ABOLISHING GRADE CROSSINGS AT DEPOT PLACE AND EAST ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-SEVENTH STREET, THE BRONX.

The following communication from the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York: GENTLEMEN—The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessee of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, and of the New York and Putnam Railroad, has prepared and herewith submits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, for its approval, pursuant to section 4 of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903:

- (1) Plans and profiles, in duplicate, for abolishing, discontinuing and avoiding the grade crossing at Depot place.
- (2) Plans and profiles, in duplicate, for abolishing, discontinuing and avoiding the grade crossing at Fordham road.
- (3) Plans and profiles, in duplicate, for abolishing, discontinuing and avoiding the grade crossing at East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street.

REPORT No. 1611.

OCTOBER 27, 1903.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying communication from President W. H. Newman of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, dated October 21, 1903, was presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the day of its date, and was referred to the Committee of the Board having in charge the plans of this company for improving its terminal and eliminating grade crossings, to which committee the Engineer of the Board was instructed to report.

Accompanying the letter were plans and profiles in duplicate for abolishing, discontinuing and avoiding present grade crossings at Depot place, High Bridge Station; at Fordham road, Fordham Heights Station, and at East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, Morris Heights Station. I have discussed these plans very fully with the railroad officers, with the borough authorities and with the property owners most intimately affected by the proposed changes.

Taking them up in the order named by President Newman, the changes may be briefly described as follows:

1. The Crossing at Depot Place Near High Bridge Station.

There is at present a grade crossing on the line of Depot place, at which street is located the High Bridge Station of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, and of the New York and Putnam Railroad. It is proposed to carry Depot place over all of these tracks, and to construct a ramp on the westerly side of the tracks reaching the present surface at East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street. This ramp would be 30 feet in width, and would have a grade of 5.2 per cent., while the approach from Sedgwick avenue to the bridge across the railroad tracks would have a grade of 1.35 per cent. This involves no change in the grades of Sedgwick avenue or any of the adjacent streets except Depot place.

The plan which is submitted for adoption suggests that the grade of the bridge—if such bridge be built across the tracks on the line of East One Hundred and Seventy-first street—be fixed at 28.5 feet, instead of 25.0 feet, which is the grade at present shown on the final maps of the Borough of The Bronx.

The principal property owner affected by this change is the Estate of W. B. Ogden, of which Mr. Andrew H. Green is trustee. These plans have been submitted to Mr. Green in so far as they provide for the elimination of the grade crossing at Depot place, and he has said that he would raise no objection to them, being convinced that the solution offered is the best that is attainable. I have also brought to his attention the proposed elevation of the grade of the bridge on the line of East One Hundred and Seventy-first street if such bridge be necessary, and he has suggested that it may be advisable to keep the street shown on the map as Commerce street at a sufficiently low elevation to pass under East One Hundred and Seventy-first street. Any change of this kind would have no bearing upon the problem of eliminating the grade crossing, and I do not think it need be further considered at this time.

The plan presented by the railroad company indicates that additional right of way is to be purchased from a point about 380 feet north of High Bridge to Washington Bridge, the width of the additional strip required having a maximum of about 22 feet 8 inches, with a width of 4½ feet at the southerly side of Washington Bridge. This is required to permit the laying of two additional tracks on the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad.

The approval of the plan submitted is recommended.

2. The Crossing at Fordham Road, at the Fordham Heights Station of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris and the New York and Putnam Railroads.

It is proposed to eliminate this crossing, substituting therefor an overhead crossing at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, which is about 400 feet south of the present crossing at Fordham road. This plan has been discussed very freely with the railroad officials and the borough authorities and the Department of Bridges, as it is intended to establish a direct connection with the new bridge to be built across the Harlem river at One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, provision for which was made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 29, 1903. It is understood that the Commissioner of Bridges will in due time submit a plan for the approaches to this bridge, conforming in all respects with the plan of the railroad company herewith presented.

There are involved in this treatment material changes in the grades of some of the neighboring streets, the rates of which are now so steep as to make traffic on them almost impossible. These changes apply to Fordham road and Harlem River terrace, which it is proposed to raise from 6 to 15 feet; Fordham road and Cedar avenue from 44 to 50 feet; Fordham road at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street from 72 to 76 feet; East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, at the Harlem River terrace, from 25 feet to 30.25 feet; and East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street at Cedar avenue from 43.2 feet to 45.7 feet. This will result in grades which will be practicable, and which will not exceed 6 per cent., while the existing grades are as high as 11 per cent.

It is proposed to reach the present exterior street by a ramp parallel with the new bridge over the Harlem river, doubling on itself and with a grade of 6 per cent.

The plan presented also indicates that additional property will be required on the westerly side of the tracks, the right of way line being moved toward the Harlem river about 12½ feet at East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, about 15 feet opposite East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, about 32 feet at the new bridge at East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and about 22 feet at

the northerly side of Fordham road, from which point the strip to be taken is gradually reduced to the north.

