-surface structures, including steam pipes, the work to be done in the most workmanlike manner, with the best materials, and subject to the direction and approval of the Chief Engineer of the Board. Whenever it should become necessary to cut, move, change or reconstruct any steam pipes, etc., the contractor agreed to give at least a week's notice to the owners, and to do the work "to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners of such pipes or other structures." If they so desired, the owners themselves were to be allowed to do the work at the expense of the contractor.

In the present case, the pipes complained of were relaid partly by the New York Steam Company itself, and partly by the Rapid Transit sub-contractors. It does not appear that either the sub-contractors or the principal contractor omitted to do anything which they were requested to do by the Steam Company. On the contrary, the fact

is that the Steam Company constantly directed and supervised the work from beginning to end.

The Steam Company indeed concede that the work was done exactly as directed; but they in effect contend that it is impossible to tell whether a steam pipe has been properly laid until it has been in use for some considerable time. They say that two or three weeks is not a long enough time "upon which to base the acceptance of the main"; and they state that the American District Steam Company, which does a large business in laying steam mains, "consider themselves bound to repair any defects due to their construction that occur within a period of three years after the pipes have been put into service."

Now it is quite plain that the New York Steam Company cannot call upon the Rapid Transit sub-contractors to make good defects in work which the Steam Company did for itself. On the other hand, where the sub-contractors have done the work, their duty is performed if they have completed it "to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners"; and of this fact the Chief Engineer of this Board is made the judge. As Mr. Rice has reported that in his judgment the responsibility for any leaks developing in these particular mains, after the steam is once turned into the relaid lines, rests solely upon the New York Steam Company, we are of the opinion that your Board has no power to require the contractor to make repairs requested by the New York Steam Company.

The Steam Company is not without a remedy. It can make the repairs itself and bring suit, if so advised, to recover the amount of its outlay. We do not see any ground upon which it can be claimed that the City is liable therefor, but if such a claim should ever be made, a sum sufficient to indemnify the City can be retained by the Comptroller, upon the direction of the Board, from the moneys thereafter coming due to the contractor.

We advise that the New York Steam Company be notified that the Board, acting upon the report of its Chief Engineer, declines to give the directions requested in the company's letter of the 3d inst.

SIR—Replying to your letter of July 29, 1905, relative to the condition of street railway tracks and pavement on Lenox avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, it appears from the correspondence that the matter has been brought to the attention both of the street railway company and the subway contractor, and that there is a dispute as to how much work each is obliged to do.

By the provisions of the rapid transit contract the contractor is required to restore the surface of the street to its former condition, and also to properly support the tracks of any street surface railroad. By the provisions of its charter, and section 98 of the Street Railroad Law, the street surface railway operating its cars on the street is required to maintain and repair the pavement between its tracks and for two feet outside thereof.

As neither of these parties appear to be willing to perform their respective obligations, and as The City of New York will be responsible for any damages resulting from the imperfect condition of the surface of the street, tracks and pavement at this point, I am of the opinion the City should act in the matter without further parley or delay, and therefore recommend:

(1) Where you are satisfied the street should be repaved between the tracks without the tracks being realigned, that you at once serve on the street railway company the customary notice to repair the pavement within thirty days, or on their failure to do so the City will do the same at their expense.

(2) Where you are satisfied that to put the street in proper condition of realignment of the tracks is necessary before the repairing of the pavement, you immediately notify both the street railway company and the subway contractor under the rapid transit contract, requiring each to do the work within thirty days, or upon their failure so to do the City will do the same at their expense.

(3) If after such period no action is taken by either of the parties, I recommend that you, without delay, take such steps as are necessary to do the work on behalf of the City, keeping a careful record of the cost and expense, with a view of proving the same in the future in actions against the respective parties.

Care should be taken to obtain proof of the service of the notices referred to; and where the same are addressed to the rapid transit subway contractor, it would be advisable to have the same signed by the Rapid Transit Commissioners, as well as yourself, as they are parties to the subway contract.

This application to your Honorable Board follows as, of course, to obtain the franchise hereby petitioned for in order to exercise and enjoy within the limits of The City of New York the powers and rights stated in your petitioner's certificate of incorporation.

Second—Some of the reasons for this application, among others, are that in consideration of the franchise hereby applied for this company offers to furnish to The City of New York for municipal purposes free telephone service, which it is believed will be fully adequate for all City purposes, together with a percentage of the gross earnings of said company, beginning with four per cent. thereof and thereafter increasing during the term of the desired ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Commonwealth Telephone Company the right and franchise to construct, operate and maintain in, upon and along the streets, highways and public places of The City of New York and the several boroughs thereof, wires, cables and other appliances proper and necessary for the purpose of carrying on a general telephone and telegraph business.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Estimate and Appportionment of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Estimate and Appportionment of The City of New York hereby grants to the Commonwealth Telephone Company the right, franchise and privilege of constructing, operating and maintaining its wires, cables or other electrical conductors, together with the poles, fixtures and other appliances proper and necessary in the telephone business, in said City, through, over, under and along any and all of the streets, avenues, squares, parks and other public places within the limits of The City of New York, for the purpose of conducting a general telephone and telegraph business and for no other purpose; subject, nevertheless, to all the express terms and conditions hereinafter particularly set forth.

