

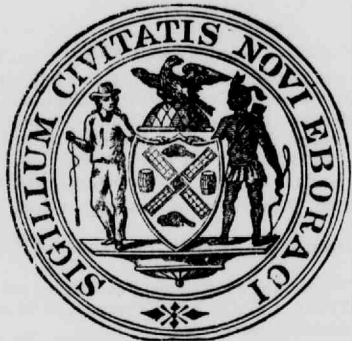

### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, June 19, 1879.

At a meeting of the Mayor, the Comptroller, and the President of the Board of Aldermen, held at the Mayor's office, on the nineteenth day of June, 1879, for the appointment of "Trustees for the purpose of managing and constructing a bridge over the East river, between the cities of New York and Brooklyn," in compliance with chapter 300 of the Laws of 1875, in the places of Thomas Hitchcock, William A. Booth, and George W. Lane, who were appointed as such Trustees on the second day of June, 1879, but who declined to accept the appointment as such Trustees.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that Isaac Newton be appointed Trustee in place of Thomas Hitchcock, declined.

The Comptroller moved that the name of Arthur Leary be substituted for that of Isaac Newton. Which latter motion was lost, the Comptroller voting in the affirmative and the Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen in the negative.

The motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen, that Isaac Newton be appointed Trustee, was then carried by the following vote:

In the affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

In the negative—The Comptroller.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that Erastus W. Smith be appointed in place of William A. Booth, declined.

The Comptroller moved that the name of Charles H. Haswell be substituted for that of Erastus W. Smith.

Which latter motion was lost, the Comptroller voting in the affirmative and the Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen in the negative.

The motion of the President of the Board of Aldermen, that Erastus W. Smith be appointed Trustee, was then carried by the following vote:

In the affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

In the negative—The Comptroller.

The Mayor moved that J. Adriance Bush be appointed in place of George W. Lane, declined.

The Comptroller moved that the name of Henry C. Murphy of Brooklyn be substituted for that of J. Adriance Bush.

Which latter motion was lost, the Comptroller voting in the affirmative and the Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen in the negative.

The motion of the Mayor, that J. Adriance Bush be appointed Trustee, was then carried by the following vote:

In the affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen.
