MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, January 13, 1904.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 6 Elm street, on Wednesday, January 13, 1904.

All the Commissioners were present.

A public hearing was held on the matter of amending Rule 15 by repealing paragraph 12, which provides that:

"Any person in the competitive service who shall have passed an examination for either appointment or promotion covering in its scope a higher grade or compensation than that of the position he holds, shall, if not otherwise disqualified, be eligible for promotion or advancement to such higher grade or compensation without further examination under this rule."

The Commission was addressed by Hon. Nelson S. Spencer, Mr. George McAneny and Mr. Elliott H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, in favor of the repeal, and by Hon. John T. Dooling in opposition to the repeal.

A public hearing was held upon the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that there be included in the exempt class two additional Cashiers—one in the Borough of Richmond and one in the Borough of Queens. Hon. Frank J. Goodwin, Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, represented the Department. Mr. Elliott H. Goodwin, in behalf of the Civil Service Reform Association, addressed the Commission in opposition to the request.

A public hearing was also held on the recommendation of the Labor Clerk that there be included in the non-competitive class the position of Baker. There was no opposition.

The Commission then went into regular session.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Dr. William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows: The Ducker Company will send their man here to-morrow or Thursday morning to get the location and put down foundation posts for the portable tent.

The metal ceiling is being put up in the doctors' old laundry.

Steamfitters are repairing broken stacks in the southwest end of the Dormitory building.

The repairs to the leaders and gutters around the building, which were contracted for last year, are not yet completed. The work of putting the caps over the new manholes in the steampipe conduit is not yet finished. Owing to the extreme weather these two contracts are delayed, as they cannot be properly done during such severe weather.

Changes are being made in the metal lockers which are being installed by the Manhattan Supply Company, there having been a mistake in building these lockers at first. The company is now correcting the defects by properly bracing the backs, making new gates and putting on different locks and number plates. The locks and gates are being made in the factory, and will be sent here complete, ready to be hung.

The Hawley Box Company have been delayed in the delivery of the boxes, owing to a mistake in procuring the locks.

The Central Iron Works are pushing the work as fast as possible on the new fire-escape for the north side of Ward 39. The principal delay in that work is in obtaining the cast iron treads for the steps, as these have to be obtained from the foundry.

The carpenters of the institution have put new Yale locks on the doors of the rooms and dormitories throughout the Dormitory building.

The new steam tables that were put in the Orderlies' dining-room are working satisfactorily at present. The contract has also been let to the same company (A. B. Barr & Co.) to repair several leaks in return lines in different parts of the basement, but owing to the extremely cold weather the work cannot be done, as it is necessitates shutting off the steam from the building, which can only be done when the weather is a little milder.

Our Electrician has installed four lights in Mr. Smith's storeroom; two new lights over the steam table in the Orderlies' dining-room, and one light outside of the tower at the corner of the building near the gate-house on Twenty-sixth street. Permission was granted to install these lights by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

The hot-air furnaces recently installed for heating the Out Patient Department are now in use and are giving very good satisfaction.

The hot water supply apparatus recently installed is in operation and giving very good satisfaction.

Three painters are at work in the hospital building painting the interior. The work has progressed favorable.

Plasterers are working, under contract, making repairs to cracks and patches in several parts of the building.

A portion of the floor has been repaired and a partition and door put up in the storeroom for the Druggist in the basement of the Out-Patient Department.

The census of Bellevue Hospital is unusually high at the present time, and has been high for the past two or three weeks.