Section 2. The franchise hereby granted shall exist and continue for a term of twenty-five years from the date of this ordinance; subject, nevertheless, to a renewal and extension thereof for such further period as may be lawful and authorized by this Board upon a valuation thereof and of the lines and property then owned by the grantee or its successor, such value to be established either by arbitrators to be mutually selected and agreed upon by and between the said grantee or its successor and the municipal authorities of The City of New York, then authorized by law to regulate, grant and determine public franchises, or, in the event of failure or inability to fix and establish such a valuation by arbitration, then same to be fixed either by judicial proceeding or in such manner as may be otherwise provided and established by law. For the purpose of fixing and establishing the valuation of the property and franchises contemplated by this ordinance, together with any extension thereof, within the said City of New York, and also for the purpose of determining the amount of earnings of the grantee hereunder and of fixing the proportion thereof payable to the said City of New York, the books, papers and corporate records of the said grantee shall at all times be open to the full inspection and examination of the Comptroller of The City of New York and of his subordinates thereunto specifically authorized.

Upon the expiration of the franchise hereby granted or of any extension thereof which may be hereafter made, The City of New York shall have the right to acquire for itself all the plant and property of the grantee or its successor in the streets, avenues, highways and public places of The City of New York, upon just compensation, to be established as hereinbefore specified.

Section 3. The rates for telephone service within the said City of New York which may be lawfully charged and collected by the said grantee or its successor are hereby fixed as follows; subject only to modification by the Board of Estimate and Appportionment of The City of New York, but no change in the said rates shall be made within the period of five years from the date of this ordinance:

First—For telephone service contracted or paid for by the message and for toll service between the boroughs of said City:

For a call not exceeding five minutes in duration by connections wholly within any single borough of said City, not exceeding five cents.

For a call not exceeding five minutes in duration by connections between any two boroughs of said City, the boundaries of which are contiguous, not exceeding five cents.

For a call not exceeding five minutes in duration by connections between any two boroughs of said City, the boundaries of which are not contiguous, not exceeding fifteen cents.

For the purpose of defining said boundaries between boroughs of said City all waterways intervening between boroughs shall be regarded as though the same did not exist.

Second—For telephone service contracted or paid for without limit as to number of messages per annum:

For business places within the Borough of Manhattan, not exceeding \$90 per annum.

For business places within the boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, not exceeding \$75 per annum.

For business places within the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, not exceeding \$60 per annum.

For residences within the Borough of Manhattan, not exceeding \$50 per annum.

For residences within the boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, not exceeding \$40 per annum.

For residences within the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, not exceeding \$30 per annum.

Section 4. In consideration of the grant of this franchise, the grantee or its successor shall render service and make payments to the said City of New York as follows:

First—It shall furnish for the exclusive use of said City and of the officers thereof, upon municipal business, free telephone stations connected with its exchanges as follows: In the Borough of Manhattan 300; in the Borough of Brooklyn 200; in the Borough of The Bronx 100; in the Borough of Queens 100; in the Borough of Richmond 50; service at each and all of said stations to be without charge to The City of New York for communications and connections wholly within a single borough of said City; service by connections between stations in different boroughs to be at 50 per cent. of the rates hereinbefore fixed for toll connections between the said boroughs.

Second—The said grantee or its successor shall pay to The City of New York annually, at such date as may be fixed by this Board, a sum equal to 4 per cent. of its gross earnings for business within The City of New York for the first five years of said ordinance; 5 per cent. of its gross earnings for business within The City of New York for the second five years of said ordinance; 6 per cent. of its gross earnings for business within The City of New York for the remaining fifteen years of said ordinance.

Section 5. The said grantee shall construct, operate and maintain its telephone plant within The City of New York, in all respects in accordance with the rules and regulations now or hereafter to be adopted by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity or by other duly authorized municipal authorities of The City of New York having jurisdiction in such matters; and this grant and franchise may not be transferred or assigned, except by and with the consent of the Board of Estimate and Appportionment of the said City.

Section 6. Before this grant and franchise shall take effect the said telephone company shall duly execute under its corporate seal a contract and agreement with the said City of New York whereby the said company shall obligate itself and its successor or successors to all the terms and conditions in respect of rates, service, payments to the City and otherwise hereinbefore set forth, which contract shall be approved by and filed with the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days from the date of this ordinance.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately—and the following resolutions were therupon adopted:
