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## 250TH ANNIVERSARY OF NEW YORK CITY.

### PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR.

#### To the People of The City of New York:

On the second of February, 1653, Governor Peter Stuyvesant, of the Province of New Netherland, issued a proclamation granting the privileges of city government to the then City of New Amsterdam. Two centuries and a half have been added to the world's story since then, and the little City of New Amsterdam, later known for a season as New Orange, and now become the proud City of New York, still dominates the noble bay and the stately rivers that marked it for the site of a great city even at that early day. The handful of population—about one thousand in number—who greeted with acclaim the proclamation of Governor Stuyvesant, establishing municipal government here, has grown to be a vast multitude of more than three and a half millions of souls.

Many vicissitudes have befallen Manhattan Island and our country in this long interval; but The City of New York greets this anniversary year as a city that is inspired alike by the stirring memories of its past, and by its confident anticipations of a still more glorious future.

In no spirit of unworthy pride, but with grateful recognition of the Divine blessings that have made our beloved city what it is, I call upon the people of New York to make the week beginning May 24 and ending May 30, which has been designated by the Board of Aldermen for this purpose, a gala week in this city, in celebration of this interesting event. During the whole of this week, the citizens are requested to fly their flags from dwellings and buildings of every description; the newspaper press of the city is asked to bring home to the people a sense of New York's long history; and the ministers of religion are requested, at their usual places of worship, to remind their hearers of the event that is being celebrated, and to invoke the Divine blessing upon the municipality.

It is hereby ordered that flags shall be displayed upon the school houses, and upon every city building, during this entire week; and the Board of Education is requested to provide for special exercises, in every school in the City, on the 26th day of May; the day upon which the granting of the first City Charter will be celebrated in the Aldermanic Chamber, so that the children of the City may have a realizing sense of the long history of New York, and be filled with the public-spirited desire to be worthy citizens of such a City.

Given under my hand and seal this seventh day of May, A. D. on thousand nine hundred and three.

## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

### Report for Quarter Ending March 31, 1903.

Office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, May 14, 1903.

Dear Sir—Pursuant to section 1544 of the Charter I submit the following report of the business of this Department for the quarter ended March 31, 1903.

The following contracts were entered into:

Forty for paving and repaving, estimated cost, \$409,987.06; three for regulating, grading, etc., estimated cost, \$32,436; six for sewers and receiving basins, estimated cost, \$75,673.74; seven for miscellaneous works, estimated cost, \$45,387; ten special contracts, estimated cost, \$2,403.50, making sixty-six contracts entered into at an aggregate estimated cost of \$565,887.30.

Contracts were completed as follows:

Ten for paving and repaving, cost, \$97,719.71; two for sewers, cost, \$18,392.08; three for miscellaneous works, cost, \$31,951.88, making fifteen contracts completed, at an aggregate cost of \$148,063.67.

Under the contracts for regulating and grading streets the following items of work were done: 8,900 cubic yards earth excavated, 8,850 cubic yards rock excavated, 4,129 linear feet dry stone box culvert constructed, and 100 linear feet curbstones set.

The mileage of new pavements laid amounted to 1.63.

The linear miles of paved streets in the Borough of Manhattan March 31, 1903, were 414.19.

The repair force took up and relaid 10,699 square yards of stone pavements.

Permits were issued by the Bureau of Highways, as follows: Forty-nine to construct vaults, forty-one to repair vaults, five to place guy posts, two to place banner poles, 154 to place tar kettles on streets, ninety-one to place boilers on streets, and six to repair pavements at expense of applicants.

The fees received for vault permits amounted to \$38,316.30.

The 20.72 miles of macadam and gravel roads, and 22.39 miles of dirt or unpaved streets in the upper section of the Borough have been repaired, cleaned and sprinkled.

Openings in pavements were made by corporations, etc., as follows:

One hundred and eleven to lay and overhaul electric mains, 5 to lay and overhaul gas mains, 280 to lay and overhaul water mains, 60 to lay and overhaul sewers, 1,385 to lay and repair electric services, 3,734 to lay and repair gas services, 100 to lay and repair steam services, 309 to lay and repair water services, and 130 to lay and repair sewer connections, also 815 to construct and repair railways, making a total of 6,929.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 813 complaints of obstructions, made 275 seizures and removals of obstructions, issued 812 permits to place building material on streets, 195 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, 108 permits to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks, removed 1,464 loads of dirt, stone and rubbish, removed sixty-seven fallen trees, dangerous stumps and posts, issued 18 permits for bay windows, and served twenty-seven notices to repair defective vault covers.

During the quarter 1,987 linear feet of sewer and nine receiving basins connecting therewith have been constructed, making the present total length of the sewerage system of the Borough 500.96 miles, with 6,037 receiving basins.

One hundred and fifty-five permits were issued for new sewers, and 123 to make repairs to sewers.

The report of the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices gives a detailed account of repairs which have been made to the various public buildings in charge of this Department, and of the supplies which have been furnished to the different bureaus, offices and courts.

The free floating baths have sustained no damage during the winter months, and preparations are now being made to put them in condition for the coming bathing season.

The Rivington Street Bath has been open daily, except holidays, and was patronized by 70,024 males and 20,056 females, making a total of 90,080.

Fair progress is being made in erecting the new baths at East One Hundred and Ninth and West Forty-first streets.

Hon. JAMES G. COLLINS, Superintendent of Highways:

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit the following statement of the financial condition of the Division of Roads, accompanied with an accounting of the work performed and materials used during the quarter ending March 31, 1903.

The work of this division consists of the maintenance of 20.72 miles of macadam and gravel roads and 22.39 miles of dirt roads in the Borough of Manhattan. This includes the repairing of washouts and repairing gutters to insure proper drainage.

An examination of this report will show that a great amount of the work of this division cannot well be tabulated, yet calls for a considerable expenditure on the part of the City, such as the removal of snow and ice from sidewalks and certain streets; also the repair of washouts which have been limited almost wholly to Boulevard Lafayette, Fort Washington avenue and Marble Hill.

All permits issued to private corporations and plumbers to open the pavements require them to have the pavements restored and maintained for two years in good condition at their own expense. Therefore pavements restored over openings are each inspected three times each year for two years. The number of these inspections this quarter was 11,436 and the number of defective pavements found was 444, of which 441 have been repaired.

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions I hand you herewith a report of the work done under my supervision for the quarter ending March 31, 1903, with a statement of work done by mechanics and laborers.

1,987 linear feet of sewer and 9 receiving basins connecting therewith have been built, making the present total length of the sewerage system of the Borough 2,645,102 linear feet (500 96-100 miles), with 6,034 receiving basins.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Bureau.

## Sewer Contracts.

Two sewer contracts have been completed, viz.:

Sewer in Third avenue, west side, between Thirteenth and Seventeenth streets, with connections, and in Thirteenth street, between Third and Fourth avenues.

Repairs to sewer in Sixty-sixth street, between West End avenue and Hudson river.

Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the transactions of this Bureau during the quarter ending March 31, 1903.

notherly side and westerly side of above building, and all the rubbish removed from the premises and same left broom clean.

Five fair weather and five storm flags of a similar design to those formerly in use were furnished for the use of the building. These flags were State, City and regulation American flags.

#### Brown Stone Building.

The glass in the windows and doors of above building were cleaned, as usual, and the Janitor's and Engineer's supplies furnished. New shades hung on spring rollers were furnished throughout the building.

#### Harlem Courthouse.

The usual Janitor's supplies were furnished, and one barrel of best graphite grease was furnished for use of the Engineer. Water closet was repaired, and new water closet and cistern put in place. Several steam leaks were repaired, also a Kiely governor and valves. A hand and governor rope in the elevator of above building was renewed. Two sets of halyards furnished and put up on flagpole.

#### West Fifty-fourth Street Courthouse.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished. The following plumbing work was performed in the above building: New supply tank put in Magistrates' toilet; urinal reset tanks repaired in water closet on top floor, and the same adjusted to the wall; waste pipe at sink cleaned out; faucet repaired at bath in Janitor's quarters; new toilet put in on top floor; new tank in toilet in Civil Court; new basin set; Italian marble basin slab set, and tank repaired in Magistrates' toilet.

