Dear Sirs-The territory in the vicinity of Thrall Avenue and Beaufort Street, Woodhaven, is a natural low-lying area, with no present drainage facilities.

The drainage plan covering this territory has not as yet been adopted, and if it were it would practically be impossible to provide sewers for several years. In the meantime the water from the surrounding land flows to this intersection and covers Thrall Avenue and other streets to a depth of several feet, remaining there for long periods of time, thereby producing a condition not only injurious to life but also menacing lives and property. During the past several weeks ice has formed upon this location which, upon being broken up by traffic, produces a most dangerous condition. Recently, Dr. Fernand D'Orbessan, while atempting to operate a car through this section, was thrown from same, together with a passenger, and complains that he was seriously injured and may bring suit against the City of New York. Unless this condition is immediately remedied similar experiences will undoubtedly occur.

The territory is considerably built up by a poor class of residents, and only last evening our Building Department was called upon to furnish protection to one of the buildings, the foundation of which appeared to be undermined by the action of the water and the foundation in danger, our information being that seven feet of water gathered in this cellar. As this condition exists in the cellars of other against the City of New York by reason of such injury.

Something should be done at once to remedy this situation and to correct this

condition, and in order to do so a plan will be worked out by our Engineering Division under which the conditions could be remedied by the construction of a pumping devise and a force main by which the water gathering at this low spot could be pumped to a permanent sewer at the intersection of Hatch and Beaufort Avenues, which is the nearest sewer to the flooded area.

This work will involve an expenditure of about ten thousand dollars (\$10,000). Accordingly, in order to abate this nuisance at once and to prevent additional suits being brought against the City of New York, request is hereby made for your approval of such expenditure from the appropriations made to this Department for the year 1917. A request for Revenue Bonds to reimburse such expenditure will this day be made to the Board of Aldermen for the replenishment of said expenditure.

No. 1166 (Ord. No. 211). An Ordinance to Amend Section 3 of Article 2 of Chapter 1 of the Code of Ordinances by Providing for a Display of the American Flag Over All City-Owned Buildings or Other Buildings Occupied by City Departments.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 3 of article 2 of chapter 1 of the Code of Ordinances by providing for a display of the American flag over all city-owned build-

ings or other buildings occupied by City departments.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 3 of article 2 of chapter 1 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following words:

And the American flag shall be displayed on all city-owned or other buildings occupied by any city department or institution of whatever character on all days of the year, excepting Sundays.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Note-New matter in italics.

to pay three-fourths of all moneys required for all expenses in connection with said parkway; and Whereas, Section 16 of said act provides in substance that the Bronx Parkway Commission shall certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York an estimate of the annual expenses necessary to be incurred by them for the purpose of improving the lands to be acquired by said Commission, and it then shall be the duty of the proper officials of the City of New York to annually

provide for the payment of three-fourths of such expenditures; and Whereas, There is serious doubt as to the validity of this act and the construction thereof which has never been passed upon by the Courts of this State; and

Whereas, The Commission has already expended money far in excess of the estimated cost of acquiring the lands and doing the work made by the Commission at the time of its creation; and

City Hall, New York: Dear Sir-I am in receipt of your communication of the 4th inst., requesting my conclusions in regard to a request of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$3,216 to pay salaries of various employees stated to be required in the opening of a Neurological Service at Bellevue Hospital. The employees requested are as follows:

1 Graduate Nurse at \$720, 1 Graduate Nurse at \$600, 6 Pupil Nurses at \$96, 2 Attendants at \$240, 4 Hospital Helpers (women) at \$210.

No necessity now exists for the issuing of these Revenue Bonds and my reasons for this conclusion are as follows:

The Budget for 1917, Code 2032, catries a line reading, "Trained Nurse, Pupil Nurse, Attendant and Hospital Helper (maximum salary rate \$600 per annum, with maintenance), \$47,572." Under Budget rules all of the requested positions, if necessary in the operation of the hospital, except that of Graduate Nurse at \$720, can be charged to this line and this position can be provided by modification from the funds in this code.

If before the end of the year additional funds are required they can be secured if necessary by the issuance of revenue bonds, but if the experience of 1916 is any guide they can be secured from present appropriation. There is a balance on January 5, 1917, in the 1916 Code corresponding to Code 2032 for 1917 of \$9,700, and balances in other Codes which would be available for transfer under 1917 Budget rules of several times this, and furthermore the 1917 appropriation for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals is in excess of the 1916 appropriation.

Kindly regard this communication as not passing on the necessity of any increased force for this purpose, as this has not been the subject of investigation but merely as stating that any necessary increase in force to this amount can be secured from present funds. If any further information is required in regard to this request, I will be pleased to furnish same. Yours very truly,

Report of the Committee on Rules in Favor of Filing Preamble and Resolution Relative to Cost and Distribution of Milk.

