AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 52 and 53 of article 4 of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to signs, obstructions and other purposes.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Sections 52 and 53 of article 4 of chapter 6 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 are hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

Sec. 52. No person shall hang or place any goods, wares or merchandise, or any other article, or suffer, maintain or permit the same to be hung or placed at any greater distance than three feet in front of his, her or their house, or store or other building, under the penalty of five dollars for each day's offense.

Sec. 53. No person shall place, hang or suspend at any greater distance than three feet in front of and from the wall of any house, or store or other building any sign, show-bill or show-board, or suffer, maintain, or permit the same to be so placed, hung or suspended, under the penalty of ten dollars for each day's offense.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, It has now become necessary to repave certain of the streets through which the rails of this company have been laid, pursuant to such agreement, and the said company, when called upon by the Commissioner of Public Works to repave the streets in and about their said rails have refused to do so; be it therefore

Resolved, That the said New York and Harlem Railroad Company be and it is hereby required and directed to repave in a permanent and satisfactory manner in all streets and avenues through which its rails are laid that portion of such streets and avenues in and about its rails as required by the Commissioner of Public Works, and in the event of the failure or neglect of said company to comply with such requirement of said Commissioner of Public Works within such reasonable time as said Commissioner of Public Works may prescribe, then that the said Commissioner of Public Works inform the Common Council of such refusal or neglect by said company.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the Government of the City of New York and the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes, and for other purposes, pursuant to the provisions of law, in and for the year 1889.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within the City and County of New York, the sum of thirty million three hundred and eighty thousand six hundred and twenty-four dollars and sixty-one cents (\$30,380,624.61), to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the said city and county, in each department and branch thereof, and of the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year 1889; also to pay the sum which is necessary for the payment of the principal and interest of stocks and bonds of said city and county, and of the territory annexed from Westchester County, becoming due and payable in and during the said year 1889, and not otherwise provided for; also to pay the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the stocks and bonds payable from taxation issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; also to pay the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued as provided by section 11 of Article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884; and also to pay the amount fixed as the quota of the State taxes assessed upon the City and County of New York and payable in said year; which sum of thirty million three hundred and eighty thousand six hundred and twenty-four dollars and sixty-one cents (\$30,380,624.61), so imposed and levied by this ordinance, is the aggregate amount estimated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city and appropriated for such objects and purposes in the Final Estimate for said year 1889, made and adopted on the 27th day of December, 1888, after deducting from thirty-seven million

six hundred and thirty-seven thousand and sixty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$37,637,069.91), which is the total amount of appropriations made therein, the sum of four million six hundred and two thousand seven hundred and sixty dollars and seventy-four cents (\$4,602,760.74), which is the amount of the estimated revenues of the General Fund available for the reduction of taxation in said year, 1889, and also the sum of two million six hundred and fifty-three thousand six hundred and eighty-four dollars and fifty-six cents (\$2,653,684.56), which is the amount of certain appropriations included in the said Final Estimate for the year 1889, to be deducted therefrom by resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 26th day of April, 1889, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889, as stated by the Comptroller of the City of New York, in a communication dated May 28, 1889, submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the same day, together with his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Final Estimate for the said year 1889, copies of which communication and certificate, and of the said Final Estimate, are as follows:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Section 212 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 provides as follows: "It shall be the duty of the comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to the board of aldermen at least four weeks before their annual meeting, in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, or for city purposes within said city, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the city treasury during the then current year, from all the sources of revenue of said general fund, including surplus revenues from the sinking fund available in accordance with law, other than the surplus revenues of the sinking fund for the payment of the city debt; and the said board of aldermen are hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of said aggregate amount, after making such deduction."

In pursuance of the foregoing provision of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body a statement setting forth in detail the amount by law authorized and required to be raised by tax in and for the year 1889, on account of the Corporation of the City of New York, or for city purposes within said city, as follows, to wit:

The Final Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and of the Board of Education, for the fiscal year 1889, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on Thursday, December 27, 1888, for which appropriations were made, aggregating the sum of thirty-seven million six hundred and thirty-seven thousand and sixty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$37,637,069.91), which estimate includes the sums necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal and interest of all stocks and bonds becoming due and payable by said city during said fiscal year, not otherwise provided for; also the amounts required to be raised by tax and paid into the Sinking Fund annually, to provide for the payment of the stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, payable by law from taxation, and issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; also the amounts to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued as provided by section 11 of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884; also the amounts required by law to be appropriated to various charitable institutions; and also the amount fixed and required by law to be paid as the quota of the State tax for the City and County of New York in said year 1889.

