

Report of the Superintendent, with reports of Captains attached, in response to resolution of 15th instant, relative to violations of Excise law reported to the Mayor by the Board of Excise, were ordered on file, copies forwarded to the Mayor, and all to be published in the CITY RECORD, as follows:

SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE, New York, January 21, 1884.

To the Hon. Board of Police Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—Herewith please find report relative to the list of unlicensed liquor dealers forwarded by the Board of Excise to his Honor the Mayor, and by him sent to the Police Department for investigation. In reference to this matter, I desire to inform the Board of Police that a duplicate list was forwarded to me by the Board of Excise, on the 14th instant, setting forth the names and location of parties who were unlicensed, according to their record at the close of business on the 12th instant. Copies were immediately made and sent to each Captain of Precinct where the places mentioned were located, notifying them of the fact and with directions to report as to action taken, etc. The reports set forth their action taken in each case, what has been done and is being done to enforce the Excise Law by the police. I find that twelve places were doing business under license granted by the Excise Board previous to the date of the list furnished by the Board of Excise, five places are closed and doing no business. One was licensed on the 12th instant (two days previous to the report by the Excise Board previous to the date of the list furnished by the Board of Excise, five places are closed and doing no business. One was licensed on the 12th instant (two days previous to the report being sent to this office). Eight have since been licensed. One place is a candy and milk store, and another has been used as a laundry and barber shop, but now closed. Your attention is especially called to the reports of the Captains of the Fourth and Tenth Precincts, by which it will be seen that a strict watch is being kept on these places, and whenever evidence is obtained of violation of the Excise Law, arrests are made. See record of arrests on report.

Sir.—In reference to the list of unlicensed liquor dealers furnished me January 14, as reported to your office by the Board of Excise, I respectfully report that Herman Rugen, proprietor of liquor store No. 40 South street, was arrested at 7.40 P. M. January 14 by officer James A. Sloan, and held in \$100 to answer by Justice Smith on the 15th. Rugen applied to Board of Excise for his license December 3, 1883, and it was granted January 16, 1884.

Adolph Goldschmidt, bartender for Martin Hoffheimer, No. 17 Dutch street, was arrested by officer James Murray at 6.50 P. M. January 14, and held in \$100 to answer by Justice Smith on 15th. Hoffheimer was selling under license held by Joseph Weber. This place closed for the past two days.

John Quinn, bartender for Joseph Halligan at No. 10 Whitehall street, was arrested by officer John W. McCormack at 7 P. M. January 14, and discharged by Justice Smith on 15th. It was shown in court that the license of said place is in name of John Jackman, who is executor of the Walsh estate, and that he has Halligan there as superintendent.

PRECINCT No. 4, January 17, 1884.

GEO. W. WALLING, Superintendent:

SIR—I herewith submit the following report, relative to action taken by me upon unlicensed liquor dealers within this Precinct, as per communication from you of the date of January 14, 1884:

The first place noted on the list is I. Belasio, No. 60 James street. This is an error, as No. 60 James street is occupied by parties engaged in the sale of milk and confectionery.

The next mentioned is Green, No. 17 New Bowery. This place is licensed, license having been graphed to day.

The other places on list, referred to as places whose owners claim they do not sell, are principally houses of assignation and sailors' dance houses, generally resorted to by men who follow a

When I assumed command of this Precinct, all or nearly all of them were disposing of liquors, ales, etc., under authority of a license, at the expiration of which, upon my suggestions and upon evidence by me furnished to Excise Board, further license was denied them. Since that time, they evidence by me furnished to Excise Board, further license was denied them. Since that time, they have been under the constant supervision of the uniformed force of my command, as well as that of an officer in plain clothes, specially detailed by me for the purpose of procuring evidence against and arresting occupants of these places, engaged in this violation of the law. Their sales of liquor, ales, etc., are limited, as the officers detailed by me, as above stated, have time and again reported that they were not selling. Being unable to procure the evidence necessary to arrest, as they have been known to send outside of their own place of business for the purpose of satisfying the demands of their patrons, as, for instance, if they had a small party of guests, they would send to a neighboring lager beer saloon and purchase from one to four quarts of lager; if the party's wants required it they would procure a larger quantity. A more explicit illustration of this method of doing business, can be given by making a comparison between them and fashionable houses of prostitution. In a fashionable house of ill-repute, it is customary, upon the entrance of a party, to send for a bottle of wine. In these places to send for a supply of lager. This is about the manner in which a greater portion of them transact business. Therefore, it will at once be seen the great difficulties under which we labor, in endeavoring to procure evidence against these violaters of the law, oftentimes making it necessary to call to our aid people in private life, made up to represent seafaring men for the purpose of procuring the evidence necessary to arrest. In this respect we have met with more or less success, as will more fully appear, by reference to the statement of arrests made for several months past, in the places specified in the list first referred to.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 12, 1884, was 604, which is 56.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.46 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,338,612.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were fini-hed and water was again turned on by 4 p. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant.

While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir wasdrawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
