REPORTED MORTALITY \* for the week ending November 26, 1887, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 19, 1887.

W. De F. Day, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 625 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 26, 1887, which is a decrease of 45, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 90 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending November 19, 1887, was 659, which is 57.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.86 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,498,941.
