### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

#### Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M. on Thursday, June 6, 1918.

Present at roll call: John F. Hylan, Mayor; Louis H. Hahlo, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Alfred J. Johnson, Chamberlain; Alfred E. Smith, President, Board of Aldermen; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen. The Comptroller arrived later. See note.

The minutes of the meeting held May 16, 1918, were approved as printed in the City Record May 25, 1918, and minutes of meeting held May 23, 1918, as printed in the City Record May 31, 1918.

#### Dock Department—Proposed Lease to the Cunard Steamship Company, Ltd., of Pier 71, Foot of West 31st Street, North River, Together with the Half Bulkhead Northerly Thereof (Cal. No. 8).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated May 29, 1918, requesting approval of a lease to the Cunard Steamship Company, Ltd., of Pier 71, foot of West 31st street, North River, with one half (78.63 feet) of the bulkhead northerly thereof, for a term of five years from August 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$73,214. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Dock Department, including the standard "new plan" clause providing for the cancelling of the lease if the adoption of a plan for the improvement of the west side waterfront is in any way affected by the company's occupancy of the pier.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

#### Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to an Issue of Corporate Stock to the Extent of \$5,000 for Dredging Coney Island Creek, Between Warehouse Avenue and West 17th Street Bridge (Cal. No. 9).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated May 29, 1918, calling attention to the necessity of creating a channel in Coney Island Creek, at an estimated cost of \$5,000. The shoaling in the creek is due to the flowing in of sand composing the filling along the property known as the Harway Tract, which is claimed to be owned both by the City and the Harway Improvement Company, and litigation is now in progress to determine the ownership.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

#### Dock Department—In the Matter of the Request of, for Authorization to Pay the Premium on Fire Insurance on Piers Between 44th and 58th Streets, North River (Cal. No. 10).

This matter was on the calendar of meeting held May 2, 1918, and referred to the Committee on Dock Leases and waterfront property.

At meeting held May 9, 1918, this Committee was abolished and the matter referred to the Committee of the Whole.

At meeting of the Committee of the Whole, held May 23, 1918, the matter was ordered restored to the calendar for action.

The following resolution was offered for adoption.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Docks, in a communication dated April 17, 1918, has requested the authorization for the payment of the premium on fire insurance on piers between 44th and 58th sts., North River, leased to the United States of America, and contracted for during the year 1917, and for which no appropriation was made for the payment of the said premium.

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the City should not carry insurance on these piers, and that the claim of John M. Riehle & Co. for the payment of the premium should be presented to the Comptroller for settlement and adjustment.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

#### Dock Department—In the Matter of the Request of, for an Issue of \$11,000 of Corporate Stock to Pay the Cost of Material and Labor Necessary to Rebuild the Bulkhead South of East 115th Street, Harlem River, Manhattan (Cal. No. 11).

This matter was on the calendar of meeting held May 2, 1918, and referred to the Committee of the Whole.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated May 31, 1918, withdrawing communication dated March 15, 1918, and substituting a new letter therefor, relative to the bulkhead south of East 115th street, Harlem River, Borough of Manhattan, and recommending that a resolution be adopted recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of the City of New York in the sum of \$11,000, to pay the cost of material and labor necessary to rebuild this bulkhead.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

#### Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to Dredging Necessary to Be Done in the Slips Adjoining Leased Property in the Chelsea Section on the North River (Cal. No. 12).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks dated May 22, 1918, calling attention to the fact that the lease of the piers in the Chelsea section to the International Mercantile Marine Company provides that the City shall do the necessary dredging in the slips adjoining the leased property. According to the report of the Chief Engineer of the Dock Department, dredging is now necessary to the extent of 61,500 cubic yards, the estimated cost of which is \$24,600.

There are nine parcels of water-front property occupied under temporary permits, at which the City must do the dredging, the estimated amount of which is 13,000 cubic yards, and the probable cost \$11,800.

There are no funds available for the Dock Department to contract for the dredging at the above described properties. An arrangement can probably be made with the lessees in one case and the permittees in the other, whereby the work of dredging will be done at their expense, provided consent is obtained to reimburse them by deductions in rent.

If the Dock Department is to do the dredging, it will be necessary to prepare the form of contract, advertise and obtain the necessary funds, all of which consume about two or three months' time. If the work is done by the lessee or permittee, bids can be obtained from them, submitted to the Dock Department for approval, and the work begun in two or three weeks.

