## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

### LOCAL BOARD—FLATBUSH DISTRICT.

Thursday, June 11, 1903.

Meeting in Borough Hall at 3 p. m.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names: William C. Redfield, Commissioner of Public Works, presiding; Alderman Wentz, Sixty-first Aldermanic District; Alderman Wirth, Sixty-second Aldermanic District; Alderman McInnes, Sixty-third Aldermanic District.

The Commissioner submitted the following:

No. 345.

Altering the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a new street system for that portion of the Borough of Brooklyn between Coney Island avenue and Church avenue, Ocean parkway and Fort Hamilton avenue, as follows:

Locating and laying out of Montgomery street, from Coney Island avenue to East Seventh street.

Johnson street, from Coney Island avenue to Ocean parkway.

Henry street, from East Eighth street to Ocean parkway.

Caton place, from Coney Island avenue to Ocean parkway.

East Eighth street, from Church lane to Johnson street, and by striking from the map of the City the following streets:

East Seventh street, from Henry street to Ocean parkway.

East Eighth street, from Church lane to Caton avenue.

Caton avenue, from Coney Island avenue to Ocean parkway, in the Twenty-ninth Ward.

Laid over and referred to Alderman McInnes.

Mr. JUSTIN McCARTHY, Jr., Secretary, Borough of Brooklyn:

Dear Sir—Referring to grading and paving report No. 225, handed you on December 9, 1902, and subsequently passed by the Local Board, in the matter of regulating, grading, etc., Caton avenue, from that portion of the street already asphalted to St. Paul's place, etc., will you kindly bring the matter up at to-morrow's meeting of the Flatbush Local Board to change the specifications from bluestone curb to cement curb?

Memorandum.

Caton avenue, from Flatbush avenue to Brighton Beach Railroad, now paved with asphalt, has cement curb. Road bed is 39 feet in width, fixed by resolution of the Municipal Assembly, approved June 4, 1901. Present resolution for paving Caton avenue, from Brighton Beach Railroad to St. Paul's place, calls for bluestone curb; present width of road bed is 44 feet.

Query: Should not the roadway in the latter district be reduced in width to 39 feet, to correspond with the balance of the street, and should not the curb be of cement instead of bluestone, to correspond with the balance of the street?

Resolution to pave Caton avenue reads "From the Brighton Beach Railroad tracks to St. Paul's place." Should not this read "From the right of way of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad," inasmuch as the railroad tracks are situated some 15 feet below the surface of the street?

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the width of the roadway and sidewalks of Caton avenue, from right of way of Brighton Beach Railroad to St. Paul's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The roadway of Caton avenue, between right of way of Brighton Beach Railroad and St. Paul's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is hereby reduced in width from 44 feet to 39 feet, and the sidewalks of said street are hereby increased 2½ feet on each side.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Mr. JUSTIN McCARTHY, Jr., Secretary to the Local Boards, Brooklyn, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—I am informed that it will be impracticable to get the easements which will be required on Seeley street to construct the sewer in this street, Vanderbilt street, East Fifth street, etc., now pending in Miss Agar's hands.

I therefore suggest that street opening proceedings be started at once, be duly advertised and brought before the proper Local Board in order to expedite this all possible.

The street opening proceedings for East Fifth street are already under way, which are but part of the same matter. If it had been practicable to get the easements for Seeley street the matter of East Fifth street could have been easily arranged, but I regret the failure to get these easements makes it necessary to take street opening proceedings, which will hold up this important sewer until next year.

Dear Sir—May I ask that you kindly bring up at the meeting of the Flatbush Board to-morrow, the 11th instant, the matter of excluding from the opening proceedings that portion of East Fifth street, between the centre lines of Church avenue and Albemarle road, because this will be at once ceded to the City as soon as such exclusion is made.

The Bureau of Street Openings informs me that since the City has not vested title this change can be readily made by the Local Board; it will then, of course, have to go to the Board of Estimate for approval.

Mr. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I return you herewith sketch showing East Fifth street, between Vanderbilt street and Eighteenth avenue. The colored portion of this shows what portion has been open five years or more according to the proposed affidavit. Mr. Bischof has examined this and reports that in his judgment there is no question that from Vanderbilt street to Fort Hamilton avenue the street has been in use for more than five years, probably from fifteen to twenty-five years. From Fort Hamilton avenue to about 100 feet south of Caton avenue he says water pipes have been laid, and it has probably been in use for three years. From Church avenue to Avenue B he says there are chicken houses extending over the line of the street, and that it has water and has been in use for probably thirteen years. From Avenue B to Avenue C it is in use to a point about 400 feet south of Avenue B, and has a row of trees near the curb line about 20 inches in diameter. It is not known how long the street has been in use. From a short line north of Avenue D to a point about 250 feet south of Ditmas avenue he says there is only a wagon track; from that point south to about 475 feet of Ditmas avenue he says there is not even a wagon track.

It seems to me from Mr. Bischof's report that it would not be sufficient to consider affidavits as reliable except between Fort Hamilton avenue and Vanderbilt street.

Dear Sir—On the 15th instant your Secretary transmitted to me a communication from the Chief Engineer of the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, dated May 14, 1903, who requests that sewer basins be installed at the intersection of Church avenue and Westminster road (East Twelfth street) to prevent the collection of water at this intersection, which is detrimental to the operation of the cars of the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company.

Dear Sir—I herewith return a communication, which you referred to me, the same being addressed to the Bureau of Sewers by the Secretary of the President of the Borough, dated May 5, 1903, requesting information in relation to the construction of a sewer basin on the north and south sides of Linden avenue, 220 feet from Flatbush avenue.

I beg to state that the Chief Engineer of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, reports to me as follows:

"I beg to advise that these basins are necessitated by a change of grade of Linden avenue between Flatbush avenue and Rogers avenue, etc., this change leaving a depression in the grade at the above point. (See "City Record," page 1603, February 24, 1903, No. 84, approved papers, approved by Mayor February 16, 1903.)

I beg to report that the estimated cost for above basins is \$400, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$127,000.
