Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 13, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,831.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 410.

During the past week 220 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 29 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 2 permits.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 6 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 101 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 127 visits were made, and 72 disinfections and 8 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital, was 10.

The number of vaccinations performed was 2,078 of which 1,283 were primary, and 795 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 9,535 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 56, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 106, the number of arrests made was 1, and the amount of fines imposed was \$50.

The certificates of 592 births, 54 still-births, 360 marriages, and 715 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 13, 1886. This shows a decrease of 56 births and 13 still-births, and an increase of 45 marriages and 35 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was a decrease of 9 births and 3 still-births, and an increase of 9 marriages, and 153 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; whooping cough, 1; typhoid fever, 4; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 5; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 3; pneumonia, 4; convulsions, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 7; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; premature and preterm births, 8; suicide, 1; drowning, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; measles, 22; diphtheria, 14; croup, 4; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 7; diarrheal diseases, 2; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; heart diseases, 9; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; apoplexy, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; surgical operations, 3. The number of deaths from bronchitis and aneurism was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 116 were in institutions, 418 in tenement-houses, 165 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 144 on the first, 181 on the second, 127 on the third, 100 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 703 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents; 92 were stated to be single, 191 married, 75 widowed, and the condition of 357 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 715; still-births, 54; bodies in transitu, 18; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 79 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 592 births, 360 marriages, 54 still-births, 715 deaths; 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 116 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 78 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 13, 1886, was 40.9 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.844; the mean humidity was 70, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,661, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.69 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 663 deaths and still-births, or 86.22 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 28; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 267; City, pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 72; Greenwood (undenominational), 43; Lutheran (undenominational), 99; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 26; Evergreen (undenominational), 45; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending November 6, 1886, was 670; this is 146 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 101.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.28 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,454,068.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending November 20, 1886.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 17.—STATED MEETING—11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Beekman (President), Crimmins, Powers, Borden.

Messrs. G. C. Holt, Bowie Dash, George H. Petrie, I. D. Johnson and G. W. Stephens, appeared before the Board, and presented a petition of property-owners for the improvement of the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway and connecting streets, and were heard in relation to the matter.

Messrs. L. L. Delafield and A. S. Hutchins also appeared and presented petitions signed by owners of property formerly assessed for the opening of said parkway, asking that no action be taken for its improvement at this time.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, A committee of taxpayers in the vicinity of the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway, Twenty-fourth Ward, have appeared before this Board with their counsel in relation to the construction of the parkway, and

Whereas, The counsel representing the property-owners differ as regards the legality of levying an assessment for the work if done; therefore be it

Resolved, That the said counsel be requested to submit their points for and against the proposed improvement and its legality, in writing, and that the papers, when received, be forwarded to the Counsel to the Corporation for advice and direction.

The following communications were received:

From the Counsel to the Corporation, in relation to the power of this Department to issue permits for the placing and maintaining booths or stands on the sidewalks of streets adjoining the City Hall Park. Filed.

From the Secretary of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, forwarding a petition of property-owners asking that the width of Melrose avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-ninth and One Hundred and Sixty-third streets, be fixed at not more than sixty feet, for examination and report.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President to report thereon to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement with the recommendation of this Board that the width of said avenue be fixed at eighty feet.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Supervisory Board, transmitting a copy of the following resolution, adopted by said Board:

Resolved, That Watchmen temporarily employed for particular jobs, at a rate of compensation not exceeding \$1.75 per day, be exempt from examination and included in Schedule "G." Filed.

From E. B. Southwick, reporting upon the work of destroying noxious insects in the Parks during the month of October. Filed.

From the Topographical Engineer:

1st. Reporting upon the works in progress under his charge. Filed.

2d. Returning the map showing the discontinuance of Leggett avenue, between Trinity and Prospect avenues, and the alteration of intersecting streets, as provided by chapter 662, Laws of 1886, which map had been placed on exhibition and to which no objection had been made.

On motion, said map was adopted and ordered filed according to law.

From the Captain of Police—Reporting the death of Parkkeeper Thomas Holden, on the 16th instant, from injuries received in being thrown from his horse, in the performance of his duty.

On motion the Captain of Police was directed to provide a proper escort of Park Police, at the funeral of Officer Holden.

On motion the application of the Harlem Electric Illuminating Company for permission to place electric lights on the Third Avenue Bridge over Harlem river, was granted.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, This Department on August 30, 1886, entered into an agreement with Mr. J. Drummond for furnishing cast-iron water-pipes, branch pipes and special castings, by the terms of which agreement this Board may, in its discretion, increase or diminish the quantities mentioned therein by an amount not exceeding twenty per cent. thereof, at the contract price; and

Whereas, The Engineer of Construction reports that the quantity of branch pipes and special castings called for by the contract have been found to be insufficient; therefore

Resolved, That the contractor be directed to increase the quantity of branch pipes and special castings to the extent of twenty per cent. thereof; that the date of the commencement of the delivering of the pipes and castings to be furnished under the said agreement be extended to April 1, 1887, and that the delivery in all other respects shall be made in the manner specified in said agreement.

From the Board of Commissioners of Electrical Subways, asking permission to proceed with the work of constructing a subway across City Hall Park, either through the roadway in front of the City Hall or Mail street.

They require that this ceiling be made thoroughly fireproof, and we will do the work in accordance with their requirements, after making a deduction for the plastering work omitted, (as we understand you will not want it plastered on the fireproof) for the sum of two hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$225).

We have all other work nearly complete and are anxious that this should be settled so that the work can be done at once, otherwise it will be thrown over to the spring, as we cannot do it in frosty weather and fires cannot be lighted under the boilers till it is done. To cover the same with Lyons Fire Proofing 3 inch blocks, would cost thirty cents per square foot or figured up net, two hundred and ten to two hundred and sixty-four dollars.

We have called on Mr. Simms, and he states that this fire-proofing would be acceptable to the Board of Fire Underwriters.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