The Commissioner requests that he be authorized to modify the lease in the case of the leased property, and to make a suitable reduction in the rent in the case of the property under permit.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

#### Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to the Astoria Ferry (Cal. No. 13).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks dated May 23, 1918, transmitting for consideration a communication dated May 15, 1918, from the

New York and East River Ferry Company, respecting the continuance of the operation of the ferry between East 92d street, Manhattan, and Fulton avenue, Astoria, Queens.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

**Dock Department—In the Matter of the Boundary Line Agreement with Messrs. Williams and Adams (Cal. No. 14).**

This matter was on the calendar of meeting held May 9, 1918, and referred to the Committee of the Whole.

A communication was received from Messrs. Truman H. and George E. Baldwin, attorneys, dated May 31, 1918, on behalf of the Bergen Beach Land Corporation, urging the signing and delivery at the earliest possible moment of the deeds of mutual release provided for in the agreement between Messrs. Williams and Adams and the City, authorized by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund July 26, 1917.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

**Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at Nos. 370-372 East 152d Street, The Bronx (Cal. No. 15).**

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

May 16, 1918.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication dated April 3, 1918, requests the renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a stable at Nos. 370-372 East 152d street, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of three years from July 10, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under lease made as follows: January 1, 1915—July 10, 1918, \$2,500 a year, December 2, 1914.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose.

The nearest City-owned property is at No. 330 East 150th street, occupied by the Fire Department.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

There are no other similar premises in the vicinity with which comparison can be made, as property of this character and size is in great demand for use as garages and shops.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the said lease under the same terms and conditions as the present lease.

Of premises Nos. 370-372 East 162d street, Borough of The Bronx, situated on the south side of East 152d street, 155 feet east of Courtland avenue, consisting of a plot of land 70 feet by 115 feet 4 inches, with three-story building 30 feet by 110 feet, with manure pit at end of driveway, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from July 10, 1918, at an annual rental of \$2,500, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and assessments, make outside repairs; the lessee to pay for water used on the demised premises during the term of the lease and make such alterations and inside repairs as it may deem necessary. Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, of a renewal of the lease to the City of the premises Nos. 370-372 E. 152d st., Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from July 10, 1918, at an annual rental of Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and assessments, make outside repairs; the lessee to pay for water used on the demised premises during the term of the lease and make such alterations and inside repairs as it may deem necessary; lessors, J. & M. Haffen Brewing Company; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

**Street Cleaning Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at No. 365 East 152d Street, The Bronx (Cal. No. 16).**

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

May 17, 1918.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Dear Sirs—The Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication dated April 3, 1918, requests a renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a stable at 365 East 152d street, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of three years from July 10, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

The Commissioner of Street Cleaning states that last year an effort was made to obtain the property owned by the City bounded by Ray and Carr streets, German place and St. Ann's avenue, for the purpose of erecting a garage, machine shop, stable and shed, thereby avoiding the necessity of renewing the lease of these premises at 365 East 152d street, as well as those at 370-372 East 152d street, but the Department of Education, to which the property had been assigned, refused to surrender it for more than two years from November 1, 1917. This restriction prevented the placing of the proposed permanent structures and compelled him to ask for a renewal of the two leases above mentioned.

Provision for a renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under lease made as follows: July 10, 1913, July 10, 1918, \$5,700 a year, June 11, 1913.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose.

The nearest City-owned property is at No. 330 East 150th street, occupied by the Fire Department for use of Engine Company No. 41.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for this purpose.

There are no other similar premises in the vicinity with which comparison may be made, the property of this character and size being in great demand for use as garages and shops.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of said lease on the same terms and conditions as the present lease.

Of the stable premises on plot of ground 100 feet by 100 feet, at 365 East 152d street, 125 feet east of Courtland avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from July 10, 1918, at an annual rental of \$5,700, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and assessments, the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat and light and make such inside and outside repairs as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Estate of S. Niewenhouz, 412 Eighth Avenue, Borough of Manhattan. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning of a renewal of the lease to the City of the stable premises on plot of ground, 100 by 100 feet, at 365 E. 152d st., 125 feet east of Cortland ave., Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from July 10, 1918, at an annual rental of Five Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$5,700), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and assessments; the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat and light and make such inside and outside repairs as it may deem necessary; lessor, Estate of S. Niewenhouz; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

