MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, June 16, 1881.

It appearing by the application, made to me on the seventeenth day of May, 1881, by fifty reputable householders and tax-payers of the City and County of New York, in the State of New York, verified upon oath before a Justice of the Supreme Court, that there is need in said city and county of a steam railway or railways for the transportation of passengers, mails and freight, and thirty days not having expired since said application, now, in pursuance of the provisions of the act entitled "An act further to provide for the construction and operation of a steam railway or railways in counties of the State," passed June 18, 1875, I, William R. Grace, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby certify that I have this day appointed William F. Smith, Rutherford Stuyvesant, Henry P. De Graaf, Matthew Daly, and Elbridge Gerry, Jr., residents of said city and county, to be Commissioners, under and in pursuance of the provisions of said act.

In witness whereof I have hereunto signed my name and caused the Seal of the Mayoralty to be affixed, this sixteenth day of June, 1881.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

CHAPTER 293.

AN ACT to amend section two of title one of chapter thirteen of part one of the Revised Statutes.

Passed May 18, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of title one of chapter thirteen of part one of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 2. The term "land," as used in this chapter, shall be construed to include the land itself above and under water; all buildings and other articles and structures, substructures and superstructures erected upon, under or above, or affixed to the same; all wharves and piers, including the value of the right to collect wharfage, cranes or dockage thereon; all bridges; all telegraph lines, wires, poles and appurtenances; all surface, underground or elevated railroads; all railroad structures, substructures and superstructures, tracks and the iron thereon; branches, switches and other fixtures permitted or authorized to be made, laid or placed in, upon, above or under any public or private road, street or grounds; all mains, pipes and tanks laid or placed in, upon, above or under any public or private street or place; all streets and underwood growing upon land; and all mines, minerals, quarries and fossils in and under the same, except mines belonging to the state. The term "real estate" and "real property," whenever they occur in this chapter, shall be construed as having the same meaning as the term "land" thus defined.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 295.

AN ACT to amend section eleven of chapter six hundred and eleven of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to provide for the organization and regulation of certain business corporations."

Passed May 18, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section eleven of chapter six hundred and eleven of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-five, entitled "An act to provide for the organization and regulation of certain business corporations," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 11. The capital stock of every corporation formed under this act shall be divided into shares of not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars each; and shall in no case exceed five million dollars. All subscriptions therefor shall be made payable to the corporation in such installments and at such time or times as shall be fixed by the by-laws or by the directors acting under the by-laws; and if default be made in any payment, an action may be maintained in the name of the corporation to recover any installment which shall remain due and unpaid for the period of thirty days after the time so fixed for the payment thereof; and no stockholder shall be entitled to vote at any election or at any meeting of the stockholders on whose share or shares any installments or arrearages may have been due and unpaid for the period of thirty days immediately preceding such election or meeting. The corporation may, by by-laws, prescribe other penalties for a failure to pay the installments that from time to time become due, not exceeding forfeiture of the stock, and the amount paid thereon, but no such forfeiture shall be declared against any stockholder before demand shall have been made for the amount due thereon, either in person or by a written or printed notice duly mailed to such stockholder at his last known place of residence at least thirty days prior to the time when such forfeiture is to take effect; and provided, further, that upon such forfeiture the shares of stock held by such delinquent stockholder or subscriber shall be sold at public auction, at the office of said corporation, after ten days' notice thereof shall be conspicuously posted up in said office, and the proceeds of such sale, over and above the amount due on said shares, and after deducting the expenses of such sale, if any, shall be paid to the delinquent stockholder or subscriber.

CHAPTER 300.

AN ACT to provide county trade-marks for stamping or marking pure butter and cheese in the several counties of the state.

Passed May 19, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At a regular or special meeting of a county dairymen's association in any of the several counties of the state, there may be adopted county trade-marks by a majority of the members

of said association present and voting, to be used as trade-marks by any person or association manufacturing pure, unadulterated butter or full milk cheese in such county.

Sec. 2. Upon the adoption of county trade-marks by any county dairymen's association, the secretary of said association shall forthwith send a copy of the same to the secretary of state, which copy he shall place on file in his office, noting thereon the day and hour he received the same, and but one county trade-mark for butter and one county trade-mark for cheese shall be placed on file in the secretary of state's office for the same county, and no county dairymen's association shall adopt any trade-mark or marks of any county already on file in the secretary of state's office, nor use the name of any other county in the formation of a trade-mark.

