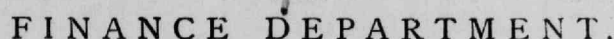

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, May 24, 1894, at 11 o'clock A.M.

Present—President Cram.
Commissioner Phelan.
" " White.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 17th instant were read and approved.

A representative of the East River Mill and Lumber Company appeared and requested that an extension of time be granted said company to remove the obstructions on the exterior street between Ninety-third and Ninety-fourth streets, East river.

On motion, the time was extended to September 1, 1894.

A representative of the "Columbian Line" appeared and requested a lease of Pier, new 43, North river.

On motion, the application was referred to Commissioners White and Phelan, and the Dock Master directed to provide a berth for their steamers at said pier.

A representative of the "Al Foster" Steamboat Company appeared and requested that the claim of the Department for driving piles at the Pier foot of West Forty-fourth street be remitted. On motion, granted.

The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning was present, and requested that a permit be granted said Department for the erection of a temporary platform on piles in front of the crib-work at Riker's Island for a machine to be used in discharging scows thereat. Also for permission to place an electrical disinfecting apparatus with appurtenances on said crib-work.

On motion, permission was granted, the structures to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The application of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for the rebuilding of the dump foot of East Seventieth street, recently partially destroyed by fire, together with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 13910, were referred to the Dock Master to report whether there is any available place south of East Seventieth street where said dump may be located.

The application of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for permission to construct a shed on the southerly half of the bulkhead, between Piers 3 and 4, North river, in accordance with plans submitted, was tabled.

The application of the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting dredging at the dump foot of East Seventeenth street, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From the Wholesale Oyster Dealers, foot of West Tenth street—Requesting a reduction of rent. From Dock Master Abel—Stating that he has arranged with the Viceroy Tug Company for the use of a small room at the outer end of Pier, new 43, North river, at the rate of \$10 per month.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board:

Frederick T. Volk—Boat-house, foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street.

James Heffernan—Derrick on Pier, new 29, East river.

Michael Claffy—Boat-house at One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, North river, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

John W. Weber and William Texter—To land the steamboat "James T. Brett" at the Battery Wharf, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer, Commissioner Phelan not voting.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Pennsylvania Railroad Company—To repair their south ferry-rack at West Thirteenth street.

New York Floating Dry Dock Company—To raise the stringer on bulkhead between Piers 41 and 42, and to dredge in front of the bulkhead between Piers 42 and 43, East river.

Eastman's Company—To lay a fourteen-inch pipe under the Pier foot of West Fifty-eighth street.

Hoboken Ferry Company—To repair their south ferry-rack foot of West Fourteenth street.

Brush Electric Illuminating Company—To erect poles and place two lamps on the dump foot of Canal street, North river, provided the consent of the Department of Street Cleaning is obtained; said poles and lamps to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Consolidated Gas Company—To lay a service-pipe at Pier, new 14, North river, and repair the gas-main on Thirteenth avenue, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, ordered to be placed on file:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Advising the Board to remove the dumping-board from Pier 12, East river, in accordance with the decision of the Court of Appeals in the case of Hill vs. The Mayor. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove said dumping-board and any other building, platform, obstruction and incumbrance on said pier.

From the Department of Public Works—Approving the assignment of a berth for a fire: swimming-bath at the Pier foot of East Third street.

From Simpson, Spence & Young, lessees—Agreeing to the terms of the permit granted on the 17th instant to sublet the northerly half of Pier, new 56, North river, to Charles Hill & Sons.

From John Harlin and George H. Storer, sureties—Consenting to the extension of time granted Henry A. Rogers on the 17th instant for the completion of deliveries of classes Nos. 1, 2 and 4, under Contract No. 469.

From Boatmen in the Vicinity of Jackson Street—Requesting permission to use a portion of Pier 54, East river. Permit granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board.

From the New York Coaling and Elevating Company—Requesting an extension of time for the removal of their platform scales, etc., from the bulkhead between Twenty-ninth and Thirtieth streets, North river, in accordance with the order of the 17th instant. Application denied.