The furnace in the engine room in above building was relined, the ash pit repaired, and four arches set in a complete and workmanlike manner.

#### Seventh District Courthouse.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished. The following repairs were made to the plumbing system: Several water closets were repaired and cleaned, and two wash basins furnished and connected; soil pipes cleaned out in Magistrates' private hall, and water closet reset; new supply tank furnished and put in Janitor's apartment; hot water pipe and faucets repaired where necessary; two new tanks and two urinals, with necessary piping, traps, etc., put in place; it was necessary in connection with this work to take down the slate and reset the same.

#### First District Municipal Court.

In consequence of an unsafe violation being placed against this court, it was necessary to do considerable shoring and bracing and take down all the defective footings and iron columns at the centre of building. The footings were rebuilt and made of sufficient size and strength to safely sustain the weight imposed. All the loose, cracked and defective plastering on the ceilings, partitions and stone work caused by the above mentioned work was taken down, and the same replastered in a safe manner. The steam and gas pipes were changed and smoke plates furnished. Janitor's supplies were also furnished.

#### Second District Municipal Court.

The water closets were repaired and one new cistern furnished. The waste pipes were also cleaned out, and the necessary cleaning supplies furnished.

#### Third District Court Building.

The old shades and rollers in above building were repaired, and new shades furnished and put up where necessary. The water closet was repaired and cleaned, and one galvanized iron sink, with back and legs, furnished and connected, and water pipe at fountain was repaired.

#### Essex Market Courthouse.

Water closets and pipes in above building were cleaned and repaired, and two gas fixtures for Judge's bench furnished and connected. Gutters on roof were lined, and defective slates removed where necessary, new tin of best quality placed underneath, and the roof relasted where repairs were made, also two new galvanized iron 5-inch leaders furnished and set; all the tin and iron work painted, bottom and top, and the premises left broom clean.

#### Fourth District Municipal Court.

Orders were issued for the necessary supply of steam during the year 1903, together with necessary cleaning supplies.

#### Fifth District Municipal Court.

Necessary cleaning supplies were furnished. In relation to this court I beg to report that the building has outlived its usefulness and has been condemned by the Health Department, and is in an unsanitary condition. The court room is situated in a congested part of this City, and there are always a large number of litigants in this court every day. It is perhaps the busiest court in the City. The air space is insufficient and the ventilation wretched. The litigants are mostly foreigners who rush to the law at the slightest excuse; the rooms are ill-smelling and crowded to suffocation during court hours, especially in the summer time. An attempt was made some time ago to formulate plans for the building of a modern structure, but the matter was allowed to drop. I think it would be well to advocate the condemnation of this building and the erection of a modern courthouse.

#### Sixth District Courthouse.

Orders were issued for a supply of steam for the year 1903.

#### Children's Court.

Sewer pipes were cleaned and repaired and water pipe extended. The steam system in the above building was altered, and four 12-loop radiators furnished and connected. One new slop sink with necessary connections furnished and put in. A complete electric lighting system was furnished and installed for the use of the above building.

#### New York County Jail.

Soil pipes and water closets cleaned out and repaired, and three new water closets furnished. Bath tubs were also repaired.

#### Building Nos. 68-70 Elm Street.

The walls and ceilings in three rooms of above building were washed off, plastered and kalsomined, and radiators rebronzed.

#### City Paymaster's Office.

Orders were issued for the necessary supply of steam during the quarter. Cleaning supplies were furnished. One Japanned tin sign furnished and put up in the above office. Six rows of shelving, each 52 feet long by 3 feet wide and 1 foot high in the clear, made with panel doors, erected for use of the above office.

#### The Markets.

Fulton Market—Iron waste pipes and bell traps cleaned out and new lead traps put in on the Front street side of above market.

Jefferson Market—Sewer pipes cleaned and repaired. Water closet repaired and one cistern furnished. Ceilings and side walls in toilet room and closet repaired and plastered. Cast iron leader pipes from roof cleaned out. Gas leaks repaired; new bracket put in hall of Janitor's apartments. Faucets and leaks in examination room repaired. Water closet in examination repaired and reset.

Washington Market—Sewer pipes were cleaned out at stand 333. Defective roofing and gutters were repaired at the following stands: 269 to 378, 21 to 26, 37 and 375, 416, 404, 163, 164 and 182, 377, 378, 379, 380, 273, 296, 333, 368 and 329. Defective tin was cut out on roofs and gutters and replaced with new tin of best quality, and all new tin painted bottom and top.

West Washington Market—Defective tin on the roofs and gutters cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top, at the following stands: Nos. 7, 9, 27, 29 and 34 Thompson avenue; Nos. 17, 19, 29, 31, 33 and 35 Grace avenue; Nos. 20, 22 and 24 Lawton avenue; Nos. 15 to 31 Grace avenue; Nos. 16, 31, 32 Thompson avenue; Nos. 18, 31 and 39 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 16, 31, 32 and 47 Loew avenue; Nos. 1, 2, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, 15, 17 and 19 Gansevoort street and Nos. 33 to 57 Gansevoort street; Nos. 38 and 40 Grace avenue and Nos. 1 to 3 West street; corner of Grace and Lawton avenues; corner of West and Bloomfield streets; Nos. 17, 33 and 63 Lawton avenue; Nos. 15 and 64 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 16 and 64 Thompson avenue and No. 40 Lawton avenue; Nos. 9, 11, 13 and 15 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 11, 17, 19 and 21 Thompson avenue; Nos. 59, 61 and 63 Grace avenue; Nos. 52, 54 and 56 Grace avenue; Nos. 2 to 32 Grace avenue; Nos. 27, 29 and 31 Hewitt avenue; Nos. 17, 57, 60 and 64 Thompson avenue; Nos. 1 to 12 Lawton avenue; Nos. 37, 39, 59, 61 and 63 Loew avenue; Nos. 21, 23 and 25 Grace avenue; Nos. 1 to 8

Bloomfield street; Nos. 9 to 15 Loew avenue; Nos. 28 to 30 West street. The gutters at the above stands were relined where necessary. The iron leader pipes at the above markets were repaired.

#### Public Comfort Station.

Orders were issued for supply of electric current to operate motor fans for the year 1903, together for supply of steam. About 75 square feet of window guards were furnished and put up. Twelve No. 38 Demarest patent cisterns and 3 Titan water closets were furnished and connected, and the flush pipes extended and altered.

#### Free Floating Baths.

The baths have weathered the winter season without any mishap, and preparations are now being made to put them in condition for the summer season. They will probably be open to the public about June 15. Policies of insurance amounting to \$90,000 were taken out on the free floating baths, insuring them against loss or damage by fire. The following supplies were furnished: Coal, two pairs of rubber boots, one barrel of kerosene oil, the necessary cleaning supplies; 3,850 feet of moulding furnished and put up. The baths have wintered at the foot of Twenty-first and Twenty-second streets, South Brooklyn.

#### Rivington Street Bath.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished, together with 2 gallons of signal oil, 10 pounds of putty, 50 pounds of white lead, 10 gallons of varnish, 2 pieces of  $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch wire hose, 60 feet long each, with couplings, etc.; 1 dozen coir mats and 79 guards furnished and put up. A supply of Garlock packing, different sizes, furnished for the use of the Engineer. The gegenstroms in the above bath were disconnected, overhauled and put in complete working order. The furnaces, arches and walls in the above building were relined. Orders were issued for the use of telephone in the above bath. I attach hereto report of the Superintendent of Public Baths and Public Comfort Stations, which will be considered a part of this report.

#### Offices of Commissioner of Public Works.

Orders were issued for the use of switchboard and extension station, also for supply of newspapers daily.

Bureau of Buildings—153 $\frac{1}{2}$  yards of plain brown linoleum was furnished and laid on the fourth floor. About 290 yards of the same style and quality of linoleum as on fourth floor was laid on the sixth floor. All of the above linoleum was cemented to the floor. One Pastasote upholstered couch, 4 oak revolving chairs, 3 pairs of rubber top boots, size 9; three rubber coats, sizes 40, 42 and 44, and one 60-inch specially constructed rolltop desk furnished as selected.

Bureau of Highways—Water table was connected with water pipe in room 1606.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices—Supply of coal and wood for heating and ice for various offices, sponges, soap, brooms, pails, dusters, mops, brushes, etc., were furnished and delivered for use of public buildings in care of this Bureau. Orders for the use of horse and wagon and telephone instruments were renewed. Policies of insurance on the various elevators in the public buildings were issued on orders from this Bureau.

Among the many items of repairs not otherwise specifically referred to are plumbing, steam fitting, gas fitting, moving safes, mason work, plastering, painting, carpentering, glazing, electrical work, cabinet work, iron work, tin work, cleaning and laying carpets, etc., and for the use of mechanics in the employ of this Department a supply of lumber, hardware, paints, varnishes, hair felt, canvas, etc., were furnished.

Dear Sir—I submit herewith my quarterly report for the three months ending March 31, 1903, relating to the public comfort station, the Rivington street interior bath, the free floating baths, and also the interior baths in course of construction at One Hundred and Ninth street and West Forty-first street respectively.

Repairs to plumbing work in the comfort station have been made to a considerable extent, so that the station is at present in better condition than at any time the previous year.

The ventilating apparatus, especially the fresh-air inlet, is not in working order, consequently the place cannot be kept clear from offensive odors. The system should at once be overhauled and put in working order, as warm weather is approaching when the fans must be kept in operation.

The Rivington street interior bath has been open daily, except holidays, during the quarter, with very satisfactory results. There has been hardly a complaint worthy of notice made in the past three months.

The gegenstroms have all been put in good condition, and are at this time giving satisfaction.

The entire interior of the building is much in need of painting, for which requisition was made some time ago.

On the night of February 14 the bath was opened to give shelter to burned-out families from the opposite side of the street.

The conduct of the attendants at the bath, except in rare instances, is now all that could be desired.

The attendance has been as follows: Males, 70,024; females, 29,056. Total, 99,080.

The free floating baths, at present in winter quarters at the foot of Twenty-second street, Brooklyn, have wintered in good condition without mishap of any kind. The Department Carpenter has been steadily making the desired improvements.

All of the baths, except the inside of the nine painted this winter, should be at once painted.

Application has been made to the Dock Department for additional berths, but without result. What can be done by the attendants is being done to have the baths ready and in condition to move to summer locations as early in June as the weather may permit or demand. To that end all work to be done previous to that time should be hastened as fast as possible.

The new interior baths, in course of construction at East One Hundred and Ninth street and West Forty-first street, are progressing favorably under the circumstances. At One Hundred and Ninth street much delay has been occasioned by water continually flooding the front of the cellar. This has now been overcome, and the work is being rapidly pushed forward. I would earnestly recommend that in building other interior baths the main floor be five feet above the sidewalk instead of going so deep with basement. This is desirable for many reasons, chief of which is to have natural light and ventilation in front of cellar or boiler room and better drainage.

The iron doors between dressing rooms and shower wells should be dispensed with, as they are a detriment, and have had to be removed from Rivington street bath. In my judgment some other metal than polished brass should be used in these baths for the screens, grill work, rails, etc. The polished brass tarnishes easily, and cannot be kept bright without an unreasonable amount of labor.

These suggestions might well be given some consideration in the construction of other interior baths.

The American Laundry Company are delivering their apparatus and soon expect to get it in place. After all the deliveries are made it will take about two weeks to install the apparatus.

Gouverneur Hospital—The Robert Keasby Company, manufacturers of patent flooring, desire to install a sample of their work in the vestibule of Gouverneur Hospital. It is recommended that permission be granted them to do so without any expense to this Department.

Harlem Hospital—Doctor Parks M. King, Junior Physician at the Harlem Hospital, developed empyema following pneumonia and was recently operated upon. Since then his condition has improved very materially.

