

SIR:—In compliance with your instructions, I herewith submit a report of the transactions of this Bureau, for the three months ending this date. In Exhibit A will be found an abstract of all vouchers certified by me during the quarter on account of the appropriations for lamps and gas for the years 1873 and 1874, and for lamps and gas for 23d and 24th wards for year 1874. In Exhibit B will be found a statement showing the amounts paid for gas to the various public markets, offices, &c., and for fitting, repairing and lighting the public lamps, &c., during the quarter on account of the appropriations for 1873 and 1874. In Exhibit C will be found a summary of the appropriation for lamps and gas for 1873, showing an unexpended balance of two thousand and

ixty dollars and fourteen cents (\$2,060 14), with liabilities amounting to forty-eight thousand seven hundred and twenty dollars and seventy-three cents (\$48,720 73). Exhibit D is a summary of the appropriation for lamps and gas for 1874, showing an unexpended balance of seven hundred and forty-four thousand seven hundred and thirty-one dollars and twenty-one cents (\$744,731 21), with liabilities amounting to one hundred and fifty-seven thousand six hundred and thirty-two dollars and sixty-one cents (\$157,632 61). Exhibit E is a summary of the appropriation for lamps and gas for 23d and 24th wards for 1874, showing an unexpended balance of forty-nine thousand nine hundred and forty dollars (\$49,940), with liabilities amounting to thirty thousand one hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-four cents (\$30,192 24).

Hon. George M. Van Nort, Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR: In compliance with your instructions, I herewith submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Streets and Roads for the three months ending March 31, 1874.

Owing to the backwardness of the season, no repairs have been made to any of the roads, except such as were absolutely necessary for their maintenance. The condition of the roads is about the same as indicated in my last quarterly report. Unless the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company is compelled to pave between their tracks on 8th avenue, north of 145th street, it will be very difficult to keep the road in good travelling condition.

The following is a statement of the appropriation for roads and avenues and sprinkling, and the expenditures under the same:

BUREAU OF INCUMBRANCES,

Hon. Geo. M. Van Nort, Commissioner of Public Works:

SIR: In compliance with your request I have the honor to make the following report:

There was received at this Bureau during the month of January, February and March, 1874, 1024 complaints of obstructions and incumbrances on streets and sidewalks; all of which received due and proper attention.

There were issued 238 permits to builders to temporarily place upon the street and sidewalk building materials for the erection or repair of buildings.

20 notices were issued and served upon property owners to repair sidewalks.

9 permits were issued to owners of property to cut down trees in front of their premises.

During the months of January last the booths and stands encumbering the outside of the sidewalk in Vesey street, from Church street to West street, and on West street, from Barclay to Dey street, and on Fulton street, from West street to Washington street, were removed upon order of this Department. A large number of the booths and stands were removed by the owners upon notices, and only a small portion were removed to the Corporation Yard by the Officers of this Bureau.

Since such removals the sidewalk in the vicinity of Washington Market has been kept clear for the benefit of public travel.

On the 30th day of January, 266 notices to remove obstructions from the sidewalk (outside of stoop line) were served upon owners and occupants of stores on 8th avenue, from Abingdon square to 55th street. On February 2d, I proceeded in company with the Officers of this Bureau, and also laborers, carpenters and trucks to remove all incumbrances remaining on the sidewalk (outside the stoop line) aforesaid. Upon arriving in 8th avenue, I found that the notices

to remove, issued from this Department, had been promptly respected, and with one or two exceptions, the obstructions complained of have been removed.

The sidewalk in 8th avenue have since that time been passable, and pedestrians can now pass on either side of said avenue without hindrances or difficulty.

During the month of February and March, 1874, 680 notices were made out and served upon persons obstructing the streets and sidewalks. A large number of complaints are against persons violating the ordinances in Chatham street, Bowery and Grand street, and Catharine street. The obstructions in each of said streets were caused to be removed by the action of this Bureau, and when not removed by the owners were placed upon trucks and carted to the Corporation Yard. The sidewalk in each of said streets are now in passable condition, and few complaints are now received against persons violating the ordinance in the streets aforesaid.

