Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Synopsis of Minutes of August 3, 1911.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on August 3, 1911. Present: Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Drummond, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meeting of June 6, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved. Bills amounting to \$44,639.35, were approved and ordered to be forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

In accordance with the resolution of the Board several months ago, providing for two Internes in the alcoholic service, each to serve six months, Dr. Gregory, the Resident Alienist, recommends the appointment of Dr. Floyd H. Jones and Dr. Leroy Charles Grau, to serve from July 1 to December 31, 1911.

Considerable difficulty is experienced in controlling the visitors to the alcoholic and prison wards because of lack of restriction upon such visits. It is recommended that visitors to these wards be restricted absolutely to special permission by the Physician in Charge; and that the hospital have the authority to search such visitors if it seems necessary or desirable to the Resident Physician.

In view of the recent general publicity attending the finding of a Coroner's jury in connection with the case of Anton Kotte, submitted herewith are the actual facts of this case. Mr. Kotte was brought to Bellevue Hospital by an ambulance from Flower Hospital suffering from contusion of the hip caused by being crushed between an ice wagon and an automobile. He was delirious following his admission, and was passing into a condition of delirium tremens. The contusion about his hip was recognized by the surgeons here, but no distinct fracture could be determined, his condition being such that he could not be taken to the X-ray room. When asked as to the nature of his injuries, he said on one occasion that he had fallen downstairs, and on another that he had been struck by an automobile. His delirium became so active that on the third day after his admission he was transferred to Ward 30, where he died a few hours later. The usual blank of information was sent to the Morgue. One or more of our physicians were present at the autopsy, and in conversation gave any additional facts that may not have appeared on the written form. At the autopsy, a fracture of the ileum was discovered, and the Coroner stated to the doctors present that it was not surprising they had not found this fracture as it would have been very difficult to diagnose. In order that the matter might be fully investigated as to the contusion, etc., it was made a Coroner's case by the hospital. The diagnosis of delirium tremens was made by several of the different physicians who had charge of him, and is corroborated by the symptoms manifested, together with the fact that this patient was treated for alcoholism in Ward 30 during January of this year, and that during the last hours of his illness his sister was present at his bedside and said to one of the doctors that if the patient recovered his health she hoped he would lead a better life. The hospital was not informed and had no knowledge that the case was to be considered by a Coroner's jury, as no one from the hospital nor its records were subpoenaed, as is ordinarily done in these cases.

A statement has been received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor that there is a deficit in the appropriations for the current year amounting to \$29,000, and it is asked that additional funds be requested as follows:

It is recommended that the General Medical Superintendent be authorized to exempt patients admitted to the prison and psychopathic wards from reimbursing the hospital for their care and treatment, except such cases as have friends who volunteer to make payment.

The Board took action upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

Dr. Floyd H. Jones and Dr. Leroy C. Grau were appointed Voluntary Assistants on the alcoholic service, as recommended.

The recommendations in regard to the better control of the visitors to the alcoholic and prison wards were adopted.

It was resolved to bring the facts in connection with the death of Anton Kotte to the attention of the Board of Coroners.

It was resolved to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an appropriation of revenue bonds to the amount of \$29,000.

The recommendation in regard to the exemption of patients admitted to the prison and psychopathic wards from reimbursing the hospital for their care and treatment was approved.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Nathan Settel and Dr. David A. Swick as Assistant Physicians to Out-Patients. This report was approved, and the appointments were made.

On the recommendation of the Fordham Hospital Conference Committee, Dr. Hugh A. Riley was appointed Assistant Physician to Out-Patients (nose and throat); the place of Assistant Pathologist was created, and Dr. Morris Grossman appointed to fill the place.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee further reported that a special meeting had been held that day, at which the President of the Board of Trustees, the General Medical Superintendent and the President of the Medical Board were present, and that full consideration had been given to the recommendation of the Medical Board covering the establishment of a continuous service on the surgical division and recommended that the plan of the Medical Board be approved, namely, a continuous service of six months for each of the four Visiting Surgeons, the appointment of two additional Assistant Visiting Surgeons, all four of whom shall serve alternately six months in the ward service and six months in the Out-Patient Department, and the appointment of four additional Internes. These recommendations were adopted.