Uniforms—The following report on uniforms for the men officers and employees of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals is respectfully submitted. Uniforms shall be provided at the expense of the Department for all men employees whose compensation is less than two hundred and forty dollars a year, except members of the Mills Training School, who are expected to furnish their own uniforms. These uniforms shall remain the property of the Department and under no circumstances shall they be removed from the institutions or worn by its employees except when on duty. Employees wearing cloth uniforms provided by the Department shall be furnished one cap, one suit and two pairs of trousers a year. Any additional articles required during this time must be provided by the employees at their own expense. Those wearing white suits shall be provided with one cap and three suits, as may be required, a year. Those wearing jumpers and overalls shall be provided with one cap and four suits a year. Cloth suits are to be made of Hockanum, either 16 or 20 ounce, blue serge, style 7850. White duck suits and trousers are to be

made of J. Spencer Turner's white cotton duck, style 95, thoroughly shrunk before cutting. The Department shall supply all buttons, whether of gilt, silver or white metal, and these shall be returned to the Assistant Superintendent whenever an employee leaves the service. The buttons shall have the raised letters "B. A. H." upon them. Those provided for the Mills Training School shall have the letters "M. T. S." upon them.

## SCHEDULE OF UNIFORMS.

1. Assistant Superintendent, Supervising Engineer and Resident Physicians—Double-breasted blue serge coat, cut prevailing style, three gilt buttons on each side. Vest without collar, five buttons, one inside and four outside pockets. Trousers, cut prevailing style, one watch, two hip and two side pockets, one inch braid on outside seam. Blue cloth cap, soft crown, drooping visor, black silk cord on front, title in gold on cap. White duck trousers, cut as above, may be worn, if desired, with blue serge coat. White cloth cap may be worn in summer if desired.

2. House Staff and Apothecaries—Suit to be of white cotton duck. Coat, single-breasted sack, cut prevailing style, four bone buttons. Trousers, cut prevailing style, one watch, two hip and two side pockets, inch white braid down the outside seam. White or blue cap with turn down visor and title in gilt on front. Apothecaries' uniform as above, but the braid to be one-half inch in width and four gilt buttons in place of the four bone buttons.

3. Clerks and Assistant Clerks—Coat, single-breasted, cut prevailing style, four gilt buttons on front and two on each sleeve, two inside and two outside pockets. Vest to match, to have five buttons and one inside and four outside pockets. Trousers medium cut with pockets to suit wearer. Cap, blue fatigue with falling visor, black silk cord in front, "B. A. H." in half inch gold letters on front.

4. Male Nurses—Coat, single-breasted, closely fitting the body, buttoned to neck, straight collar (with word "Nurse" on each side), five gilt buttons on front, two on each sleeve, two inside pockets. Trousers medium cut, one watch, two hip and two side pockets.

5. Gatekeepers and Ambulance Drivers—Coat, single-breasted sack, buttoned to neck, turn over collar, five silver buttons on front, two on each sleeve, two inside and two outside pockets. Vest without collar, five silver buttons, one inside and four outside pockets. Trousers, medium cut, one watch, two hip and two side pockets. Cap, plain blue cloth, flame crown, straight peak, "B. A. H." in one-half inch silver letters on front. A supplementary set of bone buttons shall be furnished with each coat and vest.

6. Reception Office and Men's Dining Room Helpers—White duck jacket, single-breasted, four silver buttons, standing collar. Trousers, blue cloth, cut prevailing style, one watch, two hip and two side pockets. Cap, white duck, straight peak, "B. A. H." one-half inch silver letters on front.

7. Cook House—White duck Chef's coat, four silver buttons, white apron and Chef's cap.

8. Engineers—Blue striped jumper and overalls, with gilt buttons, cap same as for Gatekeeper, except that letters shall be in gilt.