The sidewalk in Nassau street, near Wall street, and in Broad street, from Wall street to Exchange place, were cleared of booths and stands obstructing the sidewalk in the vicinity are now free and unincumbered.

South 5th avenue has been cleared of all trucks, carts, and other vehicles, and those not permitted by the Mayor, were removed to the Corporation Yard.

SIR:—Following is a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Sewers for the three months ending March 31, 1874:

RECEIPTS.

I. The number of permits granted for the making of connections with sewers was 159, and the amount received from the same source and credited to the general fund, \$2,400.

II. The amount received from the sale of sewer pipe, and credited to the street improvement fund, \$8,603 01.

The amount of Surveyors' fees assessable on property benefited, and charged on assessment lists, to be credited to the street improvement fund, \$27,496.

EXPENDITURES.

I. Street Improvement Fund.—The various expenditures under this fund form no part of the expenses of the city, which is reimbursed by the collection of assessments imposed upon the property benefited by the improvement.

Vouchers were transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works amounting to \$407,291 40.

II. Sewers, Repairing and Cleaning.—The expenditures under this head are for the repairing and cleaning of sewers and their appurtenances, which are done by day's work, with the exception of the receiving basins, which are cleaned by contract.

During the period referred to 7,390 feet of sewers, and 2,561 receiving basins were cleaned.

122D STREET—BETWEEN 10TH AVENUE AND RIVERSIDE DRIVE.

There being no material upon the line of the street, the filling required must necessarily be procured from sources outside; so far, the material has been taken from the surplus of 122d street.

Work was commenced thereon January 19, 1874.

2,700 cubic yards of filling has been furnished.
120 " " excavation for sluice has been made.

NEW AVENUE—BETWEEN 8TH AND 9TH AVES., FROM 100TH STREET TO AVE. ST. NICHOLAS.

This improvement is being done by day's work, under an ordinance of the Common Council of December 31, 1873.

Work was commenced on the southerly portion January 17, 1874; on the northerly portion on Feb. 13, 1874, which has been suspended on account of the construction of the sewer, which is being laid by contract.

The principal items of work done are:

600 cubic yards of rock excavation.
4,600 " " earth " "

5,200 " " embankment.
150 " " maintaining wall built.

MAINTENANCE OF THE BOULEVARD, STREETS AND AVENUES NORTH OF 59TH STREET.

The length and square yards of roadway completed and opened is 14 11-100 miles and 627,300 square yards. The force employed at present is 56 men and teams; this force, as the season advances, must necessarily be increased.

FORCE EMPLOYED.

The force employed upon all the works under the direction of this Bureau on January 1, 1874, was 1403 men and teams.

The present force is 1707 men and teams.

The number of men and teams placed upon the work by appointment has been 551 men and teams. The number discharged for inefficiency, neglect of duty, and other causes, has been 137 men and teams. The remainder of the decrease have left the work of their own accord.

By Assistant Alderman Thornell—
An Ordinance to prevent dust from flying during the removal or repair of buildings.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Any person or persons engaged in the demolition or repair of any building or buildings in this City, shall be required to keep the refuse materials thoroughly wet, so as to prevent dust arising therefrom, becoming an annoyance to owners of adjoining property, or to citizens passing through the streets.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Which was laid over.

By Assistant Alderman Thornell—

Whereas, By Section 17, Chapter 335, Laws of the State of New York, being an "Act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873, it is provided that the Common Council shall have power "to prevent encroachments upon, and obstruction to the streets, highways, roads and public places, not including parks, and to authorize and require the Commissioner of Public Works to remove the same, but they shall have no power to authorize the placing or continuing of any encroachment or obstruction upon any street or sidewalk"; and

Whereas, By section 119 of said act, it is also provided that "the ordinances of the Common Council of the City of New York, in force on the first day of April, 1870, and all ordinances passed and adopted since the first day of May 1870, and

in force at the time of the passage of this act, are hereby revived and continued in full force as city ordinances, subject to modification, amendment or repeal by the Common Council of said City"; and,

Whereas, The ordinance entitled "an ordinance to regulate permits for street stands, show cases, signs, stairways, hoistways and deliveries," approved February 24, 1866, has, in its enforcement, proved burdensome and oppressive to the merchants and dealers in this city, and has not only failed to prevent, but has permitted encroachments and obstructions on the streets and sidewalks of the city, which by the act above referred to, the Common Council have no power to authorize; therefore, be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened as follows:

Section 1. No goods, wares, merchandise, stands, show cases, signs, stairways, hoistways or any article (except awnings), shall be placed upon, or placed or suspended over any sidewalk, street, avenue or place in this City beyond the stoop or area line.

