

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending December 2, 1876.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Mary Fitzgerald to keep a stand, for the sale of fruit, at the northeast corner of New Bowery and Madison street; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, November 2, 1876.
Received from his Honor the Mayor, November 16, 1876, with his objections thereto.
In Board of Aldermen, November 27, 1876, taken up and considered, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Peter Highland to keep a stand or cart for the sale of oysters (a few hours in the evening) at the head of Catharine street, at the intersection of Division street; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common

Received from his Honor the Mayor, November 16, 1876, with his objections thereto.

Resolved. That permission be and the same is hereby given to James Williamson to place and keep a sign of a triangular shape, on the curb line, in front of No. 40 Bowery, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Com-

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 21, 1876.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, November 28, 1876, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved Thomas Gaffney be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of Thomas Gaffney, whose term of office has expired.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 21, 1876. Approved by the Mayor, November 29, 1876.

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Common Council of the City of New York be authorized and directed to execute a lease, on behalf of the City of New York, of the premises on the second floor of building situated on the southwest corner of Seventh avenue and Twenty-second street, from Charles Johnson, for the use of the Eighth District Civil Court, for the term of five years, from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, at the annual rent of three thousand dollars, payable quarterly on the usual quarter days, and the Comptroller of the City of New York is hereby directed to pay said rent quarterly, from the proper appropriation; the said premises being the same that are now occupied by the said Eighth District Civil Court.

Resolved, That Eighty-fifth street, from Avenue A to Avenue B, be regulated and graded, curb and gutter stones set, and the sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to draw a warrant in favor of Samuel E. Warren for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for engrossing and framing the preamble and resolutions passed by the Common Council in relation to the death of Alderman Patrick Lysaght, and charge the same amount to the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

Whereas, Gordon W. Burnham, Esq., having placed in the Central Park, at his own expense, the colossal statue, in bronze, of Daniel Webster, with the granite pedestal on which it stands, did, on the 25th day of November instant, present the same to the city; now therefore

Burnham, Esq., for his memorable gift.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, Friday, December 1, 1876—11 o'clock A. M.

The Board met in pursuance of a call, issued under the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, and section 1 of chapter 779, Laws of 1873; and chapters 303, 304, and 308, Laws of 1874, and indorsed by the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments; and, in pursuance of a requisition of the Comptroller, dated November 28, 1876, as follows:
