MEETINGS, JANUARY 3 TO 7, 1893.

Communications Received.

From Penitentiary—List of prisoners received during week ending December 31, 1892: Males, 28; females, 1. On file.
List of 26 prisoners to be discharged from January 8 to 14, 1893. Transmitted to Prison Association.
From City Prison—Amount of fines received during week ending December 31, 1892, \$39. On file.
From N. Y. City Asylum for Insane, Blackwell's Island—History of 10 patients admitted, 5 discharged and 1 that died during week ending December 31, 1892. On file.
From N. Y. City Asylum for Insane, Ward's Island—History of 12 patients admitted, 4 discharged and 9 that have died during week ending December 31, 1892. On file.
From Ward's Island Hospital—Reporting two cases of typhus fever. Transferred to care of Health Department. On file.
From City Cemetery—List of burials during week ending December 31, 1892. On file.
From Heads of Institutions—Reporting meats, milk, fish, etc., received during week ending December 31, 1892, of good quality and up to the standard. On file.
From the Comptroller—Statement of unexpended balances to December 31, 1892. Referred to Bookkeeper.
From District Prison—Warden reporting that he has moved all prisoners, books, etc., from old to new Fifth District Prison, and asks that the institution be furnished with additional Keepers, the present number being insufficient. On file.
From Randall's Island Hospital—Reporting death of Mary Kiernan, Nurse. On file.
From Health Department—Transmitting list of houses infected with typhus fever. Copy to be forwarded to the heads of institutions at once.
From Storekeeper—Rejecting coffee furnished for use of the Department, it being of inferior quality. Approved.
From Workhouse—Reporting death of Kate Anderson, prisoner, at North Brother Island. On file.
From Ward's Island Hospital—Requesting permission to use unoccupied boat-house for "suspect" cases of typhus fever. Granted.

Contracts Awarded.

David P. Arnold—For use of all the institutions other than Insane Asylums—Chucks of beef and shoulder clods, about 1,500,000 pounds, at 5 cents per pound; extra diet beef, about 30,000 pounds, at 12 cents per pound; mutton, in pieces of forequarters, breast and shoulders, without ribs, about 200,000 pounds, at 4½ cents per pound; roasting pieces of beef, about 100,000 pounds, at 14 cents per pound; beefsteak, sirloin, about 40,000 pounds, at 14 cents per pound; corned beef, rumps and

plates or navel, about 40,000 pounds, at 8 cents per pound; mutton, hindquarters, about 75,000 pounds, at 12 cents per pound; pork, loins, about 10,000 pounds, at 12 cents per pound; veal, cutlets and loins, about 25,000 pounds, at 12 cents per pound; salt beef in barrels, "Extra Mess" grade, about 100,000 pounds, at 6 cents per pound.

For use of all the Insane Asylums—Ribs, loins and hips, about 600,000 pounds, at 11 cents per pound; rumps, about 400,000 pounds, at 8 cents per pound.

The building to be erected on the ground 200 x 100 feet in the rear of the Eighth Regiment Armory, between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, and fronting on Madison avenue. TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1890), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and

obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