9. Firemen, Mechanics and Laundrymen—Same as Engineers, but silver buttons instead of gilt.

10. All Other Helpers—Brown jumper and overalls with silver or white metal buttons. Cap same as for Gatekeepers.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That permission be granted to the Robert Keasby Company to install a sample of their patent flooring in the vestibule of Gouverneur Hospital, provided that the same be done without any expense to this Department, and that, in case it is so desired by this Department, they hold themselves bound to remove said flooring.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the schedule of uniforms for the men officers and employees of the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals be adopted, to take effect whenever in the judgment of the Board sufficient funds are available to purchase the uniforms for those who receive less than \$240 a year. Uniforms shall be provided at the expense of the Department for all men employees whose compensation is less than \$240 a year, except members of the Mills Training School, who are expected to furnish their own uniforms. These uniforms shall remain the property of the Department and under no circumstances shall they be removed from its institutions or worn by its employees except when on duty. Employees wearing cloth uniforms provided by the Department shall be furnished one cap, one suit and two pairs of trousers a year. Any additional articles required during this time must be provided by the employees at their own expense. Those wearing suits shall be provided with one cap and three suits, as may be required, a year. Those wearing jumpers and overalls shall be provided with one cap and four suits a year. Cloth suits are to be made of Hockannum, either sixteen or twenty ounce, blue serge, style 7850. White duck suits and trousers are to be made of J. Spencer Turner's white cotton duck, style 95, thoroughly shrunk before cutting. The Department shall supply all buttons, whether of silver, gilt or white metal, and these shall be returned to the Assistant Superintendent whenever the employee leaves the service. The buttons shall have the raised letters "B. A. H." except those provided for the Mills Training School, which shall have the initials "M. T. S." The Superintendent shall see that all men employees, while on duty, wear the uniform prescribed by the schedule. He shall from time to time inspect such uniforms and see that no employee wears a uniform which is shabby or unfit for use, or different from that prescribed by the schedule. In case any employee is not specifically included in the schedule of uniforms he shall wear such uniform as the Superintendent shall direct. The Superintendent, with the approval of the President, may make such minor changes in the schedule as to the style of the uniforms and the material as he may deem necessary.



In computing the amount of the gross receipts derived from passenger traffic and above referred to, the routes hereinafter mentioned shall be considered, and the persons who are upon the cars of the company at any point upon such routes shall be deemed to have paid the fare provided to be paid by the ordinance granting the franchise aforesaid, whether they enter or leave the car upon such route or upon any other route upon which the grantee or its successors or assigns operates its cars.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1, in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that proportion of the above sums as the time from the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor to September 30 next preceding shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall, as to said railway, be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns, to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for said franchise, of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York and Long Island Traction Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power, substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the New York and North Shore Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Interurban Street Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Provided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, upon giving to the grantee, its successors or assigns, one year's notice, in writing, may require it or them to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially according to the system now in use on the railways in the Borough of Manhattan above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and highways and bridges of The City of New York.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five cents within the limits of The City of New York; and the said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than one hour, both day and night, and as much often as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the city ordinances; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years of this franchise shall not be required to operate its cars on any of its lines within The City of New York between the hours of twelve o'clock midnight and four o'clock a.m. each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during said hours.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets and highways and bridges, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets and highways and bridges, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and highway and bridge, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—The said railway company, its successors and assigns, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and highways and bridges hereby granted, shall cause the entire roadway of each of the same to be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, except that when the width of any roadway between curb lines shall exceed 60 feet, then a roadway of but 60 feet shall be watered as above.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York, by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Eighteenth—If any of the streets and highways and bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise therein shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets and highways and bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway, and such right or franchise shall expire at the end of the term created by this ordinance as above set forth. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York in respect to the opening of such streets and highways and bridges, nor as in any manner granting property or rights of any kind in or upon its lands now owned or occupied by it under any title, except only the public streets and highways and bridges in the usual acceptation of such terms, which are specifically referred to above.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law, as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted hereafter affecting the surface railways operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Section 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that at any time after five years from the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway hereby granted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, if it deems it necessary in the public interest so to do, may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, in case the railway upon any portion of the routes above described shall consist of a single track, to construct and operate a second track upon any or all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

It upon any of the routes above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1905, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertains to such routes, or parts of routes, not then constructed from and after July 1, 1905, shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and The City of New York may recover the cost and expenses of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks, or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 7. This grant is upon the express condition that the New York and Long Island Traction Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of three thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow

and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway and, in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the streets, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of three thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said city. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Section 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bid required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