From Morse & Co.—Requesting permission to place an ice-bridge on the south side of Pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-second street. Application denied.

From the Consolidated Gas Company—Requesting a three months' permit to repair and relay gas-pipe.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Consolidated Gas Company to repair and relay their gas-pipes on land under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks, on the North river, between Thirty-fourth and Fifty-seventh streets, for a period of three months, provided the said company notify the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department when they wish the pavement taken up and trenches excavated, and also agree to pay promptly to the Treasurer, upon presentation of a bill for the same, the cost of such work.

From Kane & Wright:

1st. Requesting repairs to the plank approach to the Pier foot of East Forty-sixth street. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

2d. Requesting the Department to repair the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Fifth street, Harlem river, in accordance with the order of the 10th instant. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair and report the cost for collection.

From the President—Recommending that the piles rising through the pavement on the bulkhead between Piers, new 44 and 45, North river, be cut out, and the pavement repaired in accordance with the application of the "White Star Line" of the 17th instant.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report as to the cost of doing said work, payment for which to be hereafter adjusted.

From the Treasurer:

1st. Recommending that the fixing of the compensation for the privilege of filling in behind the bulkhead-wall between Sixtieth and Sixty-fourth streets, East river, permit for which was granted Thomas J. Dunn May 3, be postponed. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Edward Keenan for bathing-houses foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-third street, for which permit was granted on the 17th instant, be fixed at the rate of \$100 per annum, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that permission be granted J. L. Killmer to land the steamer "Bridgeton" at the Battery Wharf, compensation to be paid thereat at the rate of \$5 per day, Sundays included, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Reporting that he has agreed to purchase the property of Oliver Bryan, foot of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, for the sum of \$1,500.

On motion, the communication from Oliver Bryan, accepting the said proposition, was ordered on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That pursuant to section 715 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, this Board enters into an agreement with Oliver Bryan for the purchase and acquisition, for the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1,500) dollars, all of his riparian and wharfage rights, and all interest in or appurtenant to the following-described premises, to wit: Land under water in the City of New York, bounded and described as follows: Beginning at a point in the northerly line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, distant about two hundred and thirty feet easterly from the easterly line of Avenue A or Pleasant avenue; thence running easterly along said northerly line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street about twenty-seven feet; thence southeasterly along the northerly line of land under water formerly granted by the City to Phillip Milledollar November 1, 1808, about ten feet; thence southwesterly along the westerly line of the street of forty feet reserved in aforesaid grant about thirty feet to the centre line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street; thence westerly along said centre line of One Hundred and Fourteenth street about twenty-five feet to the easterly line of the property of Phillip Milledollar, taken by the City for the legal opening of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, November 14, 1824; thence along the last-mentioned line about thirty feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less, together with all the rights of wharfage, cranes, advantages and emoluments, and all the riparian rights, titles and easements incident thereto or connected with said premises, the same being a portion of the water grant made by the City to Phillip Milledollar, November 1, 1808, and being all that portion of One Hundred and Fourteenth street not now owned by the City of New York.

The said agreement and purchase to be subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by section 715, chapter 410, of the Laws of 1882.

From Commissioners White and Phelan—Recommending that the rental to be charged Stokes & Thedford for the bulkhead between Piers, new 58 and 59, North river, leased to them on the 3d instant, be fixed at the rate of \$3,500 per annum, payable quarterly, in advance, to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

From Dock Master Woods:

1st. Reporting the pavement at entrance to Pier, old 42, North river, requires raising; that his office requires painting, and that a guard-rail should be placed around the Battery Wharf as a safeguard against accidents. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work if necessary.

2d. Reporting that the embankment north and east of Pier, new 29, North river, has caved in. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to move the guard-rails southward.

