- <u>BIPOC Mental Health Awareness Month Webinar | July 16th:</u> July celebrates Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) Mental Health Awareness Month. In honor of this awareness, the Employee Engagement and Wellness Team hosted an informational webinar and provided resources that can help raise awareness and support for anyone beginning their mental health journey.
- <u>Zumba Fitness Class | August 1st September 12th:</u> The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team, in partnership with WorkWell NYC's program coordinators, hosted a 6-week in person fitness series for a Zumba fitness class that is inspired by Latin and international music and dance moves! Routines incorporate combinations of fast and slow rhythms to improve cardiovascular health.
- International Literacy Day | September 8th: The Department of Environmental Protection's Office of EEO & Diversity hosted a Slam Poetry Event in recognition of International Literacy Day, an annual celebration aimed at raising awareness and highlighting the importance of literacy in empowering individuals, communities, and societies worldwide.

- <u>Pioneers of Change: Shaping the Future Together | October 8th:</u> The Department of Environmental Protection's Office of EEO & Diversity hosted <u>Un Asunto Cultural</u> (A Cultural Affair) in honor of <u>Mes de la Herencia Hispana</u> (Hispanic Heritage Month) to celebrate the history, cultures, and contributions of the Hispanic and Latino communities. The event featured a panel discussion with DEP employees who shared their personal experiences and traditions, along with opening remarks from the Deputy Chief Financial Officer, a PowerPoint presentation highlighting Hispanic Pioneers, followed by food, music, and dance.
- <u>Beyond the Surface: Empowering Invisible Disabilities & Employment | October 9th:</u> The Department of Environmental Protection's Office of EEO & Diversity collaborated with the Bureau of Customer Service during Customer Service Week to host a panel discussion featuring the Director of Programs for NYC: ATWORK and the Assistant Commissioner of Workforce Operations to explore the challenges and opportunities surrounding Invisible Disabilities in the workplace with a key focus on Supporting Employees with Invisible Disabilities and Serving Customers with Invisible Disabilities.
- Mental Wellness and the Holidays Webinar | October 17th: The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team partnered with DEP's Director of Staff Support and Assistance, Jonathan Glotzer, for a discussion on mental health during the holidays.
- Art is Life Behind the Curtain American Sikh Screening and Filmmaker Q&A | October 17th: The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team, in partnership with WorkWell NYC's program coordinators, encouraged DEP

employees to participate in the live screening of the short animated film "American Sikh" which tells the life story of an American-born, turban-wearing Sikh artist and activist, who after a lifetime of facing prejudice, self-doubt and violence, finally finds acceptance in a superhero costume.

- Naloxone Awareness Webinar | October 19th: The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team, in partnership with the Department of Mental Health and Hygiene, hosted a virtual Naloxone Awareness session which involved educating DEP employees on the current opioid epidemic in NYC, signs of overdose, and a demonstration on how to administer naloxone nasal spray.
- <u>CPR Awareness Program | October 23rd & November 20th:</u> The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team, in partnership with the Fire Department of New York, encouraged DEP employees to learn the most effective way to save lives by teaching compression only CPR with automated external defibrillation (AED) usage.
- World Diabetes Day Digital Dance Class | November 14th: The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team, in partnership with WorkWell NYC's program coordinators, encouraged DEP employees to participate in a digital dance class in honor of the World Diabetes Day 2024 theme of "Physical Well-Being".
- <u>The Magic of Gratitude Challenge | December 16th-20th:</u> The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team, in partnership with WorkWell NYC's program coordinators, encouraged DEP employees to participate in a 5-day gratitude challenge that focused on saying thank you and showing gratitude to oneself and others.

- Honoring the Legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.: Leadership, Service, and Equity | January 15th: The Department of Environmental Protection's Office of EEO & Diversity hosted its first event of the New Year with Keynote Speaker Dr. Clayborne Carson. The event aimed to create a reflective space to consider Dr. King's life and

legacy through his impact on civil rights and endure influence on diversity, equity and inclusion. This office also published an article in DEP's weekly newsletter, *Pipeline* on January 22 honoring Dr. King.

• Creating Healthy Habits Webinar | January 28th

The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team, in partnership with WorkWell NYC's program coordinators, encouraged DEP employees to participate in a webinar that explored the fundamentals of habits, including understanding what they are and why they matter, as well as the science behind habit formation.

• <u>Lunar New Year Events | January 29th – February 12th</u>

the Employee Engagement & Wellness Team developed and shared a list of Lunar New Year events happening around NYC to help DEP employees connect with and celebrate the traditions, values, and cultural significance of the holiday.

DEP's Bureau of Information Technology also hosted a luncheon and published a write-up in *Pipeline* honoring Lunar New Year.

• Black History Month Observance | February 3rd, 10th, 17th & 24th

In honor of Black History Month, the Employee Engagement & Wellness Team shared a short article each Monday highlighting key moments, achievements, and contributions in Black history. After each article, we engaged employees with trivia questions to test their knowledge and reinforce what they learned.

Creativity Lounge | February 13th

The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team hosted a special edition of the Free-Range Creativity Lounge, where employees created Perler bead crafts inspired by themes of Black History Month, Lunar New Year, and Valentine's Day.

• <u>The Renaissance | February 25th:</u> The Department of Environmental Protection's Office of EEO & Diversity hosted its second Slam Poetry event in honor of Black History Month to celebrate the powerful voices of Black authors and poets who have shaped literature, culture and history. EEO Team members and guests read heartful poetry and discussed its personal significance to them. This office also published an article in *Pipeline* honoring Black History Month.

• LiveOnNY: Organ Donation Webinar | March 19th

The Employee Engagement and Wellness Team partnered with LiveOnNY, the federally designated organ procurement organization (OPO), to host a webinar exploring how organ donation works, address common myths and misconceptions, and feature a powerful firsthand story from someone directly impacted by organ donation.

• Menstruation Matters: Health, Management, and Support | March 26th

A diverse panel—including bureau hiring managers, HR personnel, an EEO liaison, and EEO representatives—conducts structured interviews where each applicant is asked identical questions and scored to determine the best-qualified candidate for the position. If scores are tied, a second round of interviews is conducted.

3. Describe the role of agency EEO Officer and other EEO staff in the selection of candidates for appointment or promotion (pre- and post-appointment).

DEP's EEO Officer partners with the agency's Human Resources in the hiring/selection process by reviewing applicant resumes and cover letters, ensuring a diverse talent pool, reviewing vacancy announcements, and structured interview questions, and verifying that structured interviews are conducted by a diverse selection panel.

4. Analyzing the impact of layoffs or terminations on racial, gender and age groups.

DEP adheres to the DCAS Layoff Procedure as guidance for any necessary layoffs, terminations, or demotions due to legitimate business or operational reasons.