From the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate for said year 1889, is to be deducted the sum of four million six hundred and two thousand seven hundred and sixty dollars and seventy-four cents (\$4,602,760.74), supplied by the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, that sum being the total amount of the estimated receipts of said fund payable into the City Treasury during the said year 1889, derived from all sources of revenues applicable to and available for this object, including unexpended balances of appropriations of previous years and surplus moneys in the Excise Fund, transferred to the General Fund, as follows:

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully directed to the provisions of the following section of the Consolidation Act:

"Section 213. It shall be the duty of the board or body authorized to levy taxes to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose

or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per cent. of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also respectfully directed to the provisions of law contained in sections 831 and 833 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, which require the Assessment Rolls to be prepared and completed and delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in and for the City of New York, on or before the first day of September in each and every year, with the proper warrants annexed, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of the said city.

Myers, Comptroller of the City of New York, in compliance with the provisions of section 214 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, do hereby certify to the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York that the aggregate amount estimated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city, in its Final Estimate for the fiscal year 1889, made and adopted on Thursday, December 27, 1888, and herewith submitted, is thirty-seven million six hundred and thirty-seven thousand and sixty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$37,637,069.91), which is the total sum of the appropriations included therein to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the said fiscal year 1889, including the sums necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal and interest of stocks and bonds becoming due and payable by said city during said fiscal year, not otherwise provided for; also the amounts required to be raised by tax and paid into the Sinking Fund annually to provide for the payment of the stocks and bonds of the City and County of New York, payable by law from taxation, and issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to section 192 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which, with the accumulations of interest thereon, will be sufficient to redeem the stocks and bonds issued as provided by section 11 of article VIII. of the Constitution of the State of New York, as amended in 1884; also the amounts required by law to be appropriated to various charitable institutions; and also the amount fixed and required by law to be paid as the quota of the State tax for the City and County of New York in said year 1889, a copy of which said Final Estimate, made and adopted by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 27th day of December, 1888, is hereto annexed.

I further certify that the estimated amount of the revenues derived from all sources of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation in the year 1889 is four million six hundred and two thousand seven hundred and sixty dollars and seventy-four cents (\$4,602,760.74), as stated in detail in a communication to your Honorable Body herewith submitted, setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be imposed and raised by tax in for the said year 1889.

I further certify that the sum of two million six hundred and fifty-three thousand six hundred and eighty-four dollars and fifty-six cents (\$2,653,684.56) has been deducted from certain appropriations included in the Final Estimate for 1889, on account of payments thereof provided for from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, by resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted April 26, 1889, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 178 of the Laws of 1889, as stated in detail in the communication herewith submitted, pursuant to section 212 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, Vice-President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

Sec. 2. In addition to the sum imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, for the support of the Government of the City of New York, and for other purposes, for the year 1889, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid, according to law, seven hundred and sixty-four thousand seven hundred and forty-five dollars and forty-four cents (\$764,745.44), the said amount being deemed necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied for the support of the Government of the City of New York, and for other purposes, for the year 1889, and not exceeding three per centum of the sum imposed by the first section of this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 830 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Sec. 3. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the City and County of New York, for the year 1889, are hereby approved and confirmed, and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates, for said year, is hereby fixed at the sum of one thousand six hundred and three million eight hundred and thirty-nine thousand one hundred and thirteen dollars (\$1,603,839,113), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for said year, submitted to the Board of Aldermen on Monday, the first day of July, 1889, as follows, to wit:

And Whereas, section 3 of chapter 361 of the Laws of 1881 provides, inter alia, as follows:

"Every corporation, joint-stock company or association whatever, now or hereafter incorporated or organized by or under any law of this State, or now or hereafter incorporated or organized by or under the laws of any other State or county, and doing business in this State, except savings banks and institutions for savings, life insurance companies, banks and foreign insurance companies and manufacturing corporations carrying on manufacture within this State, which exception shall not be taken to include gas companies or trust companies, shall be subject to and pay a tax as a tax upon its corporate franchise or business into the treasury of the State annually;" and

Whereas, Section 8 of said act also provides as follows:

"The corporations, joint-stock companies and associations mentioned in this act as taxable shall hereafter be exempt from assessment and taxation for State purposes, except upon their real estate, and as herein provided; but they shall in all other respects be liable to assessment and taxation as heretofore;" and