**Street Cleaning Department—Request of, for a Renewal of the Lease of Premises Nos. 535-537 Fordham Road, Bronx (Cal. No. 17).**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, dated May 24, 1918, requesting authority to renew the lease of premises Nos. 535-537 Fordham road, The Bronx, occupied as a storage yard for vehicles kept at Stable A, for a period of one year from June 15, 1918, at an annual rental of \$420, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and assessments; the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and caretaker, and to make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

**Street Cleaning Department—Request of, for Approval of a Lease of Vacant Plot of Land on 152d Street, East of Morris Avenue, The Bronx (Cal. No. 18).**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, dated May 27, 1918, requesting approval of a lease of the vacant plot of land on the north side of East 152d street, 70 feet 3 inches easterly from the intersection of the north-east corner of Morris avenue and East 152d street, 100 by 100 feet, for use as a storage yard for vehicles kept at Stable B, for a period of three years beginning July 10, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,950, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and keep the fences in repair.

Which was referred to Comptroller.

**Street Cleaning Department—In the Matter of the Request of, for a Lease of Vacant Plot of Land on the North Side of Pelham Avenue, East of Bathgate Avenue, Bronx (Cal. No. 19).**

This matter was on the calendar of meeting held May 23, 1918 (No. 18), referred to the Committee of the Whole and the President of the Borough of The Bronx requested to report whether there is any objection to the placing of a storage yard at this location.

The following communication was received from the President of the Borough: May 21, 1918.

Mr. JOHN KORB, Secretary, Sinking Fund Commission, Municipal Building, Manhattan:

Dear Sir—I have your letter of the 23rd instant, wherein you request a report from me as to whether there is any objection to the placing of the storage yard of the Department of Street Cleaning on the four lots on the north side of Pelham avenue, east of Bathgate avenue.

In reply I beg leave to inform you that a protest has been entered by the Rev. Father Mulry, President of Fordham University, who states it would be a decided detriment to St. John's University to have the storage yard placed at the proposed location. Very truly yours,

On motion, the matter was referred back to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for a conference with the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

**Health Department—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at No. 49 Amboy Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 20).**

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

May 29, 1918.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Dear Sirs—The Secretary of the Health Department in a communication dated April 22, 1918, requests a renewal of the lease of premises occupied as a Baby Health Station at 49 Amboy street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of one year from July 15, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for a renewal of this lease was not made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

July 15, 1912, to July 15, 1915, \$354 a year, June 12, 1912 (with heat and light).

July 15, 1915, to July 15, 1917, \$354 a year, July 15, 1915 (with heat and light).

July 15, 1917, to July 15, 1918, \$300 a year, July 12, 1917 (no heat or light).

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose.

The nearest City-owned property is on the south side of Sutter avenue, between Grafton and Barrett streets, occupied as Public School 156.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rents in the vicinity, is as follows:

The premises occupied by the City contain 720 square feet, which at a rental of \$300 a year, is at the rate of 41.7 cents per square foot.

The store at 60 Amboy street, containing 300 square feet, rents for \$216 a year, or at the rate of 72 cents per square foot.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of said lease upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease.

Of the one-story brick-filled building 24 feet by 30 feet, with double store front, at 49 Amboy street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from July 15, 1918, at an annual rental of \$300, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such slight interior alterations and repairs during occupancy as it may deem necessary. Lessor, David Mickelbank, 1597 Pitkin avenue, Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of the store premises at No. 49 Amboy st., Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from July 15, 1918, at an annual rental of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300), payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates; the lessee to furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such slight interior alterations and repairs during occupancy as it may deem necessary; lessor, David Mickelbank; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

**Municipal Building—Rescindment of Resolution Setting Apart Space in, for Use as an Emergency Hospital (Cal. No. 21).**

This matter was on the calendar of meeting held May 16, 1918 (Cal. No. 18), and referred to the Committee of the Whole.

At meeting of the Committee of the Whole held the same day the matter was ordered restored to the calendar for action.

The following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held July 26, 1917, setting apart and assigning for use as an Emergency Hospital, Rooms 2514, 2515 and 2518, containing 960 square feet of space, in the Municipal Building, Borough of Manhattan, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

**Fire Department—Request of, for a Renewal of the Lease of Premises on Grove Street, Boulevard, Rockaway Beach, Queens (Cal. No. 23).**

A communication was received from the Fire Department dated May 28, 1918, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises on the west side of Grove street, Boulevard, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, temporarily occupied by Engine Company No. 206, for a period of one year from September 1, 1918.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

**Fire Department—Request of, for a Renewal of the Lease of Premises on the North Side of Lawrence Avenue, Near Third Street, Parkville, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 24).**

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of May 19, 1917, presenting for approval a map showing a proposed Public Park within the lines of 18th (Inman-4th) avenue, between 126th (17th-Quinlan) street and 127th (18th-Rockville) street.

