Cash Received.

Permits—To open streets (restoring and repaving), \$13,094.58; to make sewer connections, \$1,275; to construct vaults, \$1,673.94; to construct temporary sheds, \$5. Redemption of seized incumbrances, \$49.43; advances, reimbursement, labor and material expended on repairs by highways maintenance force, \$1,094.66; collections from railroad companies for share of cost of contracts for paving and repaving between tracks, \$44,909.38; map sales, \$100.56; sales of old material, \$4.85; use of steam roller, \$12; permit to erect signs, \$76; total, \$62,295.40. Security deposits in connection with permits issued to cross sidewalks with team during building construction, etc., etc., \$8,090.40. Total, \$70,385.80.

Contracts.

The total number of contracts executed and registered was 26, apportioned as follows: Bureau of Highways, 16, \$180,345.02; Bureau of Sewers, 9, \$117,827.29; Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, 1, \$1,584; total, \$299,756.31.

There were 34 contracts completed, aggregating \$890,920.47, and work is going on in connection with 49 contracts, aggregating \$2,306,556.34, on which \$1,449,426.49 in payments have been made. There is one contract, representing an estimated cost of \$2,025.75, awarded but not registered.

Fifteen assessment lists were forwarded to the Board of Assessors.

Bureau of Highways.

The total mileage of pavement in the Borough on September 30, 1914, was 182.389 miles, of which 282 miles were medina block, 46.832 miles granite block, 52.415 miles of sheet asphalt, 59.823 miles asphalt block, 4.376 miles wood block, .039 miles brick, 1.545 miles iron slag, .077 miles trap, 17 miles bituminous.

The total amount of pavement laid was 4.066 miles, as follows: Granite block,

.302; sheet asphalt, 1.373; bituminous, 2.391. Brick decrease, .055; asphalt block 1.545 miles iron slag, .077 miles trap, 17 miles bituminous.

decrease, .798; net increase during quarter, 3.213 miles.

Bureau of Sewers.

There were built 11,618.5 feet, equalling 2.2 miles, of vitrified pipe sewers from 12 inches to 30 inches in diameter; 7,992.2 linear feet, equalling 1.514 miles, of concrete sewers from 29 inches by 40 inches in diameter to double 10 feet by 8 feet, making a total of 19,610.7 linear feet, or 3.714 miles, thus making the total mileage of the sewerage system 343.026 miles.

Seventeen basins were built, making a total of 3,820 basins connected with the sewerage system.

Highways—Maintenance.

Mileage of Streets in Use—Permanent pavement, 182.389; macadam pavement, 124.801; earth roads, 142.81; total, 450.

Earth roads and unpaved streets to the extent of 143 miles in length and an average width of 30 feet were cleaned and repaired or graded where necessary.

Macadam—Repaired by spreading old screenings, 2,033 square yards; repaired tar via surface, 1,500 square yards; resurfaced with stone and screenings, 29,855 square yards; repaired, 26,738 square yards; cleaned (including gutters), 125 miles.

Paving—Granite pavement on sand relaid (surface only), 5,811 square yards; granite pavement on concrete grout joints (surface only), 41 square yards; granite block pavement on concrete, grout joints (surface and base), 192 square yards; wood block pavement repaired (surface and base), 55 square yards; asphalt block pavement repaired (surface only), 3 square yards; granite block pavement, tar and gravel (surface only), 2,072 square yards; granite block pavement, tar and gravel (surface and base), 389 square yards, iron slag pavement (surface only), 1 square yard; asphalt block pavement (surface only), with trap rock (temporary), 801 square yards.

Street Signs—Street signs painted and erected, 124; sign posts set, 451; warning signs painted and erected on Concourse, 7.

Materials—Road material, earth and stone hauled to work, 4,357 loads; refuse and sweepings carted from public highways to dump, 5,838 loads.

Street Oiling—Earth roads treated with asphalt road oil, 454,533 square yards; macadam roads treated with tar road oil, 643,011 square yards.