Section 2. This ordinance shall not apply to goods, wares or merchandise temporarily placed on any sidewalk for the purpose of receiving or delivering the same; but these shall not be allowed to obstruct the ordinary course of travel.

Section 3. The ordinance entitled "an ordinance to regulate permits for street stands, show cases, signs, stairways, hoistways and deliveries," approved February 24, 1866, is hereby repealed.

Section 4. The Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized and required to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the killing of Dogs in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose, or at large, in any of the streets, lanes, alleys, where not enclosed, highways, parks, piers or public places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, unless the head of every such dog shall be encased in a wire muzzle sufficiently large to cover the head entirely, but so constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to permit the nose of the dog to protrude; the muzzle to be securely fastened around the throat and behind the ears of every such dog, under a penalty of three dollars for each offence, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large.

Sec. 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of Section 1 of this Ordinance; and for that purpose is further authorized and empowered to appoint persons, or direct any person now attached to his office, to capture all such dogs found running abroad, loose or at large, paying for every such dog so captured and delivered at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents, and a like sum shall be paid at the place so designated to any person, whether appointed by the Mayor or not, for the capture and delivery of any and every such dog. Such dogs, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner thereof, or any other person, within a period of 48 hours thereafter shall, within six hours after the expiration of the time, be killed and destroyed in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

Sec. 3. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of this city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said the Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

Sec. 4. All money paid for fines for violation of Section 1 of this Ordinance, and for redemption of dogs as provided in Section 2, shall be retained by the Mayor and applied to the payment of the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, but a statement showing the aggregate amount thus received shall be submitted quarterly to the Comptroller of the City of New York.

Sec. 5. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city, and any person who shall present any such dog and claim payment for the capture thereof which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of this city shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars. This Ordinance shall apply only to any such dogs of the age of six months and upwards.

Sec. 6. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 5th day of May, 1874, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That section 65 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 65. That no offal or butcher's refuse shall be conveyed through any street or avenue of the City of New York between the hours of ten o'clock A. M. and ten o'clock P. M., and that no offal, fat or refuse shall at any time be brought into the city or conveyed over any ferry except in accordance with the terms of a written permit first obtained therefor from this Department, nor shall any such substance be conveyed through any street or avenue unless the same be in tight boxes, barrels or vessels, and covered over so that no odor therefrom shall escape.

Resolved, That section 98 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 98. That no lime, ashes, coal, dry sand, hair, feathers, or other substance that is in a similar manner liable to be blown by the wind, shall be sieved or agitated, or exposed, nor shall any mat, carpet, or cloth, be shaken or beaten, nor any cloth, yarn, garment, or material, or substance, be scoured, cleaned, or hung, nor any business be conducted over, or any rags, damaged merchandise, wet, broken, or leaking casks, barrels or boxes, or broken bales of merchandise or goods be placed, kept or exposed for sale in any street or public place, or where it, or particles therefrom, or set in motion thereby, will pass into any such street or public place, or into any occupied premises. That neither any usual nor any reasonable precaution shall be omitted by any person to prevent fragments or other substances from falling, to the peril of life, or dust and light material flying into any street, place or building, from any building or erection, while the same is being altered, repaired, or demolished, or otherwise.

