

plied with by the Company: First-The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consent shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second-The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of ten (10) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of re-newal of said contract for the further period of fif een (15) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The deter mination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agree-

ment with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable then the parties shall enter into a written agree ment fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall b chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a that disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chose 1 at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be pail for the last year of this original contract. If in any cise the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore pre-vailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensarion and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Tlird-The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums

(a) The sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) in eash within three (3) months after the date on which this contrict is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the priv-

ilege hereby granted. (b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$325) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent, of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three hundred and twenty-five

de lars (\$325). During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$575) and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent, of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five hundred and seventy-five lollars (\$575).

The gross an ual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shal bear the same proportion to such gross receirts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railwy of the Company in opera-tion within the lasts of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the

date upon which this contract is signed by the

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual parment shall be only for that propartion of the first annual charge as the time between the date up on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shell exceed the mirimum amount as above, then sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges berein provided are in-ended to include the percentages of gross rereints now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law s amendad.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Comcany shall not be considered in any manner in the rature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatserver kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City. or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this conract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the harter of any other railway or railroad company roviding for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no signment, lease or sublease of the rights or privleges hereby granted (whether original or re-lewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of he notes mentioned herein, or of any part hereof, shall be valid or effectual for any puruse unless the said assignment lease or sub ease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the resignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by ill of said conditions, and especially said condions as to payments, anything in any statute or n the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said gree or lessee waives any more favorable con-Friens created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth-Nothing in this contract shall leemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation similar right or privilege, upon the same or ther terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted or may hereafter grant the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway jurposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company which shall equal the legal interest on such pro tertion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and letter i ents thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the Companies then using the same; and also such projurtion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of ad litie is and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all other duties i nposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or

the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars perated by the Companies then using the same, ogether with the actual cost of the power neces sary for the operation of the cars thereon or such individual or corporation. Provided, how ever, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for he use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest if in its pinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose but shall upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this con-

Sixth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shal the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh-Upon the termination of this orignal contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or indi-

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Cempany.

Eighth-The Company shall commence con-

struction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board, or from the date upon which the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the rovided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the peod of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been less upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth-Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine,

Tenth-Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the who have jurisdiction in such matters as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall ! commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions as a condition of the granting of the same as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be unon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh-Said railway shall be operated by underground electric power substantially similar to the system of underground electric power now used by the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, provided that any other power may be used except locomotive steam power, horse power or overhead electric power which may be lawfully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for

the First District of the State of New York. Twelfth-No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits underneath or along the side of the railway. When such conduits are constructed the Company shall provide two (2) conduits not less than three (3) inches in diameter each for the exclusive use of the City. The Company hereby agrees that such conduits shall be used only by the Company and the City as above.

Thirteenth-The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents from any point on its road or any road, line or amine its officers under oath.

branch operated by it or under its control to any

other point thereof or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City. Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or way, and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fifteenth-The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the

Sixteenth-All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as

may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth-The Company shall at all times ep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the ails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface rom house line to house line.

Nineteenth-As long as said railway, or any rtion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed. t ween its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the ocal authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twentieth-Any alteration to the sewerage or Irainage system, or any other subsurface or to my surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the mpany, and in such manner as the proper City fficials may prescribe.

Twenty-first-It is agreed that the right herer granted to operate a street surface railway all not be in preference or in hindrance to pubic work of the City, and should the said railway any way interfere with the construction of iblic works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public

Twenty-second-Should the grades or lines of he streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby auth rized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall ake care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisliction over the construction of such change.

The Company shall, within sixty (60) days

rom the commencement of the operation of the rai way hereby authorized, remove, at its own expense, the f ur tracks, together with the cross-overs, canduits and other equipment now existing n Manhattan street; such tracks being as shown by dashed lines upon the map or plan attached tereto and made a part of this contract, and shall restore the street to its original condition. In case of the failure of the Company within such time to comply with the provisions relative to the removal of the tracks, crossovers, conduits and other equipment in Manhattan street, and the restoring of the surface of the street to original condition, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Twenty-third-The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

Twenty-fourth-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascerand the Company shall not charge any passenger hooks of the Company for the purpose of ascer-more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride taining the correctness of its report, and may ex-

Twenty-fifth-In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counmaintenance of the railway, and no freight cars sel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, shall be operated upon the tracks of said rail or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proecedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the ontract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Commany fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-sixth-If the Company shall fail to give fficient public service at the rates herein fixed. or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout he whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the ompany to remedy the same within a reasonable ime; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-seventh-The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorzed by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-eighth-This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right cause the work to be done and the materials be furnished for the performance thereof after the notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost hereof from the said fund without legal pro-recdings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with in-terest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, lating to the headway, heating and lighting of rs, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street vements, the Company shall pay a penalty of the dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violan, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) r day for each car that shall not be properly eated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheeluards, in case of a violation of the provisions ng to those matters all of which deducted from the said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collecion of the penalties in this contract shall be as allows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board snall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof this conract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the pro-visi us of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-ninth-The words "notice" or "direcon," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirtieth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, con-courses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct a

Thirty-first-If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities hereia mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article IV, and other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent thereto, shall be strictly complied

with by the Company.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, Board adotted a resolution on March 4, 1910. fixing the date for public hearing thereon as April 1, 1910, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the New York "Press" and the New York "Herald," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the plequacy of the compensation proposed to be haid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolation for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Union Railway Company of New York City, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved. That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant hereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, neluding the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York he and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1910, by and between The City of New York thereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apport orment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the

ompany), party of the second part, witnesseth: In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double-track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only, in the (\$3,600).

Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit: Beginning at and connecting with the tracks

of the Company in Westchester avenue, at its intersection with East One Hundred and Sixtyseventh street; thence southwesterly in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to the intersection of East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street at Fox street or Simpson street; thence westerly in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street to Franklin avenue; thence outherly in and upon Franklin avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street; thence westerly in and upon East One Hundred and ixty-eighth street to Webster avenue; thence southerly in and upon Webster avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street; thence esterly in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-seventli street and the Transverse road underneath the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and again in and upon East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street to Jerome avenue, and there connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Jerome avenue.

Mullaney, chief engineer, a copy of which is attached beareto is to be deeped a part of this contract. hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract. is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviaions therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions this contract may be permitted by resolution f the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject the following conditions, which shall be comlied with by the Company:

First—The consent, in writing, of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and peration of said railway shall be obtained by he Company within three (3) months from the igning of this contract by the Mayor, and a opy of such consent shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be onstructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and etermine.

Second-The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until March 1, 1924, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) ears, upon a fair revaluation of such right and rivilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise

s privilege of renewal it shall make application o the Board, or any authority which shall be pethorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expira-tion of the original term of this contract. The etermination of the revaluation shall be suffi cient, if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less mount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term if this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City by the Board) or the Company shall be bound. upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the ermination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter nto a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by hree disinterested freeholders selected in the

following manner: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so thosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valua-tions so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum rejuired to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to its whole such gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The annual charges herein provided are in-

tended to include the percentages of gross re-ceipts now required to be paid by railway com-panies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended, and such charges as are required under chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 to be paid by the Company for this extension, if said act applies to or controls the Company in rela-

ion to the right and privilege hereby granted.

The City does not and shall not demand or re quire the payment by the Company of a percentage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 on the gross receipts earned on the extension constructed puruant to this contract.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms this contract to the City by the Company shall ot be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addi on to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or escription, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this con-tract (whether original or renewal), notwithtanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company pro-ciding for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignient, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges erchy granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes men-tioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be alid or effectual for any purpose unless the said ssignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covmant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this intract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes nd will be bound by all of said conditions, and specially said conditions as to payments, any-hing in any statute or in the charter of such assignce or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such tatute or its charter, and that it will not claim reason thereof or otherwise exemption from

f this contract. Fifth-Nothing in this contract shall be deemed affect in any way the right of the City to grant any individual or other corporation a similar ight or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, nereinbefore described.

pility to perform each and all of the conditions

The use of the railway constructed by the Comcany under this contract, including the tracks, sires and other equipment or any structure used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted or may hereafter grant the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, up on payment of an annual sum by such indi-vidual or corporation to the Company, which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments hereto, as the number of cars operated by such alividual or corporation shall bear to the number if cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in epair, and the cost of additions and betterments hereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of avement and removal of snow and ice and all ther duties imposed upon the Company by the erms of this contract in connection with the naintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the numper of cars operated by the companies then using he same, together with the actual cost of the lower necessary for the operation of the cars hereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in ts opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any ortion of the railway which shall be constructed

by the Company pursuant to this contract. Sixth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, r leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass or vest in any other person or corporation vhatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or vaiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the ermination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatspever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost

The gross annual receipts mentioned above three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date upon which the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is signed in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within twelve (12) months from the date of filing such consents or such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall there-upon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months each; and provided, urther, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided furprosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deiver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceed ings.

Ninth-Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the ompany to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby

granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, mainand control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been ob-

In any permits so issued such officials may also mpose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials nave jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the company for the operation of the railway within he limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh-Said railway may be operated by verhead electric power substantially similar to e overhead electric system now in use by street reface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, by any other motive power, except locomotive team power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the district by the Board, and consented to by the shutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth-Upon six (6) months' notice by the Roard to the Company, all wires for the transnission of power, except troller wires, for the peration of the railway, upon all or any portion if the route hereby authorized, shall be placed n conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. Company shall provide in such conduits two ducts not less than three (3) inches in liameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such lucts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger apon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this con-tract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are n full uniform.

Fourteenth-No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars

shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway. Fifteenth-The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter during the term of this contract be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth-All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.
Seventeenth—All cars operated on said rail-

way shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board. Eighteenth-Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may re-

nuire, or as may be directed by the Board. Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least hree (3) times every twenty four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth-The Company shall at all times seep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks. the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of

Twinty-sixth-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnngs from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each ear, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding. n such form as he may prescribe. Such report hall contain a statement of such gross receipts, he total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-seventh-In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the prorisions herein contained, or with any orders of he Board acting under the powers herein reerved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to he Company, or at the option of the Board by esolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this entract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact: also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Roard of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