Sec. 3. Any person or persons who shall use or permit to be used the county trade-mark which may have been adopted by any of the county dairymen's association of the several counties of the state under the provisions of this act, for the purpose of marking or stamping any article except pure, unadulterated butter and full milk cheese, manufactured or made in the county, or any person or persons who shall use or permit to be used any county trade-mark out of the county to which said trade-mark belongs, for marking or stamping any article whatever, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than fifty dollars or more than five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in a county jail for not less than thirty days or more than one year, or by both such fine and imprisonment for each and every offense.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 311.

AN ACT to amend chapter three hundred and seventy-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, entitled "An act to amend the act entitled 'An act to authorize the formation of gas-light companies,' passed February sixteenth, eighteen hundred and forty-eight."

Passed May 19, 1881.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section two of chapter three hundred and seventy-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, entitled "An act to amend the act entitled 'An act to authorize the formation of gas-light companies,' passed February sixteenth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 2. Section three of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 3. The stock, property and concerns of such company shall be managed by not less than three nor more than thirteen trustees or directors who shall respectively be stockholders in such company and citizens of the United States and a majority of whom shall be citizens of this state; who shall, except the first year or as hereafter provided, be annually elected by the stockholders, at such time and place as shall be directed by the by-laws of the company; and public notice of the time and place of holding such election shall be published not less than ten days previous thereto, in the newspaper printed nearest to the place where the operations of the said company shall be carried on; and the election shall be made by such of the stockholders as shall attend for that purpose, either in person or by proxy. All elections shall be by ballot, and each stockholder shall be entitled to as many votes as he owns shares of stock in the said company, and the persons receiving the greatest number of votes shall be trustees or directors; and when any vacancy shall happen among the trustees or directors, by death, resignation or otherwise, it shall be filled for the remainder of the year in such manner as may be provided for by the by-laws of the said company. The number of trustees or directors in any such corporation organized before or since the twenty-fifth day of April, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, or which shall hereafter be organized under said act, may be increased to not more than thirteen, as follows: The existing trustees or directors of any such corporation, or a majority of them, shall make and sign a certificate declaring how many trustees or directors the corporation shall have in the future management of its business, and stating the names of the new or additional trustees or directors, which certificate shall be acknowledged by the trustees or directors signing the same, or proved by a subscribing witness, and shall be filed in the office of the clerk of the county where the original certificate of incorporation was filed; and a duplicate or transcript thereof, duly certified under the official seal of such clerk, filed in the office of the secretary of state; and from and after the filing of such certificate and duplicate, or transcript, the trustees or directors of such corporation shall be deemed increased to the number therein stated, and the persons so named therein shall be trustees or directors until a new election of trustees or directors shall be had according to the said act and the by-laws or regulations of such corporation.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 316.

AN ACT authorizing the owners of property to lay out two small parks on East Forty-second street, between First and Second avenues, in the City of New York.

Passed May 19, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The owners of property situate on East Forty-second street, between First and Second avenues, in the city of New York, are hereby authorized to lay out, sod and cultivate two small parks on East Forty-second street, between said named avenues, and to inclose said parks with an iron railing; the said work and improvement to be done at the expense of said owners and under the direction of and according to plans approved by the commissioner of public works of said city.

Sec. 2. Said parks when laid out shall be maintained and kept in good order by said owners without expense to and continue only during the pleasure of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of said city of New York.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 317.

AN ACT to authorize a change, in certain cases, of the time for holding elections in railroad companies.

Passed May 19, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Any railroad company, the time for the annual election of directors in which is now fixed for any day in the month of June, may by a vote of a majority of the stock, either in person or by proxy, thereof to that effect, and filing in the office of the secretary of state a copy of such proceedings, certified by the secretary of the company under its corporate seal, change the time for holding such annual election to any day in the month of April; provided however, that the first election held under such resolution shall be held in the month of April which shall precede the time at which such election would otherwise have been held.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending June 4, 1881, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending May 28, 1881.

SIR.—There were 660 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 4, 1881, which is an increase of 21, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 159 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending May 28, 1881, was 673, which is 153.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.24 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,239,183.

If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4.