The Committee on Rules, to which was referred on October 10, 1916 (Minutes, page 67), the annexed preamble and resolution relative to appointment of a Special Committee to investigate conditions relative to cost and distribution of milk, respect-

REPORTS:

That at the request of the introducer that this matter be withdrawn, the Committee recommends that it be placed on file.

Whereas, A controversy exists not only between the producers and the distributors of milk, but also among the distributors themselves, in the City of New York, resulting in a serious shortage of mlik, thereby jeopardizing the health and lives of many infants and sick persons in the City; and

Whereas, The Health Department of the City of New York exercises exclusive control, through the issuing of licenses to dealers, over the distribution of milk in the City of New York, and as it is claimed by those exercising said licenses, namely, distributors, that said rules of the Health Department greatly complicate and increase the cost of distribution of milk in the City of New York; and

Whereas, The Health Department of the City of New York has established grades of milk, making rules applicable to each grade which are claimed to be wholly arbitrary and unreasonable, resulting in unnecessary and unwarranted increase in the cost of production and distribution of milk, and further resulting in the exclusion from the poorer classes of certain grades that would be available to them at a fair price except for such grading, e. g. Commissioner Dillon, of the State Department of Foods and Markets, asserts that the cost to produce and deliver to distributors or storekeepers is less than seven cents per quart and the average price of milk to the consumer is about ten cents per quart, to which distributors assert that their profit do not exceed a mill per quart, assertions unreconcilable, and

Whereas. The law of the State of New York excludes skim milk from the counties of Kings and New York, it being asserted that skim milk is a valuable and wholesome article of food, and except for such exclusion, great waste could be saved and the public would have available additional supply of milk for cooking purposes at a very much lower price than any milk can be obtained in New York

at the present time; and

Whereas, Over seven dealers deliver milk in an average block in the City of New York, greatly thereby advancing the cost of the distribution of milk, much of which excess could be saved by a practical business organization for collective dis-

tribution of milk in the City of New York; and Whereas, The Department of Agriculture of the State of New York, the Department of Health of the State of New York, the Department of Health of the City of New York, the Department of Foods and Markets of the State of New York, and the Department of Weights and Measures of the City of New York, each has its separate duties and responsibilities and each exercises separate and distinct control over the milk industry and according to the best information obtainable there is a conflict between such duties, responsibilities and control, adding greatly to the cost

of milk to the consumer in this City; and Whereas, There appears to be a combination, monopoly and conspiracy to control the production and distribution of milk in pursuance of which among other things a committee has been formed, claimed to be representatives of the producer, distributor and consumer, but in reality wholly controlled by the producers and distributors, leaving the City entirely at the mercy of said committee, even though said committee had any power to control the subject of their investigation; and

Whereas, Although there have been many State Legislative investigations and proceedings on application by the Attorney-General to the Supreme Court, there never has been an inquiry made with especial reference to the necessities of the people of the City of New York.

Resolved, That a committee of seven members of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York be and the same is hereby constituted to inquire into such conditions; and be it further

Resolved. That such committee be hereby authorized to sit in the Aldermanic Chamber or in such other places in the City of New York as such committee may select, to choose a chairman from among its members and such other assistants, secretary and counsel, as may be needed to take testimony and make inquiry into such conditions, and make recommendations and reports.

The Committee on Rules, to which was referred on October 10, 1916 (Minutes, page 68), the annexed resolution relative to appointment of a Special Committee to investigate the Bronx Parkway Commission, respectfully REPORTS:

That having examined the subject, the Committee believes this to be a function of the State Legislature, and recommends that the accompanying resolution be placed

Whereas, Chapter 594 of the New York State Laws of 1907, and as amended by chapter 757 of the Laws of 1913, entitled "An act to provide for preserving the waters of the Bronx River, from pollution, creating a reservation of the lands on ither side of the river; authorizing the taking of lands for that purpose, and providing for the payment thereof; and appointing a commission to carry out the purposes of the act," had for an object primarily, the creation of a most worthy project, that would eliminate a public nuisance and a danger to the health of the community; and, in addition, provide a Parkway that would extend from the north side of Bronx Park to the south side of Kensico Dam, a distance of fifteen (15) miles; and

Whereas, In compliance with the provisions of the aforesaid act, a commission of three (3) members, known as the Bronx Parkway Commission, was created, each of whom to receive as salary the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) per annum for their services, which would include their traveling expenses; and

Whereas, This Parkway of fifteen (15) miles extends for the greatest part in Westchester County. and but three (3) of which is in the City of New York, it is mandatory on the City of New York to pay for seventy-five (75) per cent. of the total cost of the improvement, the halance to be paid by Westchester County; and

Whereas, The cost of purchasing the lands along the Bronx River, which has,

October 6, 1916, amounted to close to four million dollars (\$4,000,000). The original idea as to the estimated cost for this purpose, was thought to be one million six hundred and fitty thousand dollars (\$1,000,000), an excess over such estimate of two million three hundred and htty thousand dollars. This will not complete the total expense as it is thought it would take an additional amount of two million dollars for this purpose; and