From Dock Master Martin—Reporting barge "Senator" sunk in the channel of the Harlem river, off One Hundred and Forty-fifth street. The United States authorities requested to remove the wreck.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending May 19, 1894:

2d. Submitting a statement showing the material required to continue the work ordered by the Board at various sections on the North and East rivers, together with the cost thereof. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare specifications and form of contract for obtaining said supplies.

3d. Reporting that the inner end of Pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street should be replaced, and requesting instructions in regard to the completion of the bulkhead-wall at East One Hundred and Second Street Section. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to complete the work.

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted the following reports on Secretary's Orders:

No. 13610. Cost of repairs to Pier, new 43, North river, damaged by the steamer "Germanic." The Treasurer authorized to collect from the "White Star Line."

No. 13859. As to the request of Lister's Agricultural Chemical Company for the removal of the clump of piles at north side of Pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street. The Counsel to the Corporation requested to advise the Board if there is any legal objection to removing said piles.

No. 13873. Reporting that the experiment of P. J. P. Tynan of an electrical chemical fire extinguisher on the new-made land foot of Morton street, North river, was successful.

No. 13901. Submitting the Speedway Damage Map, with the information requested noted thereon. Transmit said map to the Counsel to the Corporation.

No. 13939. Submitting specifications and form of contract for dredging at Pier, new 57, North river, at West Seventy-second street; and on the North river, between the Battery and Thirty-fourth street, to an extent not exceeding one hundred thousand cubic yards. Approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form and the Secretary directed to advertise for estimates.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported the following work had been done by the force of the Department under Secretary's Orders:

No. 12329. Cleaned silt basins, between Pier "A" and West Eleventh street.

No. 13218. Relaid pavement, between Franklin and Vestry streets, where necessary.

No. 13688. Repaired southerly half of Pier at West Twelfth street.

No. 13827. Drove spring-piles south side of Pier, new 32, East river, and repaired backing-log on said pier.

No. 13893. Tested one barrel of "K. B. & S." cement for Balfour, Williams & Co.

No. 13927. Moved Dock Master's office, from Pier, new 15, to bulkhead north of Pier, old 42, North river.

No. 13938. Prepared specifications and form of contract for dredging for timber basin foot of Seventy-fifth street, North river.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been superintended under Secretary's Orders:

No. 11049. Erection of a temporary fence in rear of bulkhead between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets, North river.

No. 13465. Erection of a shed on Pier foot of West Fifteenth street.

No. 13709. Repairs to sheathing both sides of Pier, old 1, North river.

No. 13713. The erection of boiler, engine-house, etc., on bulkhead between Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, North river.

No. 13808. Repairs to bulkhead between One Hundred and Twelfth and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets, Harlem river.

No. 13810. Repairs to upper half of bulkhead between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, Harlem river.

No. 13811. Repairs to lower half of bulkhead between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, Harlem river.

No. 13840. Placing a bunch of white-oak fender-piles each corner of Pier at Fifteenth street, North river.

No. 13864. Repairs to sheathing, easterly side of Pier 12, East river.

The Engineer-in-Chief returned Secretary's Orders Nos. 13826, 13846 and 13854.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to repair the bulkhead south of Pier, old 54, North river, and keep the silt basins on the new-made land between Pier "A" and West Eleventh street in good order by cleaning when necessary, at an expense not to exceed \$500 in the aggregate.

On motion, the lessees were directed to repair the Pier foot of West Thirty-seventh street.

On motion, the order issued on the 17th instant directing the Engineer-in-Chief to prepare specifications and form of contract for dredging to the extent of one hundred thousand cubic yards on the North and East rivers, was amended by striking out that portion relating to the East river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for a new pier in accordance with the established lines at the foot of East Sixtieth street; and also plans, specifications and form of contract for a new pier in accordance with the established lines at the foot of East Sixty-first street; and also plans, specifications and form of contract for a new pier in accordance with the established lines at the foot of East Sixty-second street; the said plans, etc., to be prepared in duplicate for piers of steel and for piers of wood in each case.

