Dear Sir—I return you herewith petition for extending Evergreen place through to Pellington place, between New Jersey avenue and Pellington place, together with a report made upon the same by Mr. N. P. Lewis, Chief Engineer, on February 17, 1902. Also a map showing just what this petition calls for, as well as the condition of the streets in that vicinity.

The heavy black lines of Pellington place on the map show the part of the street that is laid down on the map and open on the ground. The portion of Pellington place defined by the dotted black lines is in use on the ground, but not laid down on the map. The red lines show the portion of Evergreen place that would be extended under the petition.

In order to make the improvement complete it would seem to me that the proper thing to do would be to extend Pellington place to Highland Boulevard and then make the necessary changes of grade, so that a connection could be gotten through there. A plan to do this was undertaken in 1901, but under the old government not brought to a conclusion. I think these proceedings would be satisfactory if carried through now. I submit the map and these explanations, however, for the Local Board, so that they may know exactly how the thing stands.

Dear Sir—In connection with the accompanying petition to extend Evergreen avenue, between New Jersey avenue and Pellington place, I beg to report that proceedings to make the change asked for were instituted last year; that a public hearing was given on the proposed changes on July 24, and an ordinance was approved by the Board of Public Improvements for transmission to the Municipal Assembly. This plan provided just what is asked in this petition, except that it went a little further and extended Pellington place also from Bushwick avenue to Highland Boulevard, including the necessary changes of grade due to the extension of these streets.

I think there is little doubt but that this proceeding can be pushed to completion and a great amount of time and trouble saved, and I would recommend that the Board of Aldermen be requested to act upon this matter, which is now before them, and as they have already acted upon similar matters transmitted to the old Municipal Assembly by the Board of Public Improvements.

LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER-TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT. MINUTES.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen the members of the Local Board of Chester Twenty-fifth District, met on August 18, 1902, at 3 p. m., at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now, therefore, it is Resolved, by the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to Titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement to wit.