This Park, which is to have a width of 19 feet and a length of about 200 feet, with an area of about 0.09 acre, is to be centrally located in the block of 18th avenue which, as now in use and improved, has a width of 109.90 feet and forms the extreme easterly terminal of 18th avenue, which here meets the College Point station of the Long Island Railroad. As shown upon the previously approved tentative plan of the territory, the continuing portion of the street to the west is to have a width of 60 feet, which width the plan now presented indicates is to be decreased to 59.94 feet, the change, it is understood, being desired in order to harmonize with the lines to which the street is in use.

The map also shows that the widths of the streets intersecting 18th avenue are in each case to be made 49.95 feet, the propriety of which is subject to considerable question, since each of them may be construed as of sufficient importance to justify provision for a greater width.

An inspection shows that the proposed park has already been improved as a mall, and it is understood that adoption of the plan is desired in order that steps may be taken to place jurisdiction over it in the Park Department.

I see no reason why the plan should not be approved, providing that formal advice is first received from the Park Commissioner to show that he is prepared to accept jurisdiction over the park, and with the further understanding that the approval of the plan will be followed by action on the part of the Sinking Fund Commissioners providing for a transfer of jurisdiction from the President of the Borough to the Park Department. To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on May 9th, I was instructed to submit a report in the matter of the proposed transfer of jurisdiction from the President of the Borough of Queens to the Park Department over a park laid out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 15, 1918, in 18th (Inman-4th) avenue, between 126th (17th-Quinlan) street and 127th (18th-Rockville) street (Calendar Nos. 50 and 70).

As now in use, 18th avenue in the block described has a width of 109.9 feet and leads directly to the College Point station of the Long Island Railroad. In improving the street a mall, centrally located, has been constructed with a width of 19 feet. The object of the Board in laying out this mall as a public park was to clear the way for its care by the Park Department. The plan was prepared and its adoption was recommended by the Borough President, and request for transfer of jurisdiction has been made by the Park Commissioner.

It would seem that the proposed treatment is a rational one, for the reason that the offices of the Borough Presidents are without facilities for properly maintaining malls of this character, and, unless community interest can be aroused to the point of exercising responsibility for them, or unless formal authorization is assigned to the Park Commissioner, they lose entirely the attractive qualities which they should possess.

I am informed that title to a portion of the width of this street was acquired by the Trustees of the former village of College Point in 1870, and that under date of December 9, 1913, the Corporation Counsel advised the Borough President that the street is dedicated to public use. Respectfully,

**Petition of Agnes Somerville for a Release of the City's Interest in Certain Property in Coney Island Plank Road (Cal. No. 37).**

This matter was No. 37 on the calendar of meeting held May 9th and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a report as to whether or not the property is needed for any public use.

The Engineer reported as follows:

"From information at hand it appears that an application has been made to you by Edward L. Somerville for a deed to this property, which falls within the lines of an old street now outside of the street system as laid out and improved. The parcel is located within the lines of an old plank road which was not included within the lines of Neptune avenue, title to which at a width of 80 feet was acquired under proceedings confirmed in 1889.

"I can see no occasion for retaining this parcel for street purposes, and it could not be devoted to other use without depriving adjoining owners of street frontage."

**Petition of Barnet Weiner for a Release of the City's Interest in Certain Lands in Hunterfly Road, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 38).**

This matter was No. 38 on the calendar of meeting held May 9th and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate for a report as to whether or not the property is needed for any public use.

The Chief Engineer reported as follows:

"I am informed that the old Hunterfly road was closed and discontinued on March 23, 1863, by the Commissioners of Highways, and in consideration of the substitution of another thoroughfare the property owners agreed to release all claims for damage by reason of the change.

"The parcels described in the petition in each case are in the character of gories, and I can see no way practicable for their utilization either as a part of the street system or for other public use.

"From the application it would appear that the City has already released its title to the property, but that prior to the execution of the release the grantees had conveyed their interest in the adjoining lands to other persons.

