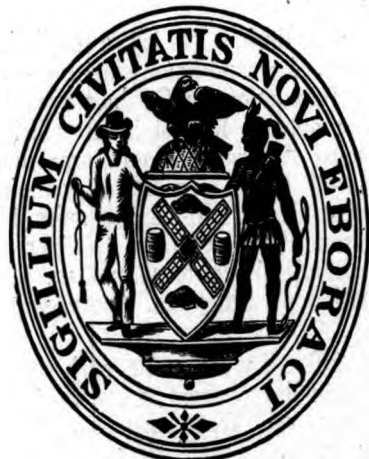

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York held February 25, 1913, the bringing of fat and green (fresh) bones into The City of New York, except such fats as are wholly and exclusively used for the preparation of edible products, was prohibited on and after June 1, 1913; and

Whereas, It appears by the report of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent dated June 28, 1913, that the business of bringing fats from places outside The City of New York is not a nuisance in any way when properly conducted; and that the said business can be so conducted; it is therefore hereby

Resolved, That the resolution aforesaid, dated February 25, 1913, be and the same is hereby amended so as to allow the bringing of fats and green (fresh) bones into The City of New York in accordance with the provisions of section 98 of the Sanitary Code, pursuant to a permit from this Board, and in accordance with rules and regulations which may be prescribed from time to time therefor.

EXAMINING BOARD OF PLUMBERS.

Notice.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS of chapter 755 of the Laws of 1913, the following rules adopted by the Examining Board of Plumbers at a meeting held June 13, 1913, are hereby published in the City Record. The Board will be glad to receive from persons interested any suggestions as to changes in these rules.

J. A. GLENDINNING, Secretary.

I. Persons applying for examination for certificates to engage in the business of master or employing plumber shall, before being examined, file with the Board applications on such forms as may be prescribed by the Board, and shall furnish to the Board such information as it may require concerning the applicant's fitness and qualifications to receive a certificate as aforesaid. All applications must be under oath.

The Board may refuse to examine persons who do not show that they are qualified to engage in or to conduct the business of master or employing plumber.

II. No person shall be examined unless he shall have had at least three (3) years' experience as a journeyman plumber and is able to furnish satisfactory evidence of such fact.

No person shall be examined who is at the time of taking such examination not a citizen of the United States.

III. All applicants shall be required to submit to a practical test of their skill as journeymen, and no person shall be given a certificate unless by such test he shows proper skill as a journeyman, except that where the applicant by reason of physical disability, or infirmity, is not able to perform such test the Board may waive such test and shall enter a record of such waiver upon its minutes.

IV. Persons who possess the preliminary requisites and shall have passed the practical test as to their skill as journeymen shall be

eligible to take the examination as to their qualifications and fitness to engage in the calling of master or employing plumber.

V. The examinations as to fitness and qualifications to engage in the business or calling of master or employing plumber shall be conducted in English and shall be written, and may include the drawing of plans for plumbing work.

The Board may provide, however, for the holding of examinations in languages other than English and for the holding of oral examinations in special cases where the applicant may feel difficulty in expressing himself in writing. All oral examinations shall be reduced to typewriting and all examinations in languages other than English shall be translated and reduced to typewriting, and these typewritten answers shall be filed as the examination of the applicants. Any additional expense incurred by reason of giving an oral examination or an examination in a language other than English shall be borne by the applicant.

VI. Before issuing a certificate to engage in the business of master or employing plumber the Board shall inquire into the fitness and qualifications of the applicant for conducting such business, and may require the applicant to submit under oath such evidence, in addition to the examinations and tests hereinbefore provided, as will satisfy the Board that he is a person of good repute, character and responsibility, and otherwise qualified to engage in business as a master or employing plumber. The Board may accept as evidence of the business responsibility of the applicant a bond in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000), which bond shall run to The City of New York, the Examining Board of Plumbers and to any resident for whom plumbing work is done by the person by whom the certificate is sought, and shall be conditioned upon the observance of the lawful rules and regulations regarding plumbing and drainage in The City of New York and compliance with the rules of the Board. Where such bond is accepted the Board may issue a certificate to the effect that the person granted a certificate has filed such bond.

VII. All examination papers and all records relating to the examination of applicants shall be open to public inspection under such office restrictions as the Board may from time to time establish.

VIII. All examinations or tests conducted by the Board shall at all times be public under such reasonable restrictions as may from time to time be established by the Board.

IX. An applicant failing in the practical test may, upon the payment of the cost of another test, be re-examined in such practical test the following month.

An applicant failing in the written or oral examination may be re-examined in the same without additional charge the following month.

After an applicant has been re-examined in either the practical or written test once he may not take another test for six (6) months, and for each succeeding failure a period of six (6) months must elapse before he may be re-examined.

An applicant once satisfactorily passing in the practical test need not be re-examined therein.

Each applicant for examination shall pay the sum of five dollars (\$5) and the further sum of five dollars (\$5) upon the issuance of a certificate to engage in the business of master or employing plumber.

Where an applicant has paid the first \$5 for examination, and failed, for each subsequent practical examination he shall pay an amount to be fixed by the Board covering the actual cost of same, and an amount of \$1 for each written examination after the first re-examination.

X. In case a certificate of competency is lost by the holder thereof, the Board may issue a duplicate where such original certificate was issued during the term of office of all the members of the Board in office when such duplicate certificate is requested. In other cases of lost certificates the Board shall issue a certificate stating that the records in its office show that a certificate was formerly issued to a specific person.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
