The assessment list for regulating, grading, paving with asphalt pavement, curbing and recurbings and laying cement sidewalks in Osborn street, between Sutter and Blake avenues, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of March 16, 1905, for further consideration, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by said Board under date of March 27, 1905.

Mr. Moore, of Moore, Ashley & Linton, attorneys, appeared.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and paving with asphalt pavement, Woodruff avenue, between Flatbush avenue and Parade place (together with a list of awards for damages caused by change of grade), and objections of Mary Bacon and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 24, 1905.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections received were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for paving One Hundred and Seventy-first street with asphalt block pavement, from Park avenue to Washington avenue, and with sheet asphalt, from Washington avenue to Crotona Park, and objections of Mrs. S. A. Noyes and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 24, 1905.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Bathgate avenue, from Pelham avenue to East One Hundred and Ninety-first street, and in East One Hundred and Ninety-first street, from Bathgate avenue to Hoffman street, and objections of B. Kelly and others, filed by Joseph I. Berry, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of April 24, 1905.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, recurbings and placing gutters in Butler place, between Plaza street and Sterling place, and objections of Howard C. Conrady and others, filed by Moore, Ashley & Linton, attorneys, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of February 23, 1905, with instructions to transmit the same to the Corporation Counsel, together with the objections filed against the assessment, for a full examination and report of the facts in regard to the matter, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of April 26, 1905, together with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, of April 26, 1905.

Mr. Moore, attorney, appeared and was heard in regard to the excessive cost of the assessment, amounting to \$375 for lot of 25 feet front.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to make a pro rata reduction in the present assessment of 20 per cent., and that the assessment as so reduced be confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

At 11.10 o'clock A. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

## MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Headquarters New York City Fire Department, }  
Friday, December 30, 1904. }

Present—Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery.

Commissioner Montgomery was elected Chairman pro tem.

Inspector Murray, Chief of the Bureau of Combustibles, made a request that: Owing to the danger arising from the use of gasoline in auto vehicles, I would respectfully request that the Commission adopt a resolution prohibiting the storage of gasoline, naphtha or other volatile fluids in the tanks of motor vehicles or power vehicles stored or kept in any building where a license is not in force from the Bureau of Combustibles.

Commissioner Piser offered the following resolution, which was seconded by Commissioner Sherry:

No motor vehicle or other power producing apparatus carrying or supplied by a tank containing any gasoline, naphtha or other volatile inflammable fluid shall be stored or kept in any building where a permit is not in force from the Fire Department authorizing the storage of such vehicles or apparatus in explicit terms.

Laid over.

The Secretary was instructed to confer with the Board of Underwriters in reference to the usage of naphtha in plumbers' pots and for other heating purposes.

The application of the International Provision Company for a supplementary permit authorizing the carrying of 15,000 pounds of saltpetre in excess of the amount already allowed by the Regulations, was brought up and a resolution was presented as follows:

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 13, chapter 2, part 6 of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, the Fire Commissioner is hereby authorized to grant a supplementary permit to the International Provision Company, thereby authorizing said firm to carry an additional quantity of stock in the place and manner specified in their application.

Said resolution was lost.

The vote by which the resolution amending section 46, part 7, was carried June 15, 1904, was reconsidered, and the resolution was taken up for reconsideration. Said resolution was amended to read as follows:

Resolved, that section 46, part 7 of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be amended to read as follows:

(Note.—Words in brackets [ ] are struck out of present regulations, words underscored are from the law, words in caps are new.)

Section 46. [Permits] Licenses may be granted by the Fire Commissioner after survey, authorizing the sale of kerosene oil [at retail upon such premises], provided that no quantity of said oil greater than one barrel shall be stored or kept in any building occupied in any part thereof as a dwelling.

[For stores in buildings which are also occupied as living apartments by not more than one family the permit may be granted for the keeping on hand of not more than five barrels of kerosene oil not exceeding fifty-five gallons each, or their equivalent in smaller approved packages. For stores in buildings which are also occupied as living apartments by more than one family the permit shall authorize the keeping on hand of not more than seventy gallons in barrels or approved packages.]

Sec. 47. For retail [permit] license the Fire Commissioner shall collect a fee of ten dollars. Retail permits for the sale of kerosene oil may be transferred as to place after survey, but are not transferable from one individual to another.

A RETAIL LICENSE WILL BE REQUIRED FOR EACH WAGON FROM WHICH KEROSENE IS VENDED, OR FOR WHICH OR FROM WHICH THE MAIN BUSINESS IS THE DELIVERING OF KEROSENE TO CONSUMERS.

Laid over.

The vote by which the resolution amending section 69, Part II., was passed May 19, 1904, was reconsidered and the same was taken up for consideration, and amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That section 69, Part II., of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 69. Retail dealers may be licensed to carry a stock of black powder and of smokeless powder in such quantities of each, or of both, as the Fire Commissioner may deem fit, but in no case may said license permit the carrying of more than fourteen pounds of black powder and more than one hundred pounds of smokeless powder.

All powder shall be kept outside the walls of the building in a fireproof inclosure, and located to the approval of the Fire Commissioner; or

In a light receptacle properly locked (and on wheels, if weighing more than seventy-five pounds when filled with its full complement of powder), plainly marked POWDER, and located not more than ten feet from and in a clearway from the entrance from the street (no powder to be kept in such receptacle except the same be in metal canisters of a capacity not larger than one pound); or

In a receptacle which can be flooded from the street (located and having water connection approved by the Fire Commissioner).

All receptacles or places where powder is kept shall at all times be kept securely locked, except when actually necessary to obtain access to its contents. On the front of each of such establishments, not more than seven feet above the sidewalk, shall be displayed a sign not less than eighteen inches long and ten inches high, to be approved by the Fire Commissioner, worded "Licensed to Sell Gunpowder."

In no case can black blasting powder, or other blasting ammunition be allowed to be carried for sale or for use except upon the filing of a bond and the issuance of a license therefor, as provided for elsewhere in these regulations.

The vote by which the resolution amending section 15, part 6, was passed June 30, 1904, was reconsidered, and the resolution was taken up for consideration and laid over.

The vote by which the resolution repealing section 78, part 2, was passed was reconsidered.

The resolution was taken up for consideration and amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That section 78, part 2, of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be amended to read as follows:

Section 78. The sale of black sporting powder, excepting to individuals over twenty-one years of age, for personal use in rifles, shotguns or other small arms, to military organizations, licensed individuals, firms engaged in shell loading, licensed manufacturers of fireworks, owners of vessels for saluting purposes or for shipment beyond the limits of the City.

Commission then adjourned to Friday, January 6, 1905.