"An inspection shows that buildings have been erected upon both parcels described in the application."

**Petition of Manning Stires for a Correction Deed of the City's Interest in Certain Property on Coney Island Plank Road, Released, Pursuant to Resolution Adopted by This Board July 26, 1917 (Cal. No. 39).**

This matter was No. 33 on calendar of meeting held May 9th and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a report.

The Chief Engineer reported as follows:

"From information presented it appears that this parcel of property was left outside of the street system through the laying out and opening of Neptune avenue, title to which at a width of 80 feet was acquired in 1889, and that your Board has been petitioned by William J. Dawley to release title to Manning Stires, the owner of property abutting upon the old road.

"It also appears that a deed intending to convey this parcel was executed last year, but that it failed to correctly describe its location.

"I can see no occasion to make use of the parcel referred to by the petitioner for street purposes, and its location is such that it could not be devoted to other use without depriving adjoining owners of street frontage."

**City Improvement and Record Service Corporation—In the Matter of the Request for a Release of the City's Interest in a Strip of Land at 162d Street and Riverside Drive, Manhattan (Cal. No. 40).**

This matter was No. 40 on calendar of meeting held May 9, 1918, and referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a report.

The Chief Engineer reported as follows:

"Under a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted on March 15, 1918, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on March 21st following, a map was approved providing among other things, for changing the lines of the service street by the exclusion of the parcel referred to by the applicant for its purchase. From my report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment concerning this feature of the plan I quote the following:

"From information presented with the resolution it appears that a large apartment house which has been erected at the southeasterly corner of West 162d street and the service street adjoining Riverside Drive, encroaches upon the lines of the service street a maximum of about 1½ inches. In order to perfect the title of the owner of this building it is proposed to exclude the area encroached upon from the street, and as shown upon the plan now presented. \* \* \* The Board is informed that upon the approval of the map the owner of the property abutting upon the portion of the service street to be closed will negotiate with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the reconveyance to him of the closed portion of the street. The change proposed is of a very minor character, extending from 162d street southwardly about 77 feet.

"\* \* \* Information is presented to show that the owners of the frontage on the service street, between West 161st street and West 163d street, as well as of the major portion of the frontages on West 161st street and West 162d street, favor the change.

"\* \* \* With the understanding that negotiations will be entered into by the owners of land abutting upon the portion of the service street which it is proposed to close and discontinue, with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for its purchase, I would recommend that the map now presented be approved after giving the statutory hearing."

"The application now before you appears to have been made in conformity with the conditions under which the street plan was modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it is clear that the land which has been left outside of the street system is not needed for any public purpose."

Gentlemen—I have received the following letter from the President of the Borough of Queens:

"I am in receipt of a report that the building standing on the southeast corner of Atlantic avenue and Birch street, Fourth Ward, known as damage parcel No. 185 of the Atlantic avenue proceedings, is unoccupied and the store windows have either been blown in or broken by the boys in the neighborhood, who are now entering the building and are likely to set the same on fire. "Dear Sir—In accordance with the wish of the Board of Inebriety, request is hereby made for the assignment to this Board of the space on the third floor of the Municipal Building (Room 366), now used as a drafting room by the Department of Plant and Structures. This space could be divided by partitions and made suitable for our use. At present, we have only two rooms at 300 Mulberry street, which are inadequate for our needs. They are not large enough or situated so partitions could be erected, and therefore our employees, patients (drug addicts and alcoholics), and visitors must necessarily mingle together. We have not sufficient space for seating these people, and very often they are compelled to stand for a long time.

**Hall of Records—In the Matter of the Lease of Rooms in; for Use of the New York State Nautical School (Cal. No. 51).**

At meeting held May 16, 1918, this matter was referred to the Department of Plant and Structures for a report.

The following was received from the Department of Plant and Structures:

May 22, 1918.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:*

Gentlemen—The following letter, signed by the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, has been received:

"At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held May 9, 1918, a resolution was adopted on your recommendation authorizing a lease of room in the northwest corner of suite 618 in the Hall of Records, for use of the New York State Nautical School, in lieu of Room 617, at the same rental.

"At meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held this day the Comptroller called the attention of the Board to the fact that the room in suite 618 contained 710 square feet of space, while room 617, under lease, contains but 521 square feet of space.

"As this information was not before the Board when it authorized the lease and as the rental for the new room will affect the rate per square foot which the City is obtaining for rooms in the building, the matter was referred to you for a report."

