The President directed the Clerk to read the call for the special meeting, which is as follows:

Executive Department.

City of New York,
Office of the Mayor.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me by law, I, Patrick F. McGowan, Acting Mayor of The City of New York, do hereby call a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen, to be held in the Aldermanic Chamber, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, on Friday, October 15, 1909, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of presenting the freedom of the City to Dr. Frederick A. Cook.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal of office this 9th day of October, one thousand nine hundred and nine.

The President then appointed the following Committee of two to escort Dr. Cook to the Chamber.

Alderman John F. Walsh, Chairman of the Special Committee on Reception, and Hon. Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Committee returned with Dr. Cook and presented him to the President, who introduced him to the Board.

The President then announced that the first business before the Board would be the presentation to Dr. Cook of a gold medal by the Arctic Club of America, represented by Dr. Stebbins.

Dr. Stebbins presented the medal in the following words:

“In presenting this medal on behalf of the Arctic Club of America we trust that it will call to your mind that your old shipmates and companions of the club have the warmest affection for you.”

The President called on Hon. Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, of which Dr. Cook is a native, to say a few words. His remarks were as follows:

“I want to say, on behalf of the Borough of Brooklyn, and especially on behalf of the immediate neighbors of Dr. Cook, who were brought up with him, and have known him all their lives, some of our most representative citizens in the Borough of Brooklyn, that we congratulate the Board of Aldermen upon taking this action; that we who know him better than anybody else know his record better than anybody else, who have lived longer with him than anybody else, believe absolutely in him, and are proud of this action being taken here to-day. Some of the people of the Borough of Brooklyn, and especially its President, have had a brick or two thrown at them, so a little thing like that don't bother us in the least; it binds us closer to our friends. But this is not only an occasion for the Borough of Brooklyn, it is for the whole City of New York, and this action of to-day comes from The City of New York.

“I congratulate you, Dr. Cook, and I congratulate the Board, and as far as the Borough of Brooklyn is concerned, and I believe the entire City of New York, we are going to stand with you and by you until the end.”

The President then made the following statement:

“The Chair deems it but fair to Dr. Cook to make this statement. Dr. Cook made a request that the Board wait until the proper proofs had arrived, which have been questioned, the Chair understands. The Chair refused to postpone action by this Board, believing that it is the sentiment of the Board, but with that kindness which is characteristic of the doctor, he made the request of the Chair and it is but fair to him and his friends that the Chair makes the statement. The Chair will now ask the Hon. John F. Walsh, the Chairman of the Committee, to carry out the resolution of the Board, and make his report.”

Alderman Walsh reported as follows:

“Mr. President, the Committee appointed by this Board desires to report the following resolutions:

“Whereas, The mystery of the ages has been solved, and the search for the North Pole, that elusive goal of the nations, fraught with deeds of desperate daring, disappointment, disaster, during the past three centuries, has at last been crowned with success by the intrepidity, foresight and marvellous endurance of our fellow-citizen, Frederick A. Cook, M.D., LL.D.:

“Resolved, That in recognition of this most admirable achievement, accomplished on April 21, 1908, which has already been enthusiastically acclaimed in other lands, where honors have been showered on the brave man who first planted the Stars and Stripes on ‘the roof of the world,’ the Aldermen of The City of New York deem it proper to extend to the premier explorer of the twentieth century a public welcome in the form of a reception in the Aldermanic Chamber, which shall be memorable, marking a lofty civic sense of what is due to work well done and as an encouragement to such enterprise in others who may in like manner reflect glory on the City, which is proud of such sons.

“Resolved, That as a further mark of distinction and as a lasting token of our admiration for and pride in this scion of the Empire City, at the reception to be accorded him as herein determined, the freedom of The City of New York be conferred on Frederick A. Cook, together with a copy of this preamble and resolution, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the autograph signatures of his Honor the Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Aldermen and the City Clerk.”

Laying his hand on the box containing the engrossed preamble and resolutions conferring the freedom of The City of New York on Dr. Cook, handed to him by the City Clerk, Alderman Walsh proceeded as follows:

“I have been instructed by the Committee, Mr. President, to present this token of our admiration of Dr. Cook's work.

"We have gathered this afternoon to honor a citizen of this fair municipality who has become of late, in a large sense, a citizen of the world. What Dr. Frederick A. Cook has achieved must, of necessity, bring a sense of pride to the heart of every American who believes in the pursuit of ideals and absolute defiance of personal danger.

"The quest for the North Pole has for many centuries occupied the time and attention of many great navigators and explorers. Henry Hudson stands foremost among those of olden times. In 1607 the discoverer-to-be of the Hudson River was sent out, by the Muscovy Company, to seek the North Pole. He succeeded in reaching a latitude of 81 degrees 30 minutes. This record remained untouched till 1806, in this century, when Mr. Sconshy, mate of a Greenland whaler, went exactly as far north.

"In 1615, however, an explorer named Fotherly, after several other explorers had attempted to emulate Hudson, corrected some of Hudson's observations. Had he lived in this later day, it might have been surmised, as a result of that fact, that Hudson was a 'faker,' not to use a shorter and uglier word which appears to play an important part in the polar patent controversies of to-day. It is interesting to know, furthermore, that records were generally made by parties of men which would be considered too small to accomplish much to-day, and that the observations were generally taken by one officer. Furthermore, one explorer, two hundred years ago, made use of a sledge which he converted upon occasions into a boat, for the purpose of navigating open leads.

