The Board of Health met this day.

187 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 30 cases, and for violation of the Sanitary Code in 4 cases.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 24, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,340, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 591 tenement-houses, 128 private dwellings, 16 other dwellings, 2 manufactories and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 42 stables, 40 slaughter-houses, 108 milk inspections, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 1 vessel, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 28 yards, courts, and areas, 30 cellars and basements, 126 waste-pipes and drains, 119 privies and water-closets, 2 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stair-ways, 5 cisterns and cesspools, 6 other nuisances, together with 40 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 457.

During the past week 73 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 62 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

69 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 35 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 29 houses, 29 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One person sick with small-pox was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending Saturday, March 24, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 498 burial permits for city deaths, 30 for bodies in transitu, and 25 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 498 deaths, 109 marriages, 490 births, 25 still-births, 30 applications for transit permits, and 47 returns from coroners. There were 32 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth record, and 26 of deaths were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—498 deaths were reported to this Bureau during the week ending March 24, being an increase of 3 compared with the preceding week, and a decrease of 90 compared with the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending March 17 was 484, which is 88.8 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.46 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,072,692.

There was an increase during the past, compared with the preceding week, of 1 death from measles, 4 from membranous croup, 1 from typhoid fever, 4 from malarial fevers, 5 from inanition, etc., 3 from intemperance, 5 from rheumatism and gout, 2 from bronchitis, 1 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3 from enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1 from Bright's disease, 5 from cyanosis and atelectasis; and a decrease of 2 from small-pox, 1 from whooping-cough, 1 from erysipelas, 2 from typhus fever, 4 from cerebro-spinal fever, 4 from cancer, 23 from phthisis pulmonalis, 2 from disease of the heart, 1 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, and 5 from diseases of the brain.

The mortality from contagious diseases and diseases of the respiratory organs, are considerably less than they were during the corresponding week of 1876, viz.:

The mortality for the week ending March 17 is distributed in the following wards, viz.: First, 5; Second, 0; Third, 5; Fourth, 8; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 21; Eighth, 16; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 19; Eleventh, 24; Twelfth, 47; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 12; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 16; Seventeenth, 33; Eighteenth, 24; Nineteenth, 80; Twentieth, 31; Twenty-first, 34; Twenty-second, 40; Twenty-third, 6; Twenty-fourth, 3.

The mean temperature for the week was 33.3° Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.922 inches; the mean humidity was 82, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 896, and the total amount of rain fall was .54 inch.

The disposition of 476 deaths and still-births, or 91.01 per cent. of the total number reported were in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 94; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 61; Greenwood (undenominational), 41; Lutheran (undenominational), 76; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 30; Woodlawn (undenominational), 14; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 3; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 5.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of the following American cities, was: Philadelphia, 18.82; Brooklyn, 21.07; St. Louis, 13.41; Chicago, 17.95; Baltimore, 22.85; Boston, 23.17; Cincinnati, 15.22; Cleveland, 14.79; Richmond, 13.86; Charleston, 30.80.