The room in suite 618 in the Hall of Records assigned to the New York State Nautical School by resolution adopted May 9 contains 710 square feet of space, and

the amount previously allotted to the New York State Nautical School in room 617 was only 521 square feet of space.

The recommendation made by me to assign room 618 was made because the agreement by the City to assign room 617 had been violated by the award of this space to the Mayor's Committee on National Defense, and it was necessary to immediately provide new quarters. The office formerly occupied by the New York State Nautical School had been surrendered and had been sublet, and immediate removal was compulsory. The Secretary of the Board of Governors of the New York State Nautical School stated that there would have been no difficulty in securing a sufficiently increased appropriation from the State Legislature to have paid the rental rate per square foot for the larger room if notice had been given that the previous allotment had been revoked, and he agreed to make requisition in the budget estimate for next year for the increased amount represented by the larger floor space. There appears to be no other space suitable for the purpose, and in addition to this consideration it was taken into account that the City would have been called upon to erect a partition to inclose the number of square feet of space allotted in the former room, which would have compelled an expenditure of much more than the difference in the rental value.

It is suggested that if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund disapprove of the allotment made the resolution be amended so that 521 square feet of the space in suite 618 be allotted, with the privilege of increasing the allotment when the Legislature appropriates a sufficient amount of money to pay the City the full rental rate for the entire space contained within the room. The lease to contain a clause providing for the cancellation of the existing lease of Room 617 in the Hall of Records Building, in the Borough of Manhattan, authorized by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, July 12, 1917, for use of the New York State Nautical School, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the lease of Room 617 hereinabove referred to.

**Commissioner of Records, Bronx County—Proposed Assignment to, of Space in the Bronx County Court House (Cal. No. 52).**

At meeting held May 16, 1918 (Cal. No. 25), a suggestion of the Throgg's Neck Taxpayers' Association that the Commissioner of Records be assigned space in the Bronx County Court House formerly occupied by the County Jail, was referred to the President of the Borough of Bronx for a report.

The President of the Borough reported "there is ample space for said office in the County Court House, in Room 105. There is 1,058 square feet of space for the office and a small adjacent room of 168 square feet, which could conveniently be used for the Commissioner's private office. This small room also contains a fireproof vault of 24.4 square feet which could be used for keeping records, thereby obviating the necessity of additional expense for the purchase of safes. At the present time these rooms are temporarily occupied by a Stenographer of the Supreme Court, and for supplementary proceeding examinations."

Gentlemen—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at meeting held May 9, 1918, referred the following communication to the Commissioner of Plant and Structures for investigation and report:

"Fire Department of the City of New York, April 22, 1918.

"Hon. JOHN F. Hylan, Mayor, and Chairman of the Sinking Fund Commission:

"Sir—Permission is requested to use part of the building at No. 125 Worth street, Manhattan, now used by the Central Testing Laboratory, for the purpose of housing and storing equipment of the laboratory which was formerly a part of the Bureau of Fire Prevention.

"The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held April 12, 1918, agreed to have the Central Testing Laboratory, which is a division of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, make all necessary tests hereafter.

"In addition to granting space for this purpose, as requested, the following property is surrendered to your Commission, with the request that it be transferred to the Central Testing Laboratory. In view of the consolidation of the laboratories, the equipment transferred is of no further use to this department.

"(There follows list of material.)

"Respectfully, THOMAS J. DRENNAN, Fire Commissioner."

Report.

At the meeting held April 12, 1918, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, application for which is to be made by the Fire Commissioner, hereby grants to the said Fire Commissioner permission to remove the equipment of the Laboratory of the Bureau of Fire Prevention of the Fire Department at 49 Lafayette street to the Central Testing Laboratory, 125 Worth street, and that the Director of the Central Testing Laboratory be and he is hereby instructed to make all tests hereafter required by the Fire Department; the moving of the equipment and the installation of the same in the Central Testing Laboratory to be done by the mechanics of the Fire Department."

The application of the Fire Commissioner contained in the communication above complies with the direction in the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, directing the Fire Commissioner to make application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for permission to remove the said equipment.

To comply with the request made, it will be necessary to rescind a previous resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, dated April 11, 1918, assigning the third floor of the building at 125 Worth street to the Fire Department for laboratory purposes.

The following resolutions are recommended for your approval: That,

1. The assignment of floor 3 in the building at 125 Worth street, made April 11, 1918, to the Fire Department, be rescinded.

