

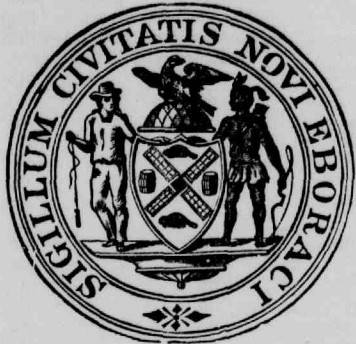

THE BOARD OF POLICE.

Whereas, The Supreme Court of the State have judicially determined that the removal of the above named Cornelius J. Regan by the Board was unwarranted, and have ordered the reinstatement of said Regan; and

Whereas, An appeal was taken by this Board from said decision; and

Whereas, There is reason to doubt whether said appeal can be successfully maintained; and

Whereas, The said Regan has relinquished all claim which he might have in law or equity for salary or compensation during the period he was performing no duty; and

Whereas, Douglas A. Levien, Jr., the counsel for said Regan, has consented that the appeal taken by this Board be withdrawn without costs; therefore, be it

Resolved, That upon said Regan's executing a release, in such manner and form as may be satisfactory to the Counsel for this Board, the said Counsel be and he is, hereby directed to withdraw the appeal taken in the above action.

Commissioner Wheeler moved that the resolution be referred to the Counsel to the Board for his opinion, to be submitted at the next meeting of the Board, as to the advisability of withdrawing the appeal. Carried—all voting aye.

Bureau of Elections.

On reading and filing an opinion of the Counsel to the Board, Commissioner Nichols withdrew the preamble and resolutions offered by him on the 22d instant, and offered the following:

Resolved, That instructions, in addition to those contained in General Order No. 173, dated October 5, 1875, shall be issued forthwith to the officers of the Police who may be on duty at the several election districts where registration is being carried on, directing them to take the names and address of any person applying for registration who claim to have been illegally deprived of such right, as well as the names of the Inspectors of said election district, and forward the same in writing to the Superintendent as soon thereafter as possible; and also report the name and address of any person who shall fraudulently and illegally attempt to register; provided, furthermore, that if any intimidation or threats have been used by any one to hinder or prevent such registration, then also the name of such person or persons shall be included in the said report of the officer.

Resolved, That the Superintendent shall submit such report to the Board of Police at their next regular meeting after the receipt of the same for action thereon.

Commissioner Wheeler offered the following as a substitute:

Resolved, That the Superintendent be instructed to call the special attention of the force to General Order 173, issued October 5, 1875, and which has governed the members of the force at places of registration during the elections of 1876 and 1877, and that no further orders are at present necessary. Lost—Commissioners Wheeler and Erhardt voting aye; Commissioners Smith and Nichols voting no.

The question then being taken on the original motion was lost. Commissioners Smith and Nichols voting aye; Commissioners Wheeler and Erhardt voting no.