Whereas, The amount of assessed valuations of the real and personal estates, subject to taxation, of and within the City and County of New York, excepting the personal estates of the several corporations, joint-stock companies and associations which are exempted by law from local taxation for State purposes, is one thousand five hundred and fifty-four million seven hundred and thirty-three thousand and sixty-eight dollars (\$1,554,733,668); and

Whereas, The amount of the assessed valuations of the personal estates of such corporations, joint-stock companies and associations as are exempted by law from local taxation thereon for State purposes is forty-nine million one hundred and six thousand and forty-five dollars (\$49,106,045); but which is liable to taxation for City and County purposes only;

Be it also ordained, that the said real and personal estates shall be subject to taxation as provided by the following section:

Sec. 4. The rate of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the City and County of New York, excepting the personal estates of such corporations, joint-stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from assessment and taxation thereon for State purposes, shall be and is hereby fixed at 1.95 per centum of the assessed valuations thereof, and upon the personal estates of such corporations, joint-stock companies or associations, the rate of tax shall be and is hereby fixed at 1.6863 per centum of the assessed valuations thereof, in and for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-nine (1889).

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held August 29, 1889.

Present—Commissioners Post, Matthews and Cram.

The minutes of the meetings held August 22 and 23, 1889, were read and approved.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 9380, in relation to the application of W. P. Byrne for lease of water-front south side of West Fifty-first street, North river, was, on motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Hon. Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller:

1st. In reference to the settlement and payment of the judgments in the action of Henry K. S. Williams and William M. Kingsland, and requesting certain information in relation thereto. The action of the President in furnishing the information desired was approved.

2d. Stating that in addition to the sum of \$510,795 realized from the sale of \$500,000, 3 per cent Dock Bonds, there was taken July 17, \$50,000, 2½ per cent Dock Bonds by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at par, which amount has also been placed to the credit of the Dock Fund. The Secretary directed to notify the Chief clerk.

From Commissioners of Accounts—Requesting certain books and documents for examination. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to furnish the desired documents was approved.

From Department of Public Works:

1st. Stating that the box sewer at Forty-second street, North river, will be repaired as speedily as practicable.

2d. Stating that the hydrant foot of Forty-second street, East river, will be removed.

From Lawrence, Son & Gerrish—Lessees of the portion of the bulkhead between Piers, old 36 and new 29, East river, belonging to George H. Penniman, requesting the Department to repair said bulkhead, at the same time the repairs are made to the portion of the bulkhead thereat belonging to the City and agreeing to pay a pro rata share of the expense. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to comply with said request and report the cost thereof for collection from said lessees.

From Sanderson & Son—Stating that repairs ordered will be made to the armature plates on Pier, new 54, North river.

From A. M. Underhill & Co., agents Guion Line—Stating that the repairs ordered will be made to Pier, new 38, North river.

From James Gillies' Sons—Requesting lease of eighty-three feet of bulkhead south of Fiftieth street, North river. Referred to the Treasurer to examine and report to the Board.

From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Stating that repairs had been made to the pavement at entrance to Pier 6, East river.

From M. Goodwin—Objecting to permit being granted to Ciancimino's Towing and Transportation Company to locate a dumping-board at Fiftieth street, East river. The Secretary directed to advise that permit had been granted to place a dumping-board thereat before his communication was received.

From New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company and I. E. Ackerman & Co.—In reference to unloading lumber at Pier foot of Thirtieth street, North river. Referred to the Secretary to reply thereto.

From Knickerbocker Ice Company—Stating that they are making arrangements to do the dredging ordered on the southerly side of Pier foot of West Forty-third street, North river.

From Thomas C. Gilligan—Requesting a position as Diver. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

From the President and Faculty of Manhattan College, New York—Requesting permission to build a bath-house for their use between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From M. Goodwin—Requesting permission to dredge foot of Twenty-ninth street, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah—In relation to the piling in front of the bulkhead between Piers, new 34 and 35, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From John Moran, Stone Cutter—In relation to the amount of wages due him. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Third Avenue Railroad Company—Requesting permission to open a small trench on the dock foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, to renew or repair waste from wheel vault to the river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Ridgewood Ice Company—Requesting permission to plank pier and bulkhead foot of Seventy-ninth street, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Warren Rosevelt—Requesting permission to drive piles on the east side of ferry-rack, in yard of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, foot of Willis avenue, Harlem river, for the purpose of mooring a pile-driver thereat. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the said piles to be placed thereat under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department, and be and remain during the will of the Board, was approved.