Resolved, That section 112 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 112. That no pile or deposit of manure, offal, dirt or garbage, nor any accumulation of any offensive or noxious substance, shall be made within the built-up portions of the City of New York, or upon any open space enclosed within any portions thereof, or upon the piers, docks, or bulkheads adjacent thereto, or upon any open grounds near (or upon any vessel or scow other than those to be speedily, and according to the duty of any person, removed, lying at) any such pier, wharf, or bulkhead, except according to a resolution of this Board specially authorizing the same, and a permit obtained from this Department, and according to its regulations. And no person shall contribute to the making of any such accumulations. Nor shall any straw, hay, or other substance which has been used as bedding for animals, be placed or dried upon any street or sidewalk, or roof of any building, nor shall any straw, hay, or other substance, or the contents of any mattress or bed be deposited or burnt; nor shall accumulation thereof be made within two hundred feet of any street, without a permit from this Board.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT,
NEW YORK, April 29, 1874.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 28th day of April, 1874, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law on the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 183. That no person shall place or deposit garbage, rubbish, or liquid substance of any kind in any box, barrel, tub, cart, wagon or any receptacle whatever used for the reception, the holding or the transportation of ashes; nor shall any one put ashes in or upon garbage rubbish or liquid substances, or in any way place together, mix, or have in the same receptacle ashes and garbage in the City of New York.

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 55. That no cattle, swine, pigs or calves shall be driven through the streets or avenues of the City of New York, or any of them, except between the hours of eight in the evening and two hours after sunrise of the next morning; nor shall any sheep be there driven except between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and twelve o'clock, noon, of the next day; nor shall more than twenty cattle, or more than one hundred and fifty hogs, or more than two hundred and fifty sheep or lambs be driven together; and they shall be so driven only through the following street, that is to say: Forty-fifth street, from First to Second avenue; Sixtieth street, from Eighth to Tenth avenue; the transverse road through the Central Park at Seventy-ninth street; Ninety-second street, from Third avenue to Astoria ferry; Ninety-fourth street, from Third to Fifth avenue; One Hundred and Tenth street, from Second to Eighth avenue; One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from Eighth avenue to Manhattan street; First and Second avenues, in their entire lengths north of Fortieth street; Third avenue, between Ninety-second street and One Hundred and Tenth street; Fifth avenue, between Seventy-ninth street and One Hundred and Tenth street; Eighth avenue, from Sixtieth street to McComb's Dam Road; in its entire length; Tenth avenue, from Fortieth street to Sixtieth street; Harlem lane, from the intersection of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Eighth avenue to the intersection of One Hundred and Tenth street and Sixth avenue; Eleventh avenue, from Forty-second street to Forty-ninth street; Fortieth and Forty-first streets, from the Hudson river to Tenth avenue; and Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets, between Hudson river and Eleventh avenue. After the first day of June, 1874, no cattle, sheep, swine, pigs, or calves shall be driven across the city between the 10th and 2d avenues, south of 70th street.

It shall not be lawful to drive cattle, sheep, pigs, swine, or calves through any street or avenue south of Fortieth street, nor to slaughter any cattle, sheep, pigs, swine, or calves south of said street; nor shall any such cattle, sheep, swine, pigs, or calves be allowed to pass upon or across any sidewalk, or to remain in the streets or avenues, except when being driven in accordance with this Sanitary Code.

Cattle arriving in the City of New York by cars or boats may be driven in accordance with this Code from the place of unloading, being north of Thirty-ninth st., to any existing cattle yard, through the streets and avenues designated, without limit as to number, provided they are accompanied by one attendant, if composed of twenty or any less number of head; by two attendants for more than twenty and less than fifty head; by three attendants for more than fifty and less than one hundred head; and by one attendant for every additional forty head above one hundred.

Such cattle and sheep as shall arrive within the Twenty-second and Thirtieth Police Precinct, as established by the Board of Police, by conveyances that, according to time-tables, should have arrived in season to be driven in conformity to this Code, but the actual arrival of which cattle or sheep has been delayed, without the wrongful act of the owners of the same (or of their agents), may be driven upon the routes herein before designated, when they shall arrive, to any established yards above Fortieth street, upon obtaining a written permit for driving the same (out of the hours fixed by this Code, but otherwise in conformity thereto), at the police station-houses in said precincts respectively, under such regulations as the police authorities may provide.