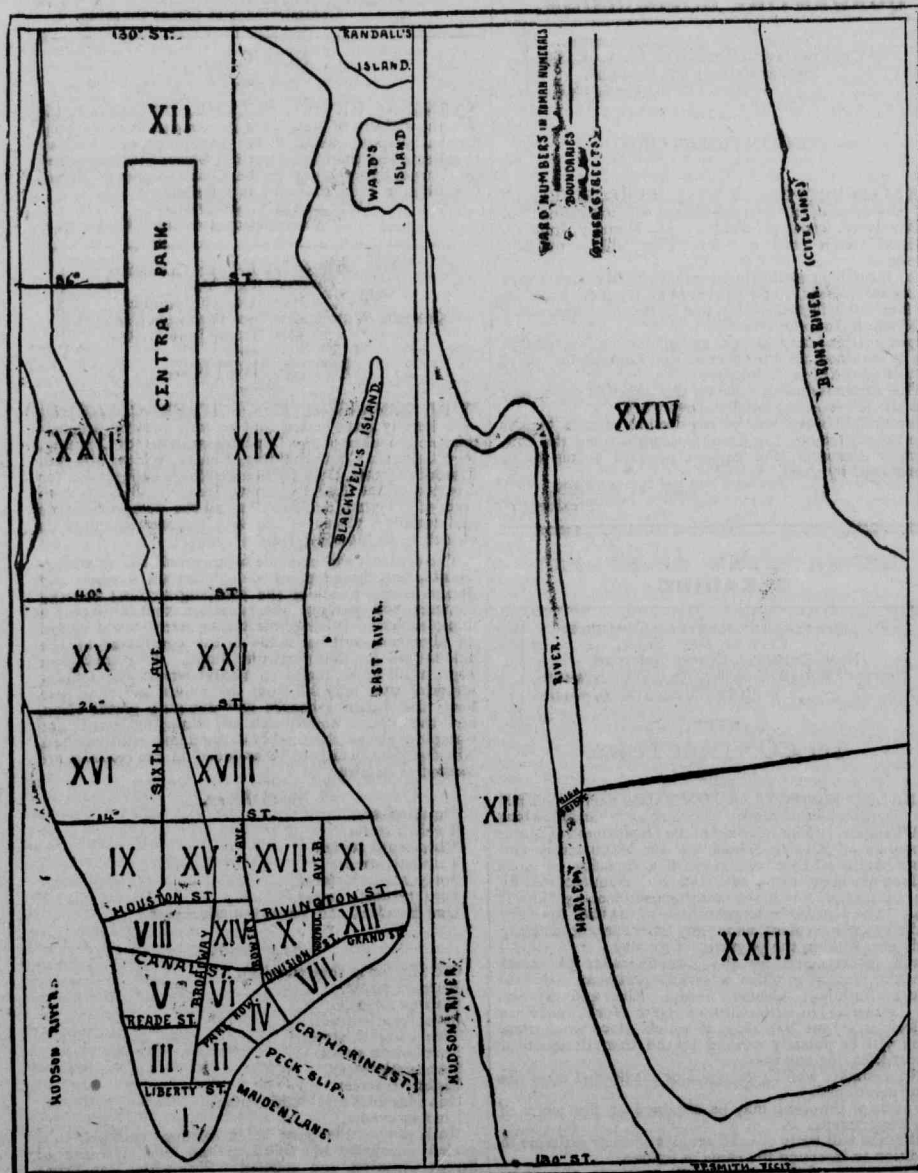

The 721 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.28 against 20.31 for the previous week, and 25.60 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show an increase for the week, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 227, 133, 151, 5 and 34 against 225, 180, 111, 4 and 10 for the previous week, a total of 550 against 530. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twelfth and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Fourteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Eighteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Sixth, Twelfth, Thirteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eleventh, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Seventeenth Ward. Eight of the 34 cases of small-pox were above Fortieth street, and 24 were below Fourteenth street, mainly east of the Bowery and below Canal street.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.