From Hoboken Ferry Company—Requesting permission to place a window in the north side of ferry-house foot of West Fourteenth street, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Consolidated Gas Company—Requesting permission to drive twelve fender-piles alongside of the small Pier between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Morgan Iron Works—Requesting permission to repair bulkhead between Eighth and Ninth streets, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From W. W. Everett, President People's Line of Steamers—Requesting that the time to repair Pier, old, 41, North river, be postponed until navigation closes. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Charles H. Pendergast, Dock Master:
1st. Reporting that extensive repairs are required to the bulkhead between Piers 48 and 49, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Reporting permanent removal of Sectional Dock from Pier 48 East river.

From P. J. Brady, Dock Master—Reporting repairs required to Pier, new, 60 North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting that he had directed that Watchman William Cringle, be not again assigned to duty for ten days, and that Laborers Acting Watchmen John P. Cannavan and William Palmer, be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchmen, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, his action was approved.

3d. Repairs required to bulkhead north of East Sixteenth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair, as recommended in his report, was approved.

4th. In reference to shed at One Hundred and Seventh street, Harlem river, and recommending that the permit if any there be for said shed, be revoked and the alleged owner notified to remove same forthwith, in order that the work of the Department may proceed.

On motion, his recommendation was adopted, and the Secretary directed to notify Cornelius Eagan to remove said shed within ten days after receipt of notice from this Department.

5th. Reporting that the work of repairing the crib-bulkhead between the centre line of East Seventeenth street and the centre line of East Eighteenth street, East river, will make it necessary to vacate the berth now occupied by Louis Brandt under wharfage during the repairs, and recommending that the said occupant be notified at once so that he can find some other place.

On motion, his recommendation was adopted and the Secretary directed to send Mr. Brandt a copy of the Engineer-in-Chief's report.

6th. Respecting the repairs made to Pier at Third street, East river, by the Ridgewood Ice Company, lessees. The action of the Secretary in advising said Ice Company that additional repairs are required was approved.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9340, repairs required to the bulkhead between Piers 43 and 44 East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair, as recommended in his report.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9360, repairs required to Pier foot of Fiftieth street, East river. The action of the President in notifying the New York Steam Company to repair under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief was approved.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9392, as to the need of mooring posts on the upper side of Pier 48, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to place mooring posts thereat, as recommended in his report.

10th. Reporting that horizontal chock should be replaced at Pier, foot of Fifty-first street, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to replace said chock as recommended in his report.

11th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 9382 and 9383, that the pavement at Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, East river, was repaired by the Department of Public Works.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9391, repairs required to deck of Pier 48, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair, as recommended in his report was approved.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6154, that the scuppers under the backing-logs on bulkhead, between Canal and West Tenth streets, have been cleaned so that the water can run off.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6191, that he had superintended repairing leak in gas-pipe under crosswalk opposite Pier, new 43, North river.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6818, that he had drained the new-made land in front of Piers, new 20 and 21, North river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7016, in reference to sewer outlet foot of Forty-second street, North river.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8363, that he had directed and superintended the erection of a platform and gangway at boat-house on north side One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8365, that he had superintended replacing piles at ferry premises, Christopher street, North river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9005, that he had superintended repairing Piers 4 and 5, North river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9017, that he had superintended repairing sheathing on north side Pier 2, North river.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9104, that he had superintended repairing ferry premises at Fourteenth street, North river.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9133, that he had repaired pavement at Pier, new 40, North river.

23d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9167, that he had superintended repairing bulkhead between Piers 12 and 13, North river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9176, that he had superintended relaying pavement in front of Pier 2, North river.

25th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9222, that he had repaired stone wall at Seventy-fifth street, East river.

26th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9223, that he had superintended renewing screw-bolt on fender in front of bulkhead at Seventy-fifth street, East river.

27th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9255, that he had removed the bricks from the bulkhead, between Seventy-seventh and Eightieth streets, North river, and placed them on the easterly side of new-made land near the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

28th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9261, that he had superintended the construction of a cable box on the south side of ferry structure, foot of Barclay street, North river.

29th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9289, that he had superintended repairing bulkhead between Eighteenth and Nineteenth and Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, North river.

30th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9296, that he had superintended repairing Pier, old 56, North river.

31st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9316, that he had superintended repairing pavement at entrance to Pier 6, East river.

32d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9327, that he had superintended driving piles and placing mooring-posts at Pier 42, East river.

33d. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 9325 and 9328, that he had repaired upper and lower piers on east side of Ward's Island, East river.

34th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9332, that he had filled in hole at bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Seventh street.

35th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9333, that he had repaved pavement at bulkhead-platform, Forty-third street, East river.