Curbs repaired on Concourse, 98 linear feet; curbs repaired with sand, 2,272 linear feet; bluestone flagging repaired, 1,200 linear feet; incumbrances were removed where required; granite gutters repaired, 5,776 square feet; native stone gutters repaired, 837 square feet; crosswalks on all important thoroughfares were kept clean; crosswalks relaid, 22,431 square feet.

Bridges, viaducts and steps cleaned daily, 28,934 square yards; bridge railing and iron work painted, 49,980 square feet; bridges, viaducts and steps, planking replaced, 11,629 square feet; wooden rail erected and repaired, 2,773 linear feet; ash walks formed and repaired, 934 square yards; plank walks repaired, 388 square feet; cement walks repaired, 32 square feet.

Cash Received—For permits to make sewer connections, \$1,275.00; for restoring pavements over sewer openings and Croton openings, \$13,194.58; for vault privileges, \$1,673.94; for shed privileges, \$5.00; total, \$16,148.52. Deposits for permits to cross sidewalks, \$8,090.40. \$24,238.92.

Topographical Bureau.

Work Performed—10 maps showing street changes (grades and lines) were forwarded for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; 9 maps showing street changes (grades and lines) in triplicate were forwarded for filing by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; 11 maps showing street changes (sewerage districts, etc.) were filed in the vault of the Topographical Bureau relative to the Borough of The Bronx; 50 orders for examining and setting monuments in connection with street improvements were attended to; 96 concrete monuments were made; 173 monuments were set; 48 monuments were reset; 3 rule maps, in triplicate, for three streets were made; 3 draft damage maps, in triplicate, for three streets, comprising 31 plots covering 526,808.63 square feet, or 210,723 city lots, were made; 7 benefit maps covering 5,032 plots were made; 438 final copies of damage and benefit maps were made, and 1 profile for one street was made.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices expended \$5,835.27 on supplies equipment, etc., furnished to the several public buildings of the bureau.

Local Boards.

Seventy-four petitions were considered as follows: Changing map of the City of New York, 5; change of grades, 1; change of lines and grades, 1; reduction of width, 2; acquiring title, 8; regulating and grading only, 1; regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary, 10; regulating and completing the grading to a width of 100 feet, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary, 1; for regulating and paving with sheet asphalt on a concrete foundation (permanent pavement), setting curb where necessary, 1; constructing sewers and appurtenances, 11; constructing receiving basins and appurtenances, 1; constructing receiving basins and appurtenances in accordance with section 435 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, 4; constructing drain, 1; paving with bituminous concrete on a cement concrete foundation (preliminary pavement), 3; paving on sheet asphalt on a concrete foundation (permanent pavement), 2; paving with granite blocks on a concrete foundation (permanent pavement), 1; filling in sunken lots, together with all work incidental thereto, 1; erecting fences, 1; filling in sunken lots, 1; flagging, reflagging, laying and repairing concrete sidewalks, filling in to grade and removing surplus earth from same, 12; flagging and removing surplus earth and stone from sidewalks, 2; erecting guard rail with necessary excavation or filling, 2; erecting guard rail, also to bring the earth part of the sidewalk to proper grade, 1; removal of encroachments or encumbrances, 1; total, 74.

Of the petitions and recommendations considered, 19 were adopted, 29 laid over, 11 denied, 6 rescinded, 5 amended, 1 filed, 1 decision reserved, 1 referred back and 1 disapproved.

Bureau of Buildings.

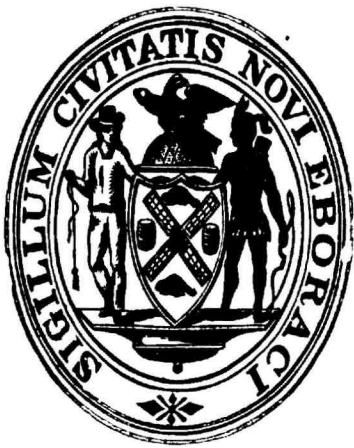

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