Communications dated July 17 and August 7 were received from the architects, McKim, Mead & White, transmitting final payment in favor of the American Laundry Machinery Company for the equipment of the pathological building, and certifying that the contract was completed on April 30, the date of the expiration thereof, but that the issue of the bill had been delayed pending certain repairs which the American Laundry Machinery Company had voluntarily made in order to allow their work to be tested. The bill was ordered certified to the Comptroller for full payment.

A communication dated July 20 was received from McKim, Mead & White relative to the communication presented at last meeting from the Department of Finance, and stating that it was not intended that the contractor should enclose the lower floor of the loggias and that this was made known to all of the bidders. The President reported that he had transmitted a copy of this letter to the Department of Finance. This action was approved.

A communication dated July 21 was received from the Law Department, stating that the Board is without power to provide the assistance requested by the Women's Auxiliary to the Bellevue Tuberculosis Clinic. It was therefore resolved to deny the request referred to, but to inform the Auxiliary that the Trustees are glad to grant permission to use the name "Bellevue Settlement House."

A communication dated July 21 was received from the State Charities Aid Association, transmitting suggestions relating to the construction of a new outpatient department at Gouverneur Hospital.

Copies were ordered sent to the architects, the members of the Building Committee, and the Supervising Nurse, for their consideration in planning the new building.

A communication dated August 1 was received from Dr. Baker, Director of Child Hygiene of the Board of Health, relative to the qualifications required for

admission to the training school for midwives. This communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent, with authority to advertise the school and to provide the instruction to meet the present licensing requirements of the Board of Health apart from the regular six months' course of training.

A communication dated July 29 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, approving the plans and specifications for the fire alarm system at Harlem Hospital.

A communication was also received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment dated July 26, approving the plans and specifications for the erection of tree guards and gratings at Bellevue Hospital.

A communication was received from the Department of Finance dated July 20, directing that no contracts should be drawn toward the close of any year unless the work or supplies are applicable to the year in which the contract is issued. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to comply with this request.

A communication dated July 31 was received from Dr. John H. Huddleston, transmitting report of the tuberculosis clinic at Gouverneur Hospital for the year 1910. It was resolved to thank Dr. Huddleston, and to order the report to be printed with the reports of the other tuberculosis clinics.

The General Medical Superintendent submitted a communication dated August 3 received from the General Superintendent of Training Schools, requesting that revenue bonds in the amount of \$4,300 be obtained to meet the salaries of additional Nurses which would be required for the remainder of the year. This communication was referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

In accordance with the recommendation received from the Contract Clerk dated August 2, it was resolved to request the transfer of \$1,000 within the appropriations as follows: From "241—Purchase of furniture and fittings, 1911," to "240—Apparatus, machinery, vehicles, harness, etc., 1911."

The President reported that the Board of Aldermen had approved the issue of corporate stock recommended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for building purposes in this Department; that he had asked the Medical Boards of the various hospitals to appoint committees to assist in planning the extensions, etc., and that he had written the architects urging that the plans be completed with the utmost possible despatch. This action was approved, and the President was authorized to ask Dr. Goldwater to assume his duties so that his assistance may be obtained in the preparation of the plans.

In view of Dr. Walter H. Conley having accepted an appointment in the Department of Public Charities it was resolved that the action of the Board on May 31 appointing him Assistant Medical Superintendent be reconsidered and that the appointment be cancelled.

The selection of architects for the extension of Harlem Hospital was referred to the Building Committee with power.

It was resolved to appoint George C. Stoddard to survey the grading of that portion of the Bellevue Hospital grounds that lies along the river front at a cost not exceeding \$80.

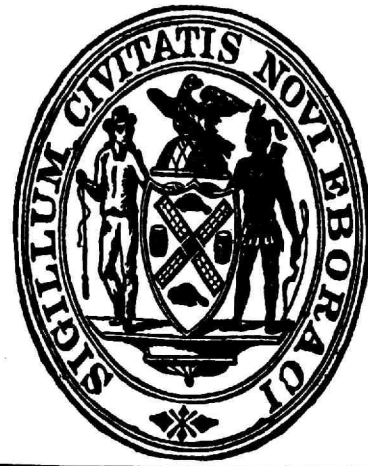

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto, will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either of any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