36th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9334, that he had superintended fastening fender-pile at Pier 27, East river.

37th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9341, that he had superintended repairing backing-log at outer end of Pier 13, East river.

38th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9354, that he had superintended erecting two derricks and placing tally-house and two dock-boxes on the upper side Pier 6, East river.

39th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9357, that he had superintended repairing Piers, between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, North river.

40th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9367, that he had superintended repairing approach to Pier, old 56, North river.

41st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9377, that he had superintended the placing of twelve posts for the purpose of holding a canvas cover to protect merchandise from the rain, at bulkhead south of Pier, new 46, North river.

42d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9396, that he had superintended fastening piles on Pier at Thirty-fifth street, North river.

43d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9353, that he had repaired bulkhead-platform at Fifty-second street, East river.

44th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9291, that he had superintended driving piles at Pier, old 40, North river.

45th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 8065 and 8567, that he had superintended building bulkhead-platforms on the east side of Mott Haven canal.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief that land under water belonging to the city was being filled in, contrary to law, at the foot of One Hundred and Fourth street, Harlem river.

On motion, it was resolved, That all parties concerned in the filling-in be directed to remove the same; and further, to show cause before this Board, at a meeting to be held on the 5th of September, at 12 o'clock noon, why they should not be fined for their infraction of the law.

The Board was also informed that piles had been driven at the foot of the same street, not in accordance with the permit granted by this Department.

On motion, it was resolved, That James Keeley, and all other persons concerned therein be directed to remove said piles within seven days; and if not removed by that time, the Engineer-in-Chief is directed to remove the same with the forces of this Department, at the cost and expense of the persons placing them there.

In the Matter of Locating Floating Dump at Pier foot of East Twenty-fifth street, East River. Upon reading and filing the application of James Curley for permission to locate a floating dump on the lower side of Pier at Twenty-fifth street, East river, and the written consent of Joseph V. Brown, the lessee of said pier, dated August 27, 1889, to which reference is hereby made.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to James Curley to locate a floating dump on the lower side of the Pier at the foot of East Twenty-fifth street, East river, to be used in removing cellar dirt; said permit to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

The communication from John A. Bouker in relation to locating a floating dump on the lower side of Pier at Twenty-fifth street, East river, was.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the Secretary directed to advise that the lessee of said pier, Joseph V. Brown, having consented to the placing of a floating dump thereat, permit was granted by the Board.

In the Matter of Erecting dumping-board at Pier No. 61, East river. Upon reading and filing the application of Henry A. Peck & Co., dated August 19, 1889, to erect a dumping-board at Pier No., 61, East river, to which reference is hereby made:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Henry A. Peck & Company, to erect and construct a dumping-board at Pier No. 61, East river, extending a distance of 150 feet west from the public dump located at said pier; provided that said Henry A. Peck & Company shall pay, as compensation for the use thereof, the sum of \$18 per week, payable weekly, when due, to the Dock Master of the district, commencing from the time that the said Pier is ready for occupancy; the said dumping-board to be located under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-chief of this Department, and to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for building, in accordance with the new plan, a new wooden Pier at the foot of West Fiftieth street.

Commissioner Cram offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and hereby is requested to take immediate steps to obtain by condemnation proceedings in the Supreme Court, the wharfage rights granted by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, to Robert Ray, and John A. King, as executors of Cornelius Ray, by a grant dated 15th June, 1838 and recorded page 142, liber H of City Grants, on file in the office of the Comptroller, and any other rights under said grant which are inconsistent with the rights of the Department of Docks, to complete, in conformity with the new plan, the gap in the bulkhead wall at the foot of West Twenty-eighth street.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the month of August, 1889, amounting to \$9,339.29, had been approved and audited, and transmitted, with proper requisitions for the amounts, to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, his action was approved.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending August 28, 1889, amounting to \$2,039.30, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

Each plan submitted shall be marked with such assumed designation as the architect may select, provided there shall be filed with the Mayor a sealed envelope, giving the real name of the author of the plans so designated, which shall be opened by the Mayor in the presence of the Board, after the premiums shall have been awarded.

Each estimate must contain the name and place of residence of the persons making the same, the names of all persons interested with them therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact. That it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud. That no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy chief, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested in the estimate, or in the work to which it relates or in the profits thereof.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of the deposit will be returned to him.

THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REJECT ALL BIDS RECEIVED FOR ANY PARTICULAR WORK IF HE DEEMS IT FOR THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CITY.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called "extra water rents" of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 470, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *

The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERS.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each. WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
