Third—Certificates in respect to the vacation of premises at No. 102 East One Hundred and Fourth street, No. 104 East One Hundred and Fourth street, No. 106 East One Hundred and Fourth street and No. 108 East One Hundred and Fourth street, Borough of Manhattan; No. 3 Railroad avenue, Rockaway Beach; No. 5 Railroad avenue, Rockaway Beach, and No. 7 Railroad avenue, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon lot No. 102 East One Hundred and Fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants,

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on lot No. 102 East One Hundred and Fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before June 19, 1906, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

Whereas, The premises, bologna and sausage manufactory, located at No. 75 Goerck street, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz:

That the manufacture of products under present conditions be discontinued forthwith.

Whereas, The premises No. 49 Willett street, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz:

That the manufacture of products under present conditions be discontinued forthwith.

Whereas, The premises Avenue E and Thirteenth street, Unionport, Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public

nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the keeping of cows on the premises without a permit from this Department be discontinued forthwith.

Whereas, The premises Findlay avenue and One Hundred and Seventieth street, Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the stable floor and ground outside of stable be cleaned and disinfected, and all manure removed therefrom; that hereafter all manure be kept inside the stable and removed from the premises daily, unless pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, so as to reduce it to not more than one-third the original bulk.

Whereas, The premises Centre street, near Rockaway road, Union Course, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the saturated flooring of the cow stalls and stable and milk house be removed, the space beneath said flooring be cleaned, disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the entire stable and milk house floors be cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all water and liquid matter into a properly trapped, cesspool-connected valley drain; that each stall be provided with a movable rack; that no more than 600 cubic feet of air space be kept in the stable, and that the cows be turned out to pasture during the entire day, or else the air space in the stable allowed each cow be not less than 800 cubic feet; that additional windows and a suitable roof ventilator be provided in the stable; that the walls and ceilings of the stable and milk house be scraped, disinfected and sheathed with matched boards, and that said boards be painted; that a water-tight manure box with a tight fitting cover be constructed (at least 10 feet from the stable) sufficiently large to hold the accumulation of manure for not more than forty-eight hours, and that all manure be removed from the premises daily and deposited at a point at least 300 feet from the stable or any inhabited dwelling; that adequate means of washing and sterilizing the milk cans, milk pails and other utensils be provided; that the cows be cleaned daily; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milk men be thoroughly cleaned before milking; that the milk men be clothed in white overalls and jumper while milking.

Whereas, The premises No. 74 Cherry street, Brooklyn Hills, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises in its present condition as a stable be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that additional windows and a suitable roof ventilator be provided in the stable; that the walls and ceilings of the stable and milk house be scraped, disinfected and sheathed with matched boards, and that said boards be painted; that a water-tight manure box with a tight-fitting cover be constructed (at least 3 feet from the stable) sufficiently large to hold the accumulation of manure for not more than forty-eight hours, and that all manure be removed from the premises daily and deposited at a point at least 300 feet from the stable or any inhabited dwelling; that the cows be cleaned daily; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly cleaned before milking; that the milk men be clothed in white overalls and jumper while milking; that the grounds about the stable and milk house be cleaned of all manure and rubbish, disinfected and kept clean at all times.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