The plan provides for a bridge across the railroad tracks 85 feet in width immediately adjacent to the station, which will be at the level of this bridge, thus affording ample space for approach to the station. It provides also for widening East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, between Harlem River terrace and Fordham road, from 60 to 80 feet. All of this will be more fully shown by the plans to be submitted by the Commissioner of Bridges for the approaches to the new Harlem river bridge.

The plan appears to be satisfactory and its approval is recommended.

3. The Crossing at East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street, Morris Heights Station.

This plan contemplates the abolition of the present grade crossing at East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street by raising the grade and spanning the tracks by a bridge 60 feet in width, which is the width of the present street. From the westerly end of this bridge a ramp will descend at a grade of 5.3 per cent. for a distance of 215 feet, where it will turn through 180 degrees, and descend at the same rate until it reaches the present surface.

This will permit ready access to the manufacturing plants now located between the railroad tracks and the Harlem river. The platform where the ramp turns will be at an elevation of about 15 feet above mean high tide, or about nine feet above the bulkhead. It has been proposed that a recreation pier be built at the foot of East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and access would readily be had to such pier from this platform.

The person most deeply interested in this plan is Mr. Fordham Morris, to whom it has been submitted and who has assured me that he will not oppose its adoption, being convinced that it is the best solution of the problem which can be presented.

The railroad company requires no additional land here on the westerly side of its tract, although the plans would indicate that it is proposed to purchase a strip on the westerly side immediately north of East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street.

It has been necessary to make some changes in the grade of Cedar avenue in order to reach the new overhead crossing. The grade at Cedar avenue and East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street being raised from 17.0 to 24.0. This, however, is the only change which is proposed.

I am convinced, after a careful study, and after consultation with the borough authorities as well as the railroad officers, that the plan submitted is a reasonable one and its approval is recommended.

To the Honorable SETH LOW, Mayor:

SIR—I am preparing to advertise the contract for the construction of the three bridges over the Gowanus canal during the month of December. Is it possible to have the Board of Estimate and Apportionment take up at its meeting to-morrow the matter of the change of grade required for the Hamilton Avenue Bridge, which is now before it? Such action by the Board would greatly facilitate the letting of the contract.

Hamilton Avenue.

Intersection of Hamilton avenue and Bush street to be 9.5 feet as heretofore; thence 160 feet in a southerly direction to an elevation 10.3 feet; thence 148 feet to an elevation 13.90 feet; thence 213 feet to an elevation of 19.80 feet at the

northern end of the proposed new bridge. Beginning at the southerly end of the proposed new bridge elevation 19.80 feet; thence 413 feet to an elevation of 8.50 feet as heretofore.

Smith Street.

Beginning at the intersection of Smith and Bush streets, elevation to be 8 feet as heretofore; thence southerly 185 feet to an elevation of 12.90 feet at the east house line of Hamilton avenue. Beginning again at the intersection of Smith and Lorraine streets, elevation to be 11.90 feet; thence southerly 238 feet to an elevation of 5.20 feet at the north curb line of Creamer street.

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of Edgecombe road where it intersects the land of the Croton Aqueduct, near the southerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, produced easterly, thence northerly and along the easterly line of Edgecombe road to a point opposite the northerly line of West One Hundred and Seventy-second street, thence easterly to the westerly line of the land of the Highbridge Park, thence southerly along said line until it meets the land of the Croton Aqueduct at the centre line of old West One Hundred and Seventieth street, thence southerly along the westerly line of the land of the Croton Aqueduct to the point or place of beginning, the easterly line of Edgecombe road near West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street.

And it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

This amended plan has been accepted by the property owners and is now agreeable to all parties. You are requested to have same brought before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at earliest opportunity for formal hearing and adoption.

The street is now under contract for an asphalt pavement, and the bridge for which the change of grade is required will have been completed before this matter can reach action on the part of the Board of Estimate.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on September 16 last, there was considered a proposition to change the grade of Seeley street, between Eighteenth and Sherman streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn. Serious objection was raised by the property-owners affected to the proposed change, and the matter was laid over until September 23. In the meantime it was shown that the change, which is necessitated by the construction of a concrete steel arch bridge over Prospect avenue, could be accomplished in a manner to avoid damage to the abutting property, and the Borough President was requested to submit a new plan. He has done this with the accompanying letter, dated November 16, and has also furnished a new technical description.

The new grade, while it introduces a rather sharp incline at the easterly end of the bridge—the grade rising 6.2 feet in 124 feet, or at the rate of 5 per cent.—is not objectionable on a street devoted wholly to residences, and it will avoid damage to improved property further to the east.

It is recommended that a new hearing be given, based upon the revised plan and technical description which are herewith submitted.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state the fact, also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