"During the last century polar expeditions were undertaken by men of many nationalities, and the world now looks back with pride to the heroism of Buchan, Franklin, Cook, the first; Clavering, Grabb, de Blossville, Greely, Peary, Fiala, the Duke of Abruzzi, and our own Dr. Cook here, the discoverer of the Pole.

"And right here, in order that no one may have cause to say that the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York decided to dispense the City's greatest honors and highest civic distinction without due consideration and forethought, let me direct attention to the fact that the strongest possible proofs of Dr. Cook's discovery have already been presented.

"Astronomical observations may be faked, from a position far away from any desired point of conquest; and anybody who undertook to tell a fake story about the discovery of the pole would come back with a complete set of astronomical data, tabulated, ready for the printer. The traducers of Dr. Cook first said, before the return of the other explorer who was penetrating the far north, that he could not have travelled as rapidly as he said he did. That story of theirs was exploded when the other explorer returned and reported travelled, for several days, almost twice as rapid. Then they said that Dr. Cook's story was false because Harry Whitney had not reported the discovery of the pole by Dr. Cook, to the other explorer. Mr. Whitney returns corroborates Dr. Cook's statement that he was told not to tell about Cook's discovery. He says furthermore that the Esquimaux declared that they had been at the pole with Dr. Cook and that they had been later asked to trace something on maps and that they did not know what these maps meant. Yet now the maps are produced for our identification and one learned geographer tells us that the Esquimaux who never went to school and lived in the most primitive fashion, and are experts at map making. Lately, furthermore, we have heard from Canadian sources about Dr. Cook returning almost famished as Mr. Whitney said, and finding his supplies in another house guarded by a man, who believed it was his duty to prevent Dr. Cook of taking possession of what was his own.

"The best proofs of Dr. Cook's conquest, it seems, are to be found in the fact that his statement as to polar conditions on the far north ice-covered sea is practically the same as that presented by the other explorer who returned much later than he did. The slowly drifting ice, the temperature, and the climatic conditions, are nearly alike.

"Under the circumstances, in all fairness to a man who has brought honor to his country, should we not do for him what has been done for other explorers on the presentation of far less evidence: believe him.

"The Bible tells us that the poor are always with us. May I be permitted to suggest that the scoffer and the doubting Thomas are surely omniscient.

"We welcome you back to our wondrous city, a city that has no equal. It is its own parallel. Its citizenship is an epitome of humanity. It is an amalgam of the best blood and brain and brawn of all the best in circulation. And it has been fittingly described as having its motherland.

"On the banks of the Indus; in the fertile valley of the Euphrates; under the shadow of the mighty pyramids, and along the margin of the Nile, in frigid Russia and in sunny Italy and Greece; above the cloud-line in the Swiss Alps, behind the dykes of Holland; over the plains and amid the forests of Germany; far north in the Scandinavian retreats, where rugged nature hardens muscle and nurtures the courage to do and dare, in the highlands of Scotland where Bruce and Wallace led their clans, and Burns sang songs as enduring as Homer's, and Scott waved his wizard wand; in Ireland where the echoes of the voice of O'Connell still lingers in the air reverberating from its mountain sides and crooning through the valleys, persuasive, potential, and the name of Robert Emmet stirs, like a bugle call, everywhere, of every race and every clime and every religion, caste in the alenbic of our American civilization, braved in the mortar of our splendid system of public education, there is in process to perfection the nearest approach to the perfect man, since the omnipotent. One stooping to the earth fashioned a form in which the first man stood before His Creator.

"In the name of such a citizenship as this, Dr. Cook, with its representatives of every clime and every people, the best, cleanest, brightest and alert citizenship on this footstool of God, and in this sense and spirit, I present to you this set of resolutions."

Dr. Cook accepted the resolutions and responded as follows:

"In trying to thank you for the great honor conferred upon me to-day, I feel how poorly mere words can express my high appreciation. I cannot wish for a greater distinction than the freedom of this great City, the City with which I have grown up and of which I am so proud.

"I have attempted many things, and perhaps gained a little, but never have I anticipated such an honor as to-day. This is the proudest moment of my life, and to feel that you have confidence in me, amidst the unfounded statements and against the false affidavits, published during my absence, while I was not here to defend myself, creates a feeling of pride in me, which I cannot express. I will substantiate every claim I have made with every proof within the power of man, and believe me, when I say that this tribute paid me to-day will never be misplaced.

"The charges brought against me relative to my polar trip have been based upon evasive answers by my loyal Eskimo friends. They have been questioned against their will. They have been made to say things which they did not say, and I will guarantee to bring them to you to prove, not the polar questions, but the things which have been said against me.

"Now in accepting the freedom of the City, as the President has stated, I should have preferred to have you wait until I was able to clear the horizon, as I am sure I will be if given time, but since you have insisted, I shall accept the honor with the highest appreciation."

Alderman Walsh moved that the Board do now adjourn.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President declared that the Board stood adjourned sine die.

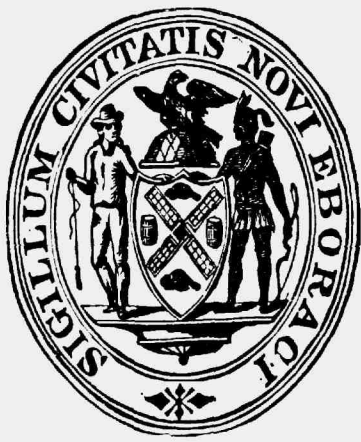

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
