DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING DECEMBER 19, 1914.

WILL UNPASTEURIZED SOUR CREAM CARRY TYPHOID INFECTION? A considerable quantity of sour cream is regularly sold among certain classes of people in this city, and the question arose as to the necessity of requiring such cream to be pasteurized. The dealers objected mainly because the pasteurized product is thinner. Moreover, they contended that pasteurization was unnecessary because typhoid bacilli quickly die in sour milk, buttermilk and other sour milk preparations.

In order to decide this question, a series of experiments was recently carried on by Krumwiede and Noble in the Research Laboratory of this Department. They found that typhoid bacilli are gradually killed in sour cream by the acids produced, the rate of destruction being proportional to the degree of acidity and the number of typhoid bacilli present. With a moderate contamination, the typhoid bacilli are killed in about four days; with a heavy contamination or where a small dose of bacilli . originally introduced has had time to multiply, while the cream was still sweet, a longer time may be required.

It is clear that souring does not constitute a sufficient safeguard against infection through cream, and the milk regulations recently adopted by the Board of Health therefore provide for the effective pasteurization of all cream, both sweet and sour.

NEW COURSE OF FREE LECTURES BEGUN.

A course of lectures, arranged by the Bureau of Public Health Education of the Department of Health for clerical workers in the various city departments and designed to describe the work of the Department of Health, was inaugurated on Tuesday, December 22nd, at four p. m., in the Council Chamber, City Hall. The opening lecture was delivered by Professor Jeremiah W. Jenks on the topic "How New York City is Governed."

The work of the Department of Health is so varied and progress in public health work in recent years has been so rapid, that it is difficult for the various employees in the Department of Health to keep informed concerning the activities of the different bureaus. Yet in order to render efficient service both to the department and to the public at large, it is highly important that they not only possess such information but in addition be familiar with progress in medical and sanitary science. With this in view the Bureau of Public Health Education has organized a number of lecture courses constituting, as it were, a school of sanitary science for Health Department em-

Thus far five separate lecture courses have been arranged, one for physicians, two for nurses and two especially for laymen. The lectures are held weekly at four o'clock, the lectures for physicians (Thursdays) and for nurses (Wednesdays) in the Assembly Hall, Hunter College, Park Avenue and 68th street, the lectures for the laity on Tuesdays and Fridays, in Room 514 of the Municipal Building.

A syllabus of the lectures to the physicians and nurses was published in the Weekly Bulletin for October 17th. The following list gives the course now begun for the clerical workers.

AN ADMIRABLE REGULATION TO COPY Among the excellent regulations recently adopted by the Board of Health of Arlington, Mass., is one requiring the provision of a first-aid outfit in shops and factories where machinery is used for manufacturing purposes. In view of the surpassing

importance of prompt sterile dressing of all wounds, this step will have the hearty endorsement of surgeons generally. The section is worded as follows:

Chapter 13. Every person, firm or corporation operating a factory or shop in which machinery is used for any manufacturing purpose, or for any other purpose, except for elevators, or for heating or hoisting apparatus, shall at all times

keep and maintain, free of expense to the employees, a full set of the following articles, the same to be kept in a suitable dustproof case: Adhesive plaster, 1-inch roll and 2-inch roll; bandages, 2 dozen assorted sizes, 1 to 4 inches; absorbent cotton, 1 pound; gauze, 1 package of 10 yards; elastic tourniquet, 24 inches; safety pins, 2 dozen; splint material, 4 whitewood strips, 30 by 4 by 3-16; scissors, straight, 3-inch blade; basin, enamel; tablets, cor. sub. and citric acid, 100; carron oil, 1 quart; aromatic spirits of ammonia, 4 ounces.

On the whole this list appears adequate, although we believe it would be well to omit carron oil and to specify that some of the cotton and gauze be in small, sterile DIPHTHERIA, THIRD QUARTER, 1914.

The accompanying statistical table gives the figures concerning diphthefia during the third quarter of 1914. It will be noted that during the period under consideration in 1914 there was an increase of 794 cases as compared with the same period in 1913—an increase of 33 per cent. The case fatality, however, during this period was lower. This increase in the incidence of the disease is probably only the familiar seasonal fluctuation. fluctuation.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the nar and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered untess, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not

be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate

envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