Whereas, It has been shown that the labor employed on the Parkway was not supplied from the lists of either the Municipal or State Civil Service, but were hired and discharged by the Superintendent in charge of the work; and

Whereas, The taxpayers of the City of New York are suffering severely from the burdens they carry in the support of the government in the administration of our affairs in the City and State, and while they willingly pay what just assessments are allotted them they strenuously object to such an imposition as is the case in the mandatory provisions of the Bronx Parkway act, which prevents the Board of Estimate and Apportionment from affording the City of New York any relief in the premises; therefore be it

Resolved, That following out the provisions of section 54 of the Greater New York Charter a Special Committee be appointed to investigate the Bronx Parkway Commission; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York shall designate as members of the Special Committee at least one member from the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, Bronx, Queens and Richmond, in the City of New York, and that the aforesaid Committee shall make a thorough investigation of the Bronx Parkway Commission, and report the result of their andings to the Board of Aldermen for final action.

Dear Sirs—I respectfully request that permission be granted to purchase, without public letting, during the year 1917, fresh fish, oysters and clams to an amount not to exceed \$25,000; fresh fruits and vegetables to an amount not to exceed \$30,000, and agricultural and botanical supplies to an amount not to exceed \$5,000.

Purchases of fresh fish, oysters and clams have been made on open market orders weekly during the past two years, thanks to permission granted by your Honorable Board. By this means we have been enabled to purchase our supply at prices lower than what can be secured on contract. Considerable saving has been effected by taking advantage of gluts in the market, and purchasing fresh fish which is then frozen and stored and used from time to time when prices warrant. I hope that I may be able to continue this policy during the coming year.

Fresh fruits and vegetables are purchased weekly, thus securing prevailing market prices. When contracts are entered into for these commodities, the bidders are necessarily compelled to protect themselves and prices are somewhat higher. I have established a maximum price for each article above which they are not pur-

chased, except under extenuating circumstances. It is admitted that it is not practical to prepare specifications for plants, seeds, etc., and that publicly advertised contracts will not secure supplies of the quality desired. It is obvious that these supplies should be purchased from reliable dealers. This we cannot be assured of if the proposals are publicly advertised.

I trust this request will be granted, since I believe it to be to the best interests

memoranda and briefs submitted by all of the parties interested therein, and the any building or buildings, by means of steps, and openings over which substantial and Committee is in sympathy with the spirit of the ordinance proposed, but, in view of the following conflicting statements made at the hearings and in the memoranda provided said openings be used primarily for light and ventilation. and briefs filed: (first) the advantages that would be afforded to the officers and members of the companies of the uniformed force of the Fire Department by dividing them into two platoons; (second) the desire of the majority of the officers and members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department to inaugurate this new system in that Department; (third) the amount that it would cost the City of New York by the adoption of this ordinance; (fourth) whether or not the adoption of this ordinance would be extra hazardous to the City on account of fires, and, it having been further stated to the Committee at the public hearings and in memoranda and briefs submitted by the representatives of the officers and members of the uniformed force of the Fire Department that no fair trial of the two platoon system has ever been had in the Fire Department of the City of New York, while, on the other hand, it is claimed that in other Cities throughout the United States, wherein this two platoon system was inaugurated, it was proven in every way to be successful and satisfactory, the Committee recommends that this ordinance be placed on file and the following substituted resolution be adopted:

Motors 534 to 10 H. P.—400 sq. inches.

Motors 24 to 5 H. P.—144 sq. inches.

The openings shall be covered by a one and one-half inch wire mesh constructed of 10 B. and S. gauge hard drawn galvanized iron wire; one side of this wire mesh shall be covered by two thicknesses of 24 mesh brass or copper wire

The wire mesh shall be mounted in a frame and placed on the inner side of the enclosure and rigidly fastened and secured into position with stove bolts. The wire gauze shall be secured to the wire

Every owner, lessee, ten ant, occupant, or person in charge of any build-ing or premises within or adjacent to the built-up portions of the City of New York, shall keep and cause to be kept the sidewalk, flagging, and curb stone abutting on said building or premises free from obstructions and nuisances of every free from obstructions and nuisances of every kind, and shall remove or cause to be removed therefrom all garbage, refuse, filth, dirt, and other offensive material and shall keep such sidewalk, flagging, and curbstone free from garbage, refuse, filth, dirt, and other offensive material; and no such owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or person in charge shall allow anything in, on, or about such building or premises, or any condition arising or existing therein or thereon, to become a nuisance, or dangerous or

prejudicial to life or health.

Such garbage, refuse, filth, dirt, and other offensive material removed from the sidewalk, flagging, or curbstone may be piled in the gutter or roadway between the hours of six and eight o'clock in the morning, but shall not be put or placed in, or swept, shoveled, thrown, emptied, or deposited into, the gutter or roadway at any other time.



chasers. Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated

therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the pro-

posals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-ment. President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
