Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the owners of the block known as West Thirteenth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, to repave said street with trap-block pavement, the same to be done at their own expense, under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Whereas, It is unquestionably the duty of the authorities to keep open, for the uses of our citizens and strangers, the public parks and places in the city, during all seasonable hours of the day and night, and especially so in the evening during the summer nights, when they are resorted to by the workingmen and their families, to enjoy relaxation and rest after the labors of the day; and

Whereas, It has been and is now the custom of the Department of Public Parks, who are by law intrusted with the management and control of such public places, to close and lock the gates of Reservoir square, at seven o'clock every evening, thereby depriving those of our people who labor every day, and who need the use thereof the most, of the opportunity of obtaining the benefits and enjoyment of visiting the said square after their daily toil; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks be and is hereby required and directed to keep Reservoir square open until 12 P. M. every night, and properly light the same, from the first of May to the first of November in each year, and until 9 P. M. during the other months of the year.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, June 6, 1877.

The Board of Education held a stated session, at the Hall of the Board, on Wednesday afternoon, June 6, at 4 o'clock, P. M.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioner Baker, Beardslee, Bell, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Jelliffe, Kelly, Traud, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, Wickham, and Wilkins—18.

Absent—Commissioners Cohen, Place, and Wilkins—3.

The minutes of the preceding session were amended and approved.

The President laid before the Board the certificates of appointments by the Mayor of Isaac Bell and Samuel G. Jelliffe as Commissioners of Common Schools.

Ordered, That said communications be entered in full in the minutes.

The President appointed Commissioner Bell to serve on the Committee on Normal College, Finance Committee, Committee on Evening Schools, Committee on Annual Report, and Special Committee on Salaries and Economy.

The President appointed Commissioner Jelliffe to serve on the Committee on Buildings, Sites, and New Schools, School Furniture, Warming and Ventilation, and Special Committee on Salaries and Economy.

Commissioner Cohen was excused for absence for two months, during his visit to Europe.

The President laid before the Board communications from Boards of Trustees of several Wards, as follows:

From the First, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second, and Twenty-third Wards, relative to absences of Teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From a minority of Trustees of the Sixth Ward, against shortening the summer vacation. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

From the Sixteenth and Seventeenth Wards, transmitting communications from the Fire Department, relative to buildings.

From the Seventeenth Ward, nominating teachers for the Evening Schools. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

Also, for separate gas-meter for the Janitor. Referred to the Auditing Committee.

Also, nominating Miss Mary Wilson for Principal of Grammar School No. 19. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Eighteenth Ward, nominating George M. Mitchell, for Principal of Evening School No. 40. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Nineteenth Ward, asking for pay of Teachers for sundry services. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Twenty-first Ward, transmitting a notice from Theodore F. Sanxay, relative to school

property in East Thirty-ninth street, occupied by Grammar School No. 49. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

From the Twenty-first Ward, asking for the removal of a dwelling in the rear of school lot, and erection of a building for school purposes. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twenty-third Ward, relative to contract for school furniture. Laid on the table, to be taken up with the report of the Finance Committee.

The President laid before the Board a communication from the City Superintendent, relative to a violation of the by-laws on corporal punishment by a Teacher.

Also, report of the Superintendent of Truancy for the month of May. Entered in minutes, and placed on file.

The report of the Superintendent of School Buildings. Entered in minutes.

From the New York Juvenile Asylum, notifying the Board of Education that the Asylum objects to the further reception of truant. Entered in minutes, and referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

From Wilson Stephens, and Clark W. Beach, for appointments as Assistants in the Depository. Referred to the Committee on Supplies.

From Thomas Connor—A protest against award of contract for carpenter work in Grammar School No. 62. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Application of Miss Kate Miller, for leave of absence. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From Mrs. Mary Walsh, relative to the salary of her late husband. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

From Professor George Baillard, for appointment as Instructor of French in the Evening High School. Referred to Committee on Evening Schools.

Reports of Standing Committees were presented as follows:

Commissioner Wilkins presented the report of the Committee on Buildings, authorizing the Trustees of several wards to advertise for proposals for repairs to school premises, and asking for an appropriation of \$10,000. The first resolution adopted, and appropriation referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Traud presented a similar report from the Committee on Warming and Ventilation, and asking for an appropriation of \$3,200. Resolution to advertise proposals adopted and appropriation referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Goulding presented a report from the Committee on School Furniture, relative to repairs, for authority to advertise, and asking for an appropriation of \$3,000. Authority to advertise adopted and appropriation referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Goulding presented a report from the Committee on School Furniture, authorizing the Trustees of the Twenty-second Ward to readvertise for proposals for furniture for Grammar School No. 28. Adopted.

Commissioner Halstead presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, recommending the transfer of Mrs. E. T. Waterman to another department. Adopted.

Also, to pay Professor Morvillier for certain services directed by Trustees, but not provided by the By-laws. Not adopted.

Also, to fine a Teacher five days' pay for violating the by-law on corporal punishment. Adopted.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, adverse to granting application of Trustees of Twenty-fourth Ward for apportionment under the Holbrook will, relative to school libraries, the will not providing for wards organized subsequent to the execution of the will. Adopted.

Commissioner Hazeltine presented a report from the Committee on Evening Schools, to pay two Teachers for registration in Evening Schools. Adopted.

Also, nominating instructors for the Evening High School. Adopted.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, relative to the school property, Grammar School No. 49, in East Thirty-seventh street, referring said matters to the Committee on Buildings. Adopted.

Also, from the same Committee, relative to corporal punishment.

Commissioner Walker presented a counter-report from the same Committee.

Ordered, To be printed in full in the minutes and made special order at the next meeting of the Board.

Commissioner Baker presented a report from the Auditing Committee, reimbursing the payment of sundry bills for postage, printing, advertising, and other incidental expenses of the Clerk's office. Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd presented reports from the Finance Committee, as follows:

To appropriate \$16,200 for repairs to the school buildings, furniture, and heating apparatus. Adopted.

To appropriate \$2,880 for new furniture in Grammar School No. 62. Adopted.

To appropriate \$240.56 for payment of sundry bills for fitting up Primary School No. 38. Adopted.

To appropriate \$2,596.96 for new furniture in Grammar School No. 16. Adopted.

To appropriate \$51.15 to pay sundry bills of 1876. Adopted.

To appropriate \$3,247 for new furniture in Grammar School No. 39. Adopted.

To appropriate \$375 for a new piano for Primary School No. 27. Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd presented a resolution relative to the preparation of a model of school-desks to be uniform in all the schools. Adopted.

Commissioner Wickham offered a resolution referring the sanitary inspection of school-buildings to the Health Department. Adopted.

the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and
is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the
fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or
sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second
avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or
avenues, except as hereinafter mentioned.

1st. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First
avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets,
inclusive.

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-
tween Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive.

3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-
tween Forty-fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth
avenue; thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth
street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth ave-
nue to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth
avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street,
One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second
avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred and
Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and
6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to second
avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-
ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to
Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to
the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and
6 o'clock A. M.

6th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth
avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-
fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to
One Hundred and Twenty-first street, on St. Nicholas
avenue and the Kingsbridge road to the slaughter-houses
north of Spuyten Duyvil creek, between midnight and
6 o'clock A. M.

7th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street down
Eleventh avenue to Thirtieth street, between mid-
night and 6 A. M.

8th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth
avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-
fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-
fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to
Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street,
through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth
avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street
to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-
houses, upon the express condition, however, that the
cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after
5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet,
and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning
before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be
revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of
any of the foregoing conditions.

9th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases,
with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits
to drive animals on other routes than those herein desig-
nated.