2. All of floor 3 in the building at 125 Worth street be assigned to the Central Testing Laboratory, with the understanding that the Fire Department be permitted to store certain material now in its charge, which was formerly part of the laboratory equipment. This storage area not to exceed one-third of the floor area.

3. The following equipment of the Fire Department laboratory be assigned to the Central Testing Laboratory and installed in place by the Fire Department, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 12, 1918:

Desks, 4, 1 roll top (good condition), 1 flat top (good condition), 2 flat top (poor condition); tables, 2 (poor condition); benches, 3 (poor condition); chairs, 5 (1 good condition; 4 poor condition); filing cabinets, 8, 4 steel, 12x24 inches (good condition), 2 steel, 8x14 inches (good condition), 1 steel, 4 feet 4 inches by 2 feet 20 inches (good condition), 1 wood cabinet (poor condition); drafting table, 1 (fair condition); clothes closet, 1 (poor condition); table and cabinet combined, 1 film rewinder, steel (good condition); 1 motor generator set, Eck, d.c. motor, a.c. generator, 110 volts, 1 h.p., complete, with starting rheostat and field and speed regulating rheostats; 1 transformer, Western Electric, 1 kva, 110, 1,100, 2,200 volts; 1 sprinkler test outfit, complete, with piping, gauges, pumps, recording thermometer, pipe racks, etc.; 1 wood corrosion cabinet for testing sprinkler heads; 1 high pressure blower complete with 1 h.p., G. E., 115 volts, motor.



PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF section 1573 of the Greater New York Charter, the following rules adopted by the Examining Board of Plumbers at a meeting held the thirteenth day of June, 1918, are hereby published in the CITY RECORD:

M. J. MCGRATH, Chairman.

I.

Persons applying for examination for certificates to engage in the business of master or employing plumber shall, before being examined, file with the Board an application on such forms as may be prescribed by the Board, and shall furnish to the Board such information as it may require concerning the applicant's fitness and qualifications to receive a certificate aforesaid. All applications must be under oath.

Each applicant shall be required to furnish two vouchers, who shall appear before the Board and sign under oath on forms prescribed by the Board certifying to the time the applicant has been employed by them as journeymen plumber. Such vouchers at the time of signing applications must be lawfully engaged in the plumbing business in the City of New York.

The Board shall refuse to receive an application from any person who at the time of making application may be unlawfully engaged in business as a master or employing plumber.

II.

No person shall be examined unless he shall have had an experience of at least three years as a journeyman plumber, and is able to furnish satisfactory evidence of such fact.

No application will be received from any person who is not a citizen of the United States.

III.

The examinations of the Board shall be in two parts, namely, a practical test to determine the applicant's skill as a journeyman, and a written examination. The written examination shall consist of questions and plan to determine the applicant's fitness and qualifications to engage in the business of master or employing plumber.

IV.

All examinations shall be written by the applicant and must be in English.

V.

The time and place of holding examinations shall be left to the discretion of the Board. Adequate notice shall be given to applicants.

VI.

Persons who pass the tests as prescribed by the Board shall be eligible to receive a certificate of competency as master or employing plumber.

VII.

An applicant who fails in the practical test shall not be eligible for another test until the expiration of three months; should he fail in the second test he will not be eligible for a third test until the expiration of six months, and failing in the third test, he will not be eligible for a fourth test until the expiration of one year. An applicant who fails in the written examination shall not be eligible for re-examination until the expiration of one month; should he fail in the second examination he will not be eligible for another examination until the expiration of three months; should he fail in the third examination he will not be eligible for another examination until the expiration of six months, and should he fail in the fourth examination he will not be eligible for another examination until the expiration of one year.

VIII.

All applications will expire and be cancelled after a period of one year if the applicant does not appear for examination within that period.

IX.

Before issuing a certificate to engage in the business of master or employing plumber the Board shall inquire into the applicant's fitness and qualifications for conducting such business, and may require the applicant to submit under oath such evidence, in addition to the examinations and tests hereinbefore provided, as will satisfy the Board that he is a person of good repute, character and responsibility, and otherwise qualified to engage in business as a master or employing plumber.

Each applicant for examination shall pay the sum of Five Dollars, and the further sum of Five Dollars, plus the amount for revenue, stamp tax, or both, upon the issuance of a certificate to engage in the business of master or employing plumber.
